A new date, a New Year, 2008, an Olympic year, a leap year, a time to pause and think.. Our front cover is still a Marjorie Davies sketch, this time a watercolour not seen before by readers as it hangs in our hall and was a gift many years ago. Observant readers will see that there is no disabled access on the left of the lych-gate. Sadly Marjorie passed away in December and you will see an appreciation by the Enterprise Centre elsewhere in this issue. The editorial team would endorse those comments, we are hugely indebted to Marjorie for the continual supply of front cover sketches over many years. She was a truly remarkable lady and we will all greatly miss her. Her passing does now raise the question as to what we should have to replace her drawings on the front cover and although we have various ideas we are open to further suggestions but we are so aware of the truism 'it's a hard act to follow'.

I was browsing through old editions of Chailey News looking for inspiration and came across the following written by Eddie Mathias which is worth repeating.

"At the start of a New Year there is an important question that we could ask ourselves. How are we going to make our way through it, with all the perplexities and problems and events that beset us and exist around us?"

Some of us will daydream, either by looking back and longing for the past. 'Oh those old days when the sky was blue and the sun was always shining but I wonder if they were. We tend to forget the bad things. But in any case whilst we look back, the present slips away. Or on the other hand we dream of the future, next week, next month it will be better. It can't always be like this. Whilst we think and daydream of the future, the present again slips past. That is not to scorn the act of remembering, of optimism. They have their place and without them life would be the poorer. But we must never let them become substitutes for living in the present. Now is the moment for living.

Life is made up, not of years but of moments. Years are but an accumulation of moments. We should therefore be living in the present. But to get the best out of it, we need a positive approach to life, a determination to make the most of every moment and to use it creatively, think good wholesome thoughts, speak kind thoughtful words and do generous loving deeds. That is the chief task of any Christian in any case to see that his life is governed, not by self interest, but by love for God and others. I'm sure we could all do so much more for each other than we do if only we thought less of ourselves. Nations likewise could do so much more for each other if they worried less about their own economies and contributed positively towards the less fortunate countries.

Life will always be like a maze, I think, a case of threading our way through all the events of life, But if we want to come out at the other end in the right place, then I believe we need to live in the companionship of Jesus Christ, who said I am the Way the Truth and the Life, and showed it by a positive and creative life of loving. So for a simple New Year's Resolution, why not resolve to live closer to Him? Try to make life much more loving in every way. It will be a happier New Year for us all if we do."

A final word on the magazine, do look through the advertising pages , although we are not allowed to personally and individually endorse them they no doubt can give details of previous satisfied customers. There are a dozen new advertisers for this year and they are all awaiting your call. Their financial contribution together with the Parish Council helps to keep the magazine free and keep our books nearly in balance.

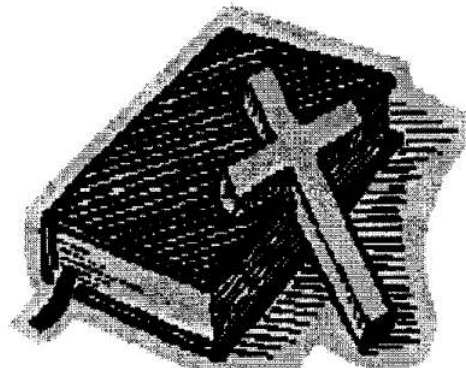

Friends Of Newick Health Centre

Now that the date for all responses to be 'in' has passed you may think that all has gone quiet. This is not so with the PRH campaign still meeting with important players in the game. A recent press release from Duncan Selbie the Chief Executive of Brighton and Sussex University Trust states ' We are proposing a model of care which supports the principles of *Fit for the Future*, maintains local access to full acute hospital services for the people of Mid Sussex, and builds a positive future for the Princess Royal Hospital and the Royal Sussex County Hospital as one teaching hospital on two sites. The main points are that the Princess Royal as now A&E, planned surgery, unselected medical admissions, outpatient services and day care are all to continue. We cannot see how we can provide a consultant led maternity service at the Princess Royal without an absolute minimum of 3500 births and preferably 4000, and today we have less than 2500 births. This not about money but ensuring the safety and quality of everything we do'



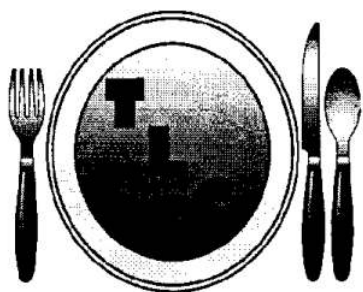
That was very welcome news except for the maternity provision. We know that the consultant gynaecologists are writing to all GP's asking them to invite all expectant mothers to use the Princess Royal in an effort to get numbers up. It is also thought that when the East Sussex PCT proposals are published early in the new year that Hastings will become the major maternity unit for that PCT and Eastbourne General Hospital will be downgraded. If this happens then the effect on Princess Royal can't be anything but good, as mothers from the Uckfield and district area are unlikely to want to go to Hastings. Another thing that has come to light is that without a consultant led maternity unit in the vicinity then home births will become a thing of the past. This is because a 'normal' delivery may not go quite right and a consultant is needed.

Finally we do know that the independent panel chairman chaired by Sir Graeme Chatto is consulting with respondents. 'The Support the PRH campaign' met him in early December as has Chailey Parish Council.

We only hope for a successful outcome to our campaign and many thanks to all of you have help out in any way and responded to the document. Many thanks must also go Dr. Ashby for all the hard work he has put in, in addressing meetings in all the villages and getting all the GP's (178 of them) in the Princess Royal's catchment area to speak with one voice. Not any easy job.

Happy New Year! On the behalf of all involved with ZAPO-UK I wish one and all a prosperous and peace-filled 2008.

Our plans for the year ahead are already taking shape. One important aspect of our work will be to support the rural ZAPO community in Miyengwe. However, as important as it is that the Miyengwe families are fed (and our supporters are helping us to provide consignments of food-aid and nutritional supplements) it is vital that we enable the families to provide for themselves. Of course, one asset that the Miyengwe community has that isn't so available to our urban families is land. There is plenty of room to grow food if seed, plants, fertiliser and tools are available.

Our first project with the Miyengwe people will be the development of a banana plantation. This will be a fully commercial enterprise and will establish an income stream for the purchase of other foods for the whole community. We will need to raise approximately £600.00 to begin this project. Please feel free to contribute funds or help at our fund raising events. We will be very grateful indeed.

Because *Chailey News* is often delivered before the month end I take this opportunity to invite you to our fund raising Treasure Hunt around the Chailey Link Walk, which will be led by Mr John Barnes on Saturday 29th December. 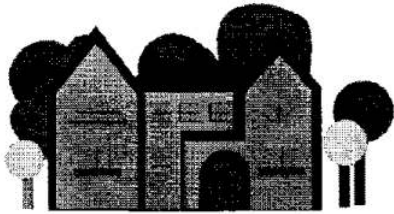

Roeheath: Nothing is easy in this life – but we now have a pair of goalposts set up on Roeheath. Councillors have given priority this year to establishing Roeheath as a recreational area close to South Chailey and to the Village Hall. Roeheath is currently used by the Youth Club, who also received a set of footballs from a resident.

The Village Survey two years ago confirmed that there was an urgent need for improved recreational space in the village. Councillors recognise that, for some if not all, village facilities are usually only accessible by car. We accept this as a geographical imperative in planning for such facilities.

Reading Room: a reminder that the Parish owns the Reading Room on Chailey Green, a good location for small committee meetings or activity groups. There is usually good parking alongside the Green or in the Church carpark, but don't forget to bring a torch at night! For further information, please contact the Clerk.

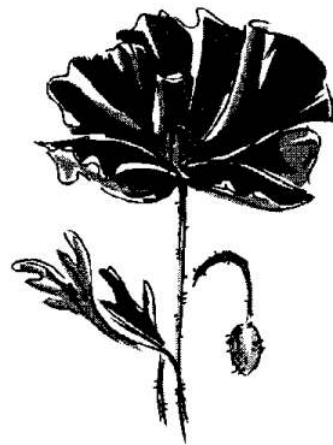
Poppy Day 2007

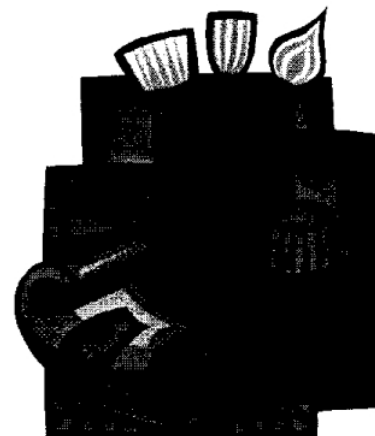
November Exhibition

On behalf of the Enterprise Centre I would like to take a moment to remember local artist and long time Chailey resident Marjorie Davies, who sadly passed away last year at the amazing age of 101. Since we started producing Chailey News in summer 2006, we at CHEC have looked forward each month to receiving her beautiful artwork for the front cover. She seemed to have a remarkable ability to find an apparently never-ending supply of scenes from the local area and render them in a way that was pleasing to many. With a few strokes of her pen, she could capture the mood and the soul of a building or landscape, sealing it on paper to be enjoyed forever.

None of us at CHEC ever met Marjorie in person as our only communication with her was through the editor of Chailey News, Chris Jones, but from the messages he relayed she came across as an active, caring woman who was determined to maintain her life and hobbies for as long as possible. She was fascinated by our ability to copy her work onto our

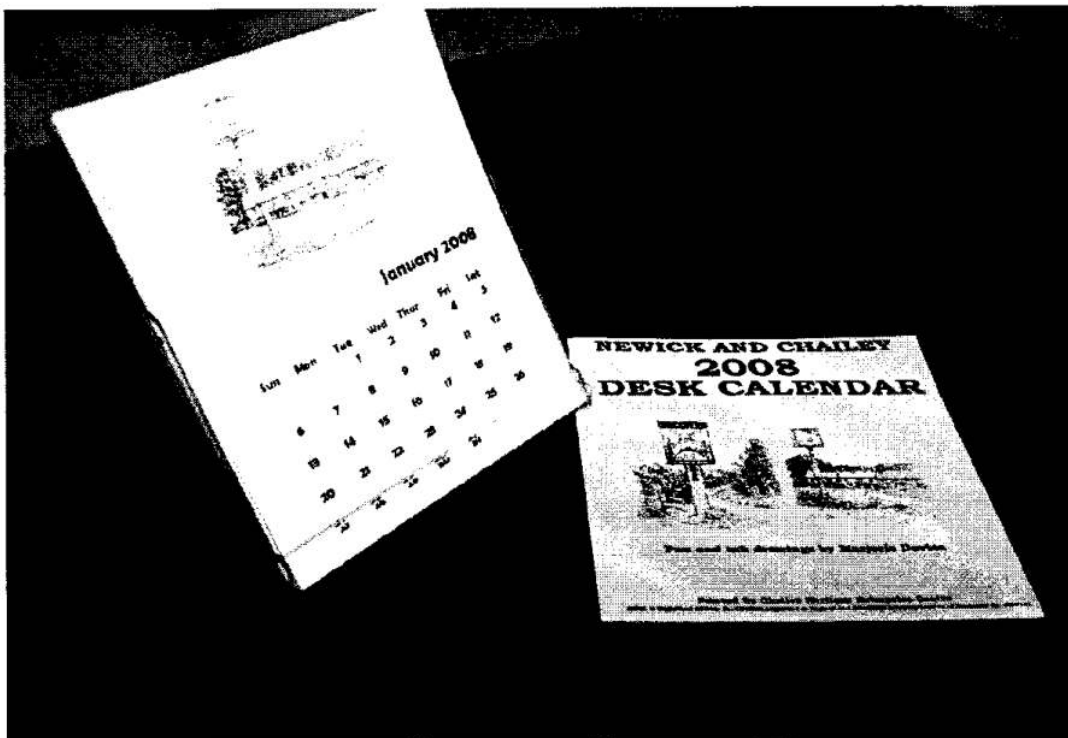
products. It overjoyed and amazed her to learn we were able to print her drawings on mugs and coasters and was thrilled at seeing the end result of our work.

Perhaps it was this great interest in the work of CHEC that prompted Marjorie to make the phenomenally kind gesture of allowing us to use her Chailey News cover art in our fundraising. The result was our Marjorie Davis Centennial Collection of mugs, coasters and placemats, which many of you purchased and more recently CHEC's 2008 Chailey and Newick Desk Calendar. I clearly remember the day that Graham asked me to scan Marjorie's sketches she had gifted us. The sheer volume and quality of her drawings was simply astounding.

Marjorie continued producing images for Chailey News until a few months ago. Right up until that late stage in her life however, she was always determined that her work was displayed in correct proportion to the magazine's title and date.

Though CHEC's relationship with Marjorie was a relatively short and detached one, we will miss receiving her work and our thoughts are with her friends and family. Her kind gift of artwork to the Centre means that her beautiful drawings will grace the homes of Chailey residence for many years to come.
