Dear residents of Chailey,

By the time the magazine reaches you we at St Peter's along with the millions of Christians throughout the world will have celebrated Easter where we remember the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The season of Lent which is 40 days from Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday is a time of reflection and spiritual preparation to celebrate what Christ did for us on the Cross. I found this reflection which I hope will help you understand who Jesus is and why he came.

Reflection

A knock on the door reminded me I must get round to fixing that bell! The words, '*That will be £6 please, sir,*' were my first indication that we had our own window cleaner. My extremely rare forays into the world of water and chamois leather were, mercifully, at an end !

The experience set me thinking about windows and the properties of glass. I remember, as a child, being somewhat mystified by the question, 'Is your father a glazier?' whenever I stood in someone's way - especially because everyone knew he was a steel fixer and bar bender! He, in turn, was incensed by one of the few items of history he had acquired during his short school career that, in the past, people had felt it necessary to brick up windows because of the iniquitous 'Window Tax' - a tax on daylight!

However, all is not gloom - for glass and its properties have been used as powerful Christian symbols by many writers. Paul, in his wonderful passage in 1 . Corinthians 13 about the gift of love, looking forward to that, '*which is perfect to come,*' explains, '*For now we see through a glass darkly, but then face to face. Now I know in part but then shall I know even as also I am known.*' Similarly, George Herbert in his hymn, 'Teach me my God and King ,' used glass to illustrate the choices we can make in response to God's revelation:

*A man may look on glass
On it may stay his eye;
Or, if he pleaseth, through it pass
And then the heaven espy.*

I have always been struck by how simple, yet how clear, this analogy is. Of course, had I taken more notice of the fourth verse, I would have realised that even cleaning windows should have been a real joy - if approached in the right frame of mind!

*A servant with this clause
Makes drudgery divine,
Who sweeps a room, as for thy laws.
Makes that and the action fine.*

People approach the divinity of Christ in many ways. For some, it is expressed in the story of the Virgin Birth or in the miracles or in the Passion and Resurrection. The theologian, Paul Tillich approached it from, seemingly, the other end of the scale. For him, it was

Jesus' total humility, selflessness and openness to God's will that made Him divine. To explain this, he used the symbolism of transparency. For Tillich, Jesus was so utterly selfless and open to God's will that he became, as it were, transparent, so that God was revealed through Him in a unique, once and for all, way.

Thomas Merton, a 20th century contemplative Christian writer, in his book, 'New Seeds of Contemplation', attempts to set out for us the mystery of Christ using the imagery of the magnifying glass:

As a magnifying glass concentrates the rays of the sun into a little burning knot of heat that can set fire to a dry leaf or a piece of paper, so the mystery of Christ in the gospel concentrates the rays of God's light and fire to a point that sets fire to the spirit of man. And this is why Christ was born and lived in the world and died and returned from death and ascended to his father in heaven. Through the glass of His incarnation, He concentrates the rays of His Divine Truth and Love upon us so that we feel the burn, and all mystical experience is communicated to men through the Man Christ .

It would appear from these passages that, not only can glass illuminate our everyday lives, but it may also act as a symbol that can illuminate our spiritual lives.

As for me, perhaps it's time I got around to having a look at that bell, now that our new window cleaner has freed up some of my time!

I hope that you have had a Happy Easter

A call to prayers

We have come at this time to a vital moment in the world war. Our hearts are full. The peril strengthens us in firm knit purpose and stern resolve that God helping us the cause of righteousness and truth, the cause of liberty and future peace shall not at our hands suffer loss, that the blood of our dearest and most honoured dead shall not have been spilt in vain but shall be the see of fresh life to the peoples of the world. Let these anxious days send us daily, hourly to our knees.

Note: The 1918 Spring Offensive or Kaiserschlacht (Kaiser's Battle), was a series of German attacks along the Western Front during the First World War, beginning on 21 March 1918. In a statement to the House of Commons on April 25th Winston Churchill then Minister of Munitions said: 'We have had very heavy losses in captures by the enemy, we have lost nearly 1,000 guns by shell fire and between 4000-5,000 machine guns lost or destroyed.' Dark days indeed.

Chailey and District Horticultural Society

In conjunction with the W.I, we had a very successful Great Chailey Bake Off and I would like to thank all those who organised it and took part.

The St. George's Day Fete is on the 21st April. The Horticultural Society is going to have a big display to try and attract new members. This will include an Any Questions on Gardening topics so please come and support this big local event.

Now to the garden. April is a month when things really get busy. The soil is starting to warm up; the days are getting longer and the sun has real warmth. The risk of frost is greatly reduced and the chances of sub zero temperatures even in an unheated greenhouse is very low. So with a little care and a close watch on the forecast tender plants should survive in the greenhouse. Hence tomatoes can be planted in the greenhouse border. Add a little lime and magnesium sulphate granules along with wood ash and soot (which is said to be good for flavour). Peppers, chillies and aubergines can be potted on. Now is the time to plant tomato seed for outside plants. Over recent years blight has become an annual problem and Bordeaux Mixture has been withdrawn, I therefore only grow blight resistant varieties (such as Mountain Magic and crimson crush) outside . Sow in the greenhouse pumpkin , marrow, courgette, cucumber and sweet corn. It is also possible to plant runner and French beans for planting out later when all fear of frost has passed. Outside directly sow lettuce, beetroot, spring onion, carrots and parsnips. Time also to plant second early potatoes and ensure first earlies are well earth -up for protection from frost.

Weed round fruit trees and add a little fertiliser and mulch around the base. May is the month to prune stone bearing fruits such as plum, damson , peach and apricot Remove dead heads from daffodils and sprinkle a little fertiliser round the base to ensure good flowering next year. Allow the foliage to die down naturally.

Don't forget the plant sale outside the Horns Lodge on Saturday 19h May from 10am to 12.

Just when you think it is going to be spring soon, look what happened to the weather. The cold Siberian blast really came with a blanket effect and produced those low temperatures and coverings of snow. Whilst it looked lovely it was difficult to keep warm if you ventured out, so the return of the southerly warmer air stream was most welcome.

The earlier wet spell had delayed the progress on the further work of scrapes on Memorial Common to extend and link the existing ones which have now produced the lovely carpet of heather for the future. Work has also continued on Romany Ridge and Red House to

remove some of the tree growth. Summer grazing is being considered again – watch for further information on the relative local websites.

The excellent time, effort and dedication by volunteers and the Ranger and team for the pond work on the commons has been recognised by an award, from the Freshwater Habitats Trust, of a certificate 'People, Ponds and Water Freshwater Champion' to recognise the understanding and support of our water habitats. Well done to all those involved. We want to continue this theme next year as 'Year of the Pond 2019'.

This month starts with the Easter time and there will be a new moon on Sunday 15th rising to a full moon on Sunday 29th. I am sure that gardeners appreciate the significance of this and will be sowing and planting for the 16th onwards. Try it and see, the moon's powers are not to be underestimated. Also, St George's Day is on Monday 23rd so flags at the ready to celebrate our Patron Saint on our national day.

Our meetings continue this month with our Bird Walk, led by Ian Woolsey, on Memorial Common on Saturday 7th April starting at the car park at 9.15.a.m. We also have an invitation from Kevin and Carole Uridge to see the spring lambs at Townings Farm, Plumpton Lane behind Pound Common between 2.00.p.m. and 4.00.p.m. Group visits to the lambing barn from the farm shop area. Advice should, of course, be taken for pregnancy, allergy and other health issues before farm visits.

Since last summer I have complained about the Red House Common car park and asked Lewes District Council to fulfil their legal obligations of carrying out the necessary works. I stated that it isn't an option – it is the legal duty of the Council to carry out these works. They are responsible for the bye-laws.

Since then, on a regular basis, I have continued to ask for works to be done. I can report that my request has been successful and works will hopefully be scheduled middle or late March (weather depending).

I have also taken the opportunity of inviting our new Downland and Reserves Advisor to join me on a walk on Chailey Commons so she can learn more about our treasured heathland.

APPEAL DECISION – Buckles Wood Field North Chailey

This appeal has been dismissed by the Inspector.
The Inspector concluded that there is a 5 year supply of housing.

Many residents and our Parish Council made strong representations and these played a large part in the decision.

There are many reasons for the Inspector's overall conclusions, but he did not see that the benefits of the development outweighed the identified harm and are not material considerations of sufficient weight to outweigh the conflict with the development plan.

ZAHA HADID Architectural Superstar

Dame Zaha Mohammad Hadid DBE RA was an Iraqi-British architect. Described by the Guardian as 'the Queen of Curve' she was the first woman to be awarded the Pritzker Architecture Prize, in 2004. She also received the UK's most prestigious architectural award, the Stirling Prize, in 2010 and 2011. Her major works include the aquatic centre for the London 2012 Olympics and the Guangzhou Opera House in China.

Colin Davies the lecturer is an architect and a former editor of the Architects' Journal. Until recently he was Professor of Architectural Theory at London Metropolitan University and he has made numerous TV and radio appearances. He has also written many books including 'Key Houses of the Twentieth Century'.
