

Dear friends,

I feel that I have to use this space in my letter to explain the situation concerning the Churchyards at St Peters and St Mary's. You will have seen the notices about the removal of certain items that are not permitted in Churchyards and I am sorry if this has caused any offence or sadness, but we are caught between a rock and a hard place. The rules for Churchyards are very specific and give us no leeway, they are rules issued by the Church of England and enforced by the Diocese of Chichester and they are different from a local authority cemetery regulations. There is a misconception that when someone is buried in a Church of England Churchyard or have their ashes interred that part of the cost of the funeral is to buy a plot that the person then owns, this is not true, Churchyards are private property and what is being paid for is permission to be buried on that private land owned by the CofE.

We as a parish are responsible for implementing the regulations and unfortunately things have been allowed to slip over a period of time and we really need to bring things back in order. That is what we are attempting to do. We have no wish to cause offence to anyone. The rules issued by the Diocese of Chichester, are as follows.

Chancellor's General Directions Concerning Churches and Churchyards dated Easter 2007, page 23 states:

#### PROHIBITIONS

For the avoidance of doubt, the following are not permitted:

1. kerbs, railings, fencing or chippings as they create difficulty when mowing;
2. memorials in the shape of vases, hearts, open books;
3. memorials incorporating photographs or portraits;
4. momentoes, windmills, toys or little animals;
5. the use of 'pet names'
6. artificial flowers;

#### Notes

The Incumbant has no authority to permit the erection of a memorial which does not comply with these regulations.

I know that we are plagued by rabbits in both Churchyards which can make it very frustrating when you want to place flowers on a loved ones grave, but that is the nature of rural Churchyards I am afraid and there is little we can do about it.

I hope this explanation is helpful.

**Village Information Point:** The Village Information Point sessions are held on Friday mornings at the Coffee Stop, Free Church, South Chailey. In May sessions will be held on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> May and Friday 24<sup>th</sup> May between 10.00 am and 12.00.

**Small Grants Scheme:** The deadline for applications for 'small grants' under the Parish Council's small grants scheme is 30<sup>th</sup> June 2013 and requests received by the Parish Council office by this date will be considered at the Council meeting on 16th July 2013. A Grant Application Form is available on request to the parish office or can be downloaded from the community website [www.chailey.org](http://www.chailey.org) or by contacting the Clerk.

**Parish Allotments:** The Parish Council owns several allotment plots at North Chailey. At its meeting held in February the Council agreed to increase allotment rents to £40.00 per year. Rents were last increased in 2010. It was necessary to increase the rents as the charges have not covered the administration and other expenses of managing the allotment site. There is a waiting list for allotment plots but this has recently reduced as some plots have been relinquished or are now being shared. If you wish to be added to the waiting list please contact the Clerk.

**Damage to Parish Council Property:** The roof of the brick bus shelter opposite Mill Lane, South Chailey has been damaged for the second time. The damage on this occasion is more extensive and the Parish Council will have to meet the uninsured losses. At the same time the community notice board on the wall of the bus shelter was also damaged. There has also been a theft of a water butt at the allotment site. Please report any suspicious activity to the Police on 0845 60 70 99 or 101.

**Highways:** The Parish Council met with Highways on March 20. Highways confirmed their intention to introduce a 40mph speed-limit on the A275 North of the King's Head to Warren Way, but said the proposed limit on the A272 at Pellingbridge was still the object of discussions with West Sussex CC.

A preliminary report by residents of Cinder Hill was presented: in this context Highways explained that all roads were subject to an assessment which included physical and environmental characteristics, traffic flows, and accident records to arrive at a point-score which was a guide to any improvements needed.

Highways later presented the preliminary design for the footpath along Warrs Hill to the A275, but observed that, as the footpath will pass over common land, an application would need to be made to the Secretary of State; Highways anticipate that it will be 2014 before the administrative process can be completed.

A student was injured in an accident when crossing the A272 last year to catch the Chailey School coach. Since that time a number of solutions have been explored, including warning signs which will be in place by the early summer. Further measures are restricted by financial constraints, and so the Parish Council has agreed in principle to make up to £10,000 available to build a pedestrian refuge in the area of Lower Station Road to assist bus travellers to cross the busy A272. This is subject to further investigation by Highways to establish viability, both financial and in terms of road safety. The meeting also considered at length the situation at Plum Tree x-roads where

neighbouring properties had requested the Parish Council's assistance in solving a problem of noise. Highways explained that North Common Freeholders, main owners of the southern commons, had wanted to unite the southern commons and not see them fenced separately. Before and since installing cattle-grids as part of the fencing project, the County Council had consulted other Authorities and the Transport Research Laboratory. Recent tests showed that both speed and noise had been reduced. It was now proposed to make the chicanes permanent after public consultation. In discussion the Parish Council proposed a meeting between the parties at which the results could be tabled – it was essential to show that delivery would be to an acceptable standard.

**Annual Parish Meeting:** The Annual Parish Meeting was held on 29<sup>th</sup> April. Further details of the Chairman's report will be included in the June issue of Chailey News.

**Bin collections in May:** there are two bank holidays in May i.e. there will be no collection on Monday May 6 and Monday May 27. Please note that bin collections will be one day later than usual in those weeks. This includes the normal Friday collection which will be made on Saturdays May 11 and June 1.

**Diary Reminder:** A Planning & Environs Committee Meeting will be held on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> May and the Annual Council Meeting will be held on Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> May, both meetings at the Reading Room, Chailey Green commencing at 7.30 p.m. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

CYG is entering its 7th successful year of providing a safe place for young people ages 10-15 to meet and socialise.


