Dear Chailey residents,

It could have been a tragedy that reverberated around the Church of England for evermore. It would have been spoken about, in hushed tones, at many PCC meetings. Not since the Reformation would the name of St Peter's, Chailey, been mentioned so many times. Put the kettle on and I will tell you why.

Last week the Vicar had to have new surgery on his broken ankle, as it was still causing him much pain and discomfort, two years on from his Betty accident. So it is back to the crutches, and the workload in the Rectory had to be re-organised, our granddaughter became a source of great strength and helped all she could, as and when. Betty on the other hand sank into a deep depression, she feels used. One day I found her being 'walked' up and down the hall, on her feet were a pair of child's pink wellingtons they were too small and she will probably be left with a 1960's bunion. "I'm walking her for you Gran," was the offer of explanation. In the garden the following day, I saw her at "Hickstead Horse Show" with a toy monkey strapped to her back hoping for a clear round. "This is very good for her Gran, she loves jumping over the hoe and spade." Finally I found them in the rain, both wearing rain coats. "She hasn't had a pee yet Granny," "No" was my reply, 'because you have tied the belt up between her legs, but thank you for trying. Poor Betty, I've lost count of the times I've seen her wearing my reading glasses.

Back to the near tragedy.

Our granddaughter loves to practice for the Tour de France and cycles round and round our drive. She thinks the yellow jersey would suit her and its in her sights. On Friday last I called her for Supper and as she walked down the hall, nearly falling over the discarded bunion crunching pink wellies, she said 'I've locked the Church Gran, all's well.' But it wasn't, my heart raced and I felt a little dizzy and I heard myself say quietly, "its choir practice tonight you've locked them in they will all be dead by the morning, when they are discovered (by me, because I unlock,) I suppose they could eat the food from the Families Support worker box, but there will be no milk for coffee or cereals and what if they run out of air, but there is always the communion wine and that will help them sleep, but they will be cold. They will have to huddle together and maybe find a blanket or coat in the clothes collected for Emmaus project in Brighton." So many thoughts so many dreads! She ran back to the Church very quickly and unlocked it and I don't think anyone ever knew. She was trying to help me and I love her and value her for all her efforts. She was trying to serve, in the Bible it says "Whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant" Mark 10:43.

"DISNEYLAND" is referred to as 'the Magic Kingdom.' For those who work there, one value is emphasised above all others. It's what put the 'magic' into that kingdom. What is it? Servanthood! Employees are told that when you walk through those gates, you serve. You treat every encounter with people as if they were your personal guest. If they need directions you escort them. If they ask a question you've heard a hundred times, you answer it as if you'd never heard it before. There's a ride called the Jungle Cruise, and the most common question asked about it, 'How long is the ride?' So the staff is given a prepared standard answer. 'The Jungle Cruise is an exciting adventure ride that lasts ten minutes.' But one employee had been asked it once too often, so when the couple asked, 'How long is the Jungle Cruise?' he said 'Three days.' The couple got out of the line,

left the park, went to the Disney Hotel where they were on honeymoon, packed up their suitcases, checked out, and came back to the line at the Jungle Cruise. The next day the Disneyland employee was gone and someone else was standing at the line saying, 'The Jungle Cruise is an exciting adventure ride that lasts ten minutes.' When you represent God's Kingdom you're supposed to go out of your way to facilitate people, love them and meet their needs. Why? Because Jesus, Who is the king in his kingdom, said, 'the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve,' (Matthew 20:28).

By the way, we got to Court and we thank God that our granddaughter's voice was heard, she is going to live with us until she is 18 and she asked me to write a P.S. to this newsletter. She said 'Gran will you tell them I haven't got sad eyes anymore.?' She has now got a secure future and at 10 she is busy planning her first holiday job when she goes to University. "Shall I work in a pet shop or shall I work in the kennels Gran?" "If you take my reading glasses off of Betty's nose we will look on line Daisy."

DISTRICT NEWS – YOUR IDEAS

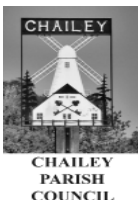
By the time you read my monthly note, a copy of the Lewes District News – autumn edition will have been delivered to your home.

The Council would like everyone to have their say, as far as the entire District's management of parks, gardens, planting, playing fields and open spaces. This gives us a democratic chance to air our views. Chailey, along with all the other villages within the District receive very little funding compared with our towns: Lewes (town), Newhaven, Seaford, Telescombe and Peacehaven. But our Parish Councils do a great job - and this is only achieved by talented members of our communities giving their valuable time free and representing our interests as best they can with limited resources.

Naturally, this excludes Chailey Common, a Site of Special Scientific Interest and one of the largest areas of open heathland left in Sussex. The District Council has a statutory duty within the Commons Act, 1899, as well as the Scheme made on 18th June 1915 for the regulation and management of the Commons. It is not optional - only an Act of Parliament can alter this position.

Village Information Point

The Village Information Point sessions are held on Friday mornings at the Coffee Stop, Free Church, South Chailey. In October sessions will be held on Friday 11th October and Friday 25th October between 10.00 am and 12.00.

Meeting with ESCC Highways:

The Parish Council held its quarterly meeting with East Sussex County Council Highways on September 10th. Matters discussed at that meeting included:

- ESCC was asked to consider how to ensure bus companies liaise to agree more effective transfer timings. An example was presented, and it is a difficult problem, requiring East and West local authorities to liaise 'cross-border' and to recognise the importance to passengers of being able to travel to Haywards Heath and also to the Princess Royal Hospital.
- Highways followed up earlier discussion about the difficulties faced by students crossing the A272 to take the School bus each morning, and

presented an initial design. This showed the complexity of the project to locate a pedestrian refuge between the two bus-stops nearest to Lower Station Road. In particular, the road would need to be widened to accommodate a pedestrian refuge. The net effect is to double the cost of the original estimate, and Highways agreed to research alternative solutions – unfortunately there are not many! but suggestions include possible installation of warning lights, or re-routing the School coaches. Parish Councillors will discuss the project ahead of the next meeting with Highways.

- Highways have already erected two warning signs, marked School, to alert motorists to the presence of children.
- The Parish Council as landowner confirmed that it agreed the route and surface treatment proposed for a footpath alongside Warrs Hill between the New Heritage and the A275. Highways have had agreement from other landowners and will now proceed to prepare the documents for public consultation.

Refurbishment of Reading Room, Chailey Green

Work is currently under way to refurbish the exterior of the Reading Room. The Reading Room has had a variety of uses over time including a shelter for animals but is currently used for a wide variety of community activities from textile and craft groups; a meeting place for local groups and societies; Pilates and Yoga; a stop off for cycle clubs and rambles; children's parties and even a book club. It is of course also the meeting room for Council meetings. The repair work will be completed in the next few weeks with the minimum of interruption to users, but the Council apologizes for any inconvenience which may be caused.

War Memorial, Chailey Green - Photographs of Chailey Green taken shortly after the war memorial was erected, show sheep grazing peacefully amongst tall grass on Chailey Green; with a short mown grass area just around the war memorial. The Council is proposing to have the war memorial cleaned and would be interested in hearing from anyone who has a relative named on the monument. The Council would like to compile a record to mark the 100th anniversary of WWI, which occurs next year. Please contact the Clerk if you have any information.

Diary Reminder: A Planning & Environs Committee Meeting will be held on Tuesday 1st October and there will be a Full Council Meeting held on 15th October; both meetings held in the Reading Room at Chailey Green starting at 7.30pm. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

A quick reminder that the clocks go back 1 hour on the 27th October.

It was the beginning of the Autumn on the 22nd September, so the night sky is now visible for longer than daytime. There are plenty of things to look at with just your eyes at this time of year. One of the jewels of the Autumn and Winter skies is the early rising Pleiades cluster.

Easily visible even from towns, I remember looking at this cluster as a child before bedtime. I had a couple of books on Astronomy then, but that was it. As we learnt last month, even the nearby stars are a long long way away, and it takes many hundreds of years for any movement to be seen by the naked eye. When you look at the night sky, it is almost completely unchanged from what your distant ancestor saw several thousand years ago.

Finding the Pleiades is very easy. As do all objects, it rises from the East, and at 22:00 it is about 15 degrees above the horizon in the East. Look for a loose group of bright stars about the distance between your first and little fingers above the horizon.

I can pick out 6 bright stars easily myself, and some say that they can see 7 or even eight, but in reality this is a nearby cluster of hot middle-aged stars about 100 million years old. These stars live fast and die young, and are expected to last for only another 150 million years.

This cluster has been around so long, and is so noticeable in the night sky that there are legends and stories covering most cultures of the world. The Celts associated the cluster with tears and mourning, whereas the Greeks associated them with the seven daughters of the titan Atlas and his wife Pleione, which is how the principal stars are named today. Maia was the eldest, and Merope the youngest.

Chailey Police Report

Burglary - There have been burglaries reported to have taken place in the Chailey area and surrounds where offenders have mainly targeted high value tools (leaf blowers etc). Sussex Police encourage residents to take measures to protect your items. Take photos and serial numbers of your items and see them out of sight and well secured. Crime prevention advice is available from your local officer.

Vehicle crime - Vehicle crime unfortunately continues to be a problem across the district. Chailey has suffered a high level of this in the rural car parks. Please remember to remove all valuables from your vehicle when it is not in use and especially in rural car parks. Handbags are the more common item to be stolen but sat navs and other valuable items have also been reported to have been stolen.

Oil theft - We are receiving a number of calls relating to the theft of heating oil. If you have a heating oil tank please take measures to secure it and protect it against possible tampering. If you would like advice on how to do this please contact your local officer.

Grazing animals - There have been a large number of calls to police recently regarding cows and sheep on Beggars wood road and North common road. These animals are grazing and will often be seen on the road. Drivers are encouraged to use caution when driving along these roads and avoid further calls to police regarding this matter.

Community messaging - Community messaging is a new communication method which has been put in place to update members of the community on what is happening in your local area. Regular emails are sent out to members of this service. If you would be interested in this service please contact PCSO Knowles for more information.

Op Crackdown - Op Crackdown has been put in place to allow members of the public to report Anti-social driving or abandoned vehicles easily without having to use the switchboard. The system has recently had a makeover and is very quick to use. To make a report on Op Crackdown simply visit - www.operationcrackdown.org.

Community Speedwatch - Some may have seen that Community Speedwatch has recently gone live in Chailey with a number of volunteers giving their time to try and make the village safer. Further volunteers are welcome and will receive training upon request to join. Contact your local officer for more details.

The Friends Of Newick Health Centre

We are looking into the possibility of installing defibrillators in Chailey. It is crucial to stress that defibrillators are not hard to use: you do not need any specialist training at all. The aim is that anyone can pick one up from its position in Chailey and follow the simple instructions in the event of a person nearby having a cardiac arrest. Every minute someone is in cardiac arrest their chances of survival decrease by 14% (BHF data) so early intervention with Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and a defibrillator is critical in the vital minutes before an ambulance crew arrive at the scene. Unfortunately The Friends do not have sufficient funds to purchase these units, so subject to an agreement at our next Committee meeting we shall have to start fund raising and we hope that Chailey residents will fully support us. In the next Chailey magazine (November) I will be in a position to update you on this matter.
