Nevertheless, the misdemeanour did shock me. When my husband was thirty five, sorry slip of the pen, five he used to 're-cycle' the penny return lemonade bottles from the yard at the back of the penny sweet shop and take them to the front for the one penny return, often. He says he did it all day and earned a good income, I expect he did it twice! Back to the apple and the tree.

The Vicar and Betty were taking their morning constitutional, admiring the bluebells, the morning and the two young deer who appeared from nowhere and blocked their path. One had tiny fuzzy antlers and was quite small, but on seeing Betty pulled himself up to full height and tried to look like Monarch of the Glen. Last month I briefly mention Norman Stevens and the notice boards he has made for St Peters, he was once a choirboy here and has a long connection, but we were not acquainted with him. He had a tracing from the original board that was here years ago and offered to make a copy. This he did and I would recommend you take time to look. The work is beautiful and depicts fishermen in a fishing boat, with nets and fish. Thank you Norman you are a true craftsman. The message on the board is a familiar one. 'Come follow me' Jesus said 'and I will make you fishers of men' Mark 1:17. If you want to experience God's blessing in a new way, get ready to leave your comfort zone. When Jesus called his disciples they were on familiar turf doing what they knew best, fishing. But they couldn't stay there and follow Him. Neither can you. The Bible records: 'As Jesus walked beside the sea of Galilee he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net for they were fishermen 'Come follow me,' Jesus said 'and I will make you fishers of men.' At once they left their nets and followed him vs 16-18. Notice they had to leave the security of the familiar in order to fulfil their destiny. And in

case you think you are too old to try something new, Abraham was seventy five when he left the comforts of home to go out and establish a new nation. Your age is not the issue, your faith is. Understand this: today you are just one step of obedience away from the next truth God wants you to learn about Him, so you can't afford to stay where you are. We all have the tendency to cling to the 'tried and true.' The trouble with that is, when you are no longer stretched you begin to shrink, you become complacent, you think you can handle things on your own, and you stop growing. That's a dangerous place to be. If you feel restless at heart today and believe that God has more for you than you've been settling for, then its time to confront your fears, walk through them and launch out into a new experience with Him. He will not leave your side.

Chailey joins the national celebrations and rings for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee while the Bonfire Society lights our Beacon as part of the chain of Beacons across the country.



### **Village Information Point**

There will be only Village Information Point session for June. This will be held on 12<sup>th</sup> June between 10.00 am and 12.00, at the Coffee Stop, Free Church, South Chailey.

**The Annual Parish Meeting** was held on 23<sup>rd</sup> April in the Parish Hall. Reports were presented by Police CSO Steve Knowles, ESCC Councillor Meg Stroude and LDC Councillor Sharon Davy. Commons Ranger, Crispin Kirkpatrick provided an informative update and reports were made on behalf of Chailey Sports Club and Chailey Youth Group. Parish Council Chairman Loraine Waller provided her annual report (shown in brief below), which was presented by Councillor Peter Olbrich:

*During the last 12 months the Parish Council has been very busy:*

- *Parish Clerk, Vera Grainger, organises the Village Information Point at the Free Church, South Chailey. The dates are detailed monthly in Chailey News.*
- *The Council supports Chailey Youth Group including funding the hire of the Parish Hall; and is considering ways to sustain the group in the future.*
- *We support Chailey News with an annual grant of a £2000 in recognition of its importance to village communication and information; and we operate our website: [www.chailey.org](http://www.chailey.org)*
- *We have awarded over the past year £5929 in small grants to village organizations.*
- *Plans for the Queens Jubilee are underway. The Parish Council has commissioned a souvenir ornamental map of Chailey.*
- *Chailey Commons fencing is near completion and we look forward to cattle and sheep grazing on the fenced Common.*
- *The Council through its meetings with ESCC Highways raises resident's issues. At the date of writing the Council is concerned about the delayed installation of 40mph limit on A275 northwards to Markstakes Lane and will monitor progress on limits to be installed along the A272/A275 before 2013.*
- *The Parish Council's Precept pays for regular maintenance of our village, including grass cutting to the greens around the village and the sports ground; & we help the Sports Club as much as we can. We also pay for tree surveys and the trimming and cutting of trees.*
- *We are a statutory consultee on planning applications and have given much time*

*and thought to the Gradwell Park Retirement Village application and to many similar if smaller applications during the year.*

- *Councillor Millam fitted new taps at our allotments which were stolen the next day; new cheaper replacement taps were also stolen. Through Chailey News and our website, we urge residents to lock their cars and premises securely.*
- *In the future we are hoping that s106 contributions from the New Heritage development will be used to install a crossing on A275 near to Mill Lane and provide a footpath for the residents of New Heritage along Warrs Hill Lane.*
- *The Pump House opposite the Horns Lodge is to be worked on by members of the Parish Council to convert it to a bus-shelter.*
- *Councillors will be considering how best to use windfall funds arising from the sale of St Mary's; and await with interest the result of the Sports Club bid for Lottery funding to rebuild the Pavilion.*

*I shall be stepping down at the Council's AGM in May. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all my fellow Councillors for their help and support throughout the year.*

**Road Closure** - A275 South Road will be closed to through traffic from Deadmantree Hill to Markstakes Lane. The diversion route will be via Deadmantree Hill, Town Littleworth Road and Markstakes Lane in both directions. For HGVs the road closure will extend from the A272 Haywards Heath Road to the A27. The Diversion route for HGVs will be via A272, A22 and A26 in both directions.

Access into properties for residents will be maintained, access should be arranged with the works supervisor or gatemen.

## **WATER COMPANIES - Temporary hosepipe ban**

The Environment Agency predicts that drought conditions and hosepipe bans could be with us until Christmas. It does seem hard to believe when we are looking at our drenched gardens and countryside as it's been raining relentlessly for the past month and we know that millions of litres of water leak away from water pipes.

Since becoming your District Councillor and a member of the Planning Committee, I have often questioned why water companies are not statutory consultees as far as planning matters and, in particular, when large development applications are put forward. Our resources - or lack of them are stretched and not taken into consideration. The greatest pressure on the water system is going to be population growth, particularly in the southeast – already the most water-stressed part of the country. I was surprised to learn, when I contacted our local water companies that the water industry has been lobbying for statutory consultee status for around 10 years. I support this aim – it must make sense when considering future planning proposals.

Developers could maybe consider housing developments in Belgian and France. They have underground tanks that collect rainwater for use in gardens, although watering our gardens only accounts for 7% of consumption.

Small, rural housing developments for our local people are important to retain a vibrant village and help local families stay in Chailey, but over-development puts pressure on resources, creates more cars on our busy roads and can urbanise our rural villages. Most Chailey residents that I speak with want to preserve our rural environment
