From the Rectory,

Blessings carry heavens DNA of the Spirit to empower people to connect with God and his purposes for their lives.

I believe that we need to recover a new respect and practise of the ministry of blessing. It is a heaven sent resource with powerful effects and I am sure that the King of the Kingdom is waiting for us to take up our calling to be people who are blessed and who bless everybody else so they too can come to know the King and move on into their heaven sent destiny. So thank you Chris and Sarah and may God bless you and may He be close to you and your families as St Peters moves into the next chapter of its life here in Chailey. Next month I will tell you of our beautiful new boards outside Church, thank you Norman Stevens you too went far and beyond your task. Bless you.



Village Information Point

The Village Information Point sessions are held on Tuesday mornings at the Coffee Stop, Free Church, South Chailey. In May sessions will be held on Tuesday 15th and Tuesday 29th May between 10.00 am and 12.00.

Small Grants Scheme

The deadline for applications for 'small grants' under the Parish Council's small grants scheme is 30th June 2012 and requests received by the Parish Council office by this date will be considered at the meeting of Full Council on 17th July 2012. A Grant Application Form is available on request to the parish office or can be downloaded from the community website www.chailey.org or by contacting the Clerk.

Parish Allotments

The Parish Council owns several allotment plots at North Chailey. At its meeting held in February the Council agreed to retain allotment rents at £30.00 per year (unchanged since 2010). There is an allotment waiting list but this has recently reduced as some plots have been relinquished or are now being shared. If you wish to be added to the waiting list please contact the Clerk.

Highways and Byways

A liaison meeting was held with ESCC Highways on 19th March and a programme of routine Village maintenance agreed. This will include cutting back overgrown vegetation and clearing the sidings along footpaths. The next meeting will be held during week beginning 18th June.

Road works (subject to change)

New National Planning Policy Framework

How does this affect us in Chailey? Last year, all Lewes District Councillors were invited to respond to the draft document. Only two Councillors responded.

On behalf of Chailey and Wivelsfield residents - I was one of them. One of the key policy changes I put forward was urging developers to build on land already built on – genuine brownfield sites before considering our precious agricultural land and meadows. Here, in the District of Lewes, there are brownfield sites that have great potential in the towns of Lewes and Newhaven where there is a huge demand, especially for subsidised social housing. Our local housing demand should be considered within our Chailey Parish. Undoubtedly, there were thousands of similar minded people, together with the National Trust and the Campaign to Protect Rural England who put forward the same case as me.

Key concessions have been made: developers are urged to build on already built brownfield sites. The intrinsic value of the countryside (not just the protected areas such as the South Downs National Park, the Green Belt and our treasured Sites of Special Scientific Interest) has been recognized. But I still worry.

Chailey Commons – fencing, cattle grids

In the March Chailey News, I reported why there is a temporary give-way layout installed on Chailey Common. It is because residents living in close proximity asked for a solution to reduce the unacceptable levels of noise when a vehicle or motorbike crosses the cattle grids. We are responding to the problems the residents are experiencing and trying to help. Since this layout has been installed, local residents have reported a great improvement in noise and speed which is a positive outcome for them.

However, I have had e-mails and letters complaining about this temporary give-way layout and there are many that are unhappy with this proposal, suggesting it is hazardous and have asked for an explanation. Many are unaware that Romany Ridge and Pound Common will not be fenced and animals will be roaming – like Ashdown Forest and the New Forest. Many say there is no need to reduce the speed and see little benefit to the local people or visitors to the Common. Some say the scheme is a - “folly” and the give-way layout and grids should be removed. Others say they had no idea that Chailey Common was going to be fenced and grazed and have asked how it will be funded now and in the future. I have explained that at the Public Inquiry there were many that supported the scheme, including English Nature, Chailey Commons Society and DEFRA. There were also many local Chailey residents that objected strongly to the scheme. However, the scheme is now in place.

The Chailey Commons Management Committee has for a decade been instrumental in seeing this project through and has actively been part of the ‘consultation’ for fencing and grazing Chailey Common. For detailed information, please contact the Chairman of the Committee - Mr. John Smith.
