

This year in the Churches calendar we are following the Gospel of Matthew, and the more I read the more I realise that Jesus did not stay in one place very often.

For many August is a month of transition, a changing of times and places, plans are made to start new schools, universities, Gap years, new jobs, and for some to retire, and did you know that August is the most popular month to move house in the UK.

Change can be challenging, and moving often comes with an element of excitement but it can also come with more than its fair share of anxiety and fear.

For those of us who choose the way of the Christian faith, being a follower of Jesus can often mean moving out of our circles of comfort and going to other places – geographically, culturally, economically, spiritually.

Because if there is one thing Jesus did, it is that he went – out of his home, out of his town, out of his community – to engage with other cultures and people, to listen and dignify their stories, no matter their culture or station in life.

Jesus was a listener and witness to outcasts and sinners, drinkers and tax collectors, strangers, and foreigners, the rich and the poor. He uplifted women who were considered by the society of the time of being unequal to men. He dignified people of other faiths or no faith at all and showed them the values of the Kingdom of God, through his teaching, through his healing, through his listening, and through his meeting them where they were and putting love into action.

For those of us with a Christian faith, the Scriptures teach us that it is also our mission to go out into the world and put the love that we have learnt into action. As the writer of John's Gospel quotes Jesus, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And as the first letter of John tells us, "Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action."

Sadly, for millennia the leaders of many religions have failed to put love into action and have used their doctrine and dogma for exactly the opposite of love.

Christians, and followers of many other faiths too are called to be ready to make the commitment

to go beyond our own boundaries.

As a Christian I am called to listen, to love and serve, to use my gifts in the struggle for dignity and justice for my neighbour and for people who are outside my comfort zone?

Do I always get it right, of course I don't!

But does that mean that I can't try again, and again, and again. Of course, it doesn't.

For some of us August will be a month when we need to be ready to challenge ourselves to forge new friendships, open ourselves up to new perspectives, and build bridges where once there were walls?

As the writer of Hebrews tells us: "Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God."

We are called to give freely of our resources, our stories and experiences, our time, and our attention.

And we are called to invite others into this way of Love, and when we do, we bless ourselves in the process.

Have a great month, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.

One Hundred and more Years Ago

From the Parish Leaflet for August 1913

August 6th – A delightful Garden Fete took place on this date at Warrenwood kindly lent for the purpose by Mr and Mrs Green. It was organised by the Chailey Girls' Club with the object of raising funds to furnish the newly erected Parish Room.

The grounds at Warrenwood are admirably suitable for such an event being spacious and having picturesque surroundings. A thunderstorm threatened early afternoon but happily it passed away and fine weather prevailed. There was plenty to interest the visitors with competitions galore including hat trimming for men and twelve couples taking part in a tennis tournament.

In the midst of sylvan scenery ladies in fancy attire gave attractive entertainments. Students from the Ladies School of Gardening at Glynde appeared in 'Chairs to Mend' the Misses Kay, Kenward and Cripps of Newick presented 'Lavender, sweet lavender,' and the following members of the Chailey Girls' Club, Mrs Wilson, the Misses Margaret Blencowe, Margaret Cotesworth, Beatrice Bunt, Evelyn Beard and Winnie Homewood, were seen to advantage in 'Buy a Broom.'

Note: In 1902 Frances Garnet Wolseley set up Glynde College for lady Gardeners. She pioneered horticulture as a profession for women, publishing Gardening for Women in 1908, Women on the Land in 1916 and later promoted professional training in garden design.

Chailey Commons Society

Our Nightjar patrol continued in June and early July. Successful soundings and sightings were heard and achieved, and they have made appearances on most commons which is good news. Thank you to those interested people whom we have met on the commons and for showing an interest in these rather unusual night flying birds.

The wildlife refuges on Red House and Memorial Common commons have continued to provide a valuable area for the ground nesting birds such as woodlark, chiff chaff and nightjar to successfully raise their young, by minimising disturbance from dogs and people. We shall be removing the signs shortly and thank you for respecting the marked areas.

Chailey Commons Society has robustly defended our much-loved Local Nature Reserve from two proposals to build substations at the main access points to Romany Ridge and Memorial Commons. The Open Spaces Society also gave evidence against these proposals in which UK Power Networks is attempting to site substations on open, common land that is LNR and in one case, also SSSI.

The Society objected strongly to the plans since the initial public notices in May 2022 through to the Public Hearing held on 6th & 7th June 2023, in front of the Defra Planning Inspector Mr. Mark Yates in Newick Village Hall. The Society has set out several alternative solutions including on private land outside the commons and is now looking at next steps to take with the landowners, its members, and the many supporters in the local community.

Cattle are now grazing on Red House Common having moved up from the lower commons. Please let Andy Mitchell, the Countryside Officer know if any are signs are missing. Please also report any issues with gates or fences to him by email Andy.Mitchell@eastsussex.gov. uk. If there are any problems with the cattle, please report this to the farmer directly on 07710 031820.

We are looking for a new pony checker to join our team who monitor the four Exmoor ponies on Red House Common daily. Each person checks them two days a month – whatever the weather! Chailey's Community Harvest Flower Festival!

You may remember our item in May Chailey News regarding the above Community Festival. To remind you, it referred to our Harvest weekend, 6th to 8th October when we are planning a Community Harvest Flower Festival.

Invites were circulated and many replies received, however if you were one and have NOT replied yet, there is still time.

Your group can get involved in either of 3 ways: - you don't have to be a flower arranger!

- 1) Your group/organisation can arrange a display Friday morning in situ.
- Your group/organisation can bring a pre-arranged display to fill the allocated space.

Chailey Horticultural Society

We had a very enjoyable summer show on 15th July. As usual the general standard of exhibits was very high and despite the difficult weather conditions a good number of entries. Our problem remains attracting visitors in the afternoon to appreciate the effort and skills of the exhibitors. Our Autumn Show is on the 9th September in the village hall so please come and enjoy a pleasant relaxing afternoon in convivial company and consume cakes and tea.

We now have a hose pipe ban and I see no prospect of this being lifted until well into the autumn. All saved rain water is long gone so most of the water used will be mains water which can be too cold if used directly on to hot plants. The same applies to water from wells. So if possible fill a few watering cans and leave them standing for a couple of hours to warm up.

It is tempting to water potatoes but the ingredients in mains water often produce a rather scabby skin though the tubers are quite safe to eat. Alternatively waste domestic water can be used provided not too much soap or detergent has been used.

Cut down the raspberry canes that have fruited to ground level and tie in the new canes for next year. Ensure autumn fruiting canes are well supported and stop once they reach about six feet.

Continue tidying up the strawberries and securing runners to replace any that are more than four years old.

Regularly check brassicas for caterpillars and remove any brown or diseased leaves. Start harvesting early main crop potatoes and I fear because of the drought be prepared to be disappointed!

Tomatoes both inside and outside will be ripening and remove the lower leaves to allow better sunlight penetration.

Aphids can be a real problem on greenhouse aubergines and sweet peppers. I clear them with a jet of water and don't forget to look on the underside of the leaves.

Spray the leaves of greenhouse cucumbers to deter red spider mite but keep the leaves of marrows and courgettes dry to avoid fungal problems. Don't let courgettes get bigger than about four inches since once they start to produce seeds they will stop forming new fruit.

Sow winter lettuce for either growing in the open or under cover. Try winter density, artic king, winter gem or Brighton!

Keep runner beans well watered and pick regularly to ensure continued cropping. If you have a surplus I strongly recommend runner bean chutney!

We all know that things are tough for people at the moment on the back of high energy bills over the winter and the cost of food and fuel also hitting pockets hard. While the Government helped over the winter by paying half of everyone's energy bills and the cost of fuel dropping since Christmas, inflation remains stubbornly high and interest rates have had to go up to try and manage this. Both for renters and mortgage holders, this is having a big impact on the monthly budget at home and I am seeing the impact of this in my local Surgeries across the constituency from Ringmer to East Dean.

That is why the government met with banks recently to put in place the following measures to help those struggling with their repayments. Firstly, anyone struggling with mortgage payments can now safely talk to their lender without fear of it affecting their credit rating and for those who have started to miss payments there is now a 12-month delay in place before any repossession can take place which gives people time to get repayment plans back on track.

One of the biggest issues is for those coming off fixed rate deals who will be hit by the new higher interest rates and so it is now possible for people to lock in a deal six months ahead of a fixed term coming to an end so they can shop around to get the best deal available and not have to accept whatever is on offer when their fixed rate comes to an end. It will also be possible for those people in this situation to switch to a completely new mortgage deal including switching to interest only for six months to help reduce monthly payments for a short period.

Inflation is expected to fall before the end of the year which will mean interest rates will start to stabilise but it is important to support people over the coming months until this happens.

Yes – Chailey Repair Café celebrates 5 years of fixing your stuff this August!!

None of us thought when we first opened our doors on 11th August 2018 that we would grow so quickly and achieve so much. In those days there were only 2 other Repair Cafes in East Sussex – now there are over 20 in West & East Sussex, with more springing up all the time...

We have now attempted more than 4000 repairs, including over 400 during the Covid lockdown, when we carried on repairing your items in our homes and our work has been the subject of numerous articles in the local press and radio. None of that could have been possible without the support of the local community and of course the tireless work of our 36 hard working volunteers – they are simply the best!

We now have a huge stock of specialist tools and many spares which enable us to tackle some really obscure items – as long as you can carry it, we'll look at it! (But no microwaves please – they have a dangerous bite!!)

Chailey Repair Café is part of a world-wide movement where volunteer experts repair things free of charge – although a donation towards running costs is invited. Anyone can bring along broken items or clothing needing repair from home, and have a cuppa and a cake and then watch while your repair is done in front of you..

You'll find us at St Peter's Church, Chailey on the A275 at Chailey Green normally on the second Saturday of each month (8th July, 12th August, 9th September and so on) between 1000hrs and 1300hrs where we have a full Café service including our legendary cakes!

Memories of Chailey Past

Over the years my mother, Margaret Coles (nee Hobden), has kept many of us amused with her stories of life as a young girl in Chailey. I have been gathering her stories and memories together in one place and thought it would be a good idea to let the current residents of a Chailey have a glimpse into the past. Many of the stories will have 'evolved' over the years but I hope they will give a flavour of Chailey village life 80 or 90 years ago.

Mum was born at Neal's Farm on 18th July 1925 to Fred and Anne Hobden. Hobdens have probably been in Chailey for over 400 years. The family has been traced back to Ricardus de Hopeden, who bought lands in the manor of Firle in 1296. The family had a well-established business using steam lorries and traction engines to work on the roads in winter and help with the harvest in summer.

The firm employed about 20 men, 3 or 4 of whom lived permanently in vans hooked behind the traction engine and trailer. When they went threshing or road making, they just hitched them up and went off. The wagons also took water to houses that were not connected to the mains. The Heritage was one of these and, as a result, mum and her cousins were invited to the Christmas parties there. The vehicles were all kept

'down the yard' which used to be Snells, but is now Woodburn, I think. As well as her father's workshop there was a forge and carpenters' workshop. After mum was born, her grandfather (James Hobden, we'll come back to him later) had 2 bungalows built down the yard; one for her family and one for Uncle Jim's family. Mum remembers her grandparents living at the top of the lane and her granny keeping a strict eye over visitors! There was just one water boiler between the 2 houses so Saturday evenings a pot of water was boiled on the range and mum sat in the bath in front of the range.

Now back to her grandfather; he always had a bit of an eye for the ladies and eventually ran off with the maid. When he died he left everything to her, including the firm, so her dad and Uncle Jim had to buy it back. Her grandmother's grave, Philly Hobden, is by the entrance to St Mary's. However, her grandfather is in there too but not mentioned on the headstone. He just gets an elbow in the ribs from Philly in perpetuity.

Mum was in the church choir, Sunday School and went to school in South Chailey. Her memories of the school are that Miss Longhurst, later Mrs Hazeldene, became head teacher and, although quite small, could control any troublemaker with a look. When Mrs Hazeldene got married, mum remembers they were all invited, and the bride wore a yellow dress with a large picture hat. Mum played stoolball at school, which cost her a front tooth, and the teacher who took games (Miss Turner, later Mrs Chatfield) wore a long coat with fox fur collar. Mum also played tennis a lot.

Treats were going to the Flower Show, with Smiths Fair in the evenings, going on a pork pie special day which involved walking along to the station and catching the train to Eastbourne, having a pork pie along the way.

As well as going to Sunday School at St Mary's, mum used to work the bellows for the organ and I believe she managed to find her initials inscribed behind the organ when she was taken there prior to the change of use to a residential property. She said sorry, if a few decades too late. Her father was a lay preacher, so Sundays revolved around St Mary's.

When the war came her father and Uncle Jim were classified as essential agricultural workers so were not called up. They levelled what is now the graveyard behind St Mary's and a good deal of what is now the playing fields to allow vegetables to be grown for the war effort. This was on condition they could have a space once it became a graveyard, and you will find their graves in the corner by the pavilion.

Although probably overgrown now there were slit trenches and a search light battery on the common, I remember helping Garth Christian clear gorse and bracken to help the orchids grow and the sky larks nest, and uncovering the remains.

During the war mum was a runner for the air raid wardens and on fire watch duty. She remembers returning home from duty one night and a German aircraft coming over the Chailey Newick road; a voice from the ditch said "come over here Margaret Hobden" and she ended up sitting in the ditch with one of the main "residents" of the Kings Head public bar. She has since ridden her bike into a ditch and been pulled in to a ditch by her dogs, so one of her favourite sayings is "I sit in a ditch".

It was during this time she went to Box's Commercial College in Brighton to learn short hand and speed typing. German aircraft frequently off-loaded unused ammunition on the way back to base from London and she had to shelter in shop entrances along the sea front as they did so. The first time she experienced this was when she realised it wasn't rain on the College roof but spent ammunition from a dog fight overhead. They then had to get a particularly large girl out from under her typing desk where she had got stuck in her fright.

Once the war was over mum left home to join the Womens Royal Naval Service, but that is another story!

I bought a pram for £400 online, but it never arrived. At checkout it said delivery would take 3-5 working days, but I never received any tracking information. I chased the seller and they said they'd speak to the delivery company, but now when I try to contact them I get no response. The website I bought it through looked legitimate but now I've seen people posting on review sites about products that never arrived and some are saying this is a bogus seller. Have I been scammed and if so, what can I do?

Unfortunately scammers are always finding more sophisticated ways to trick shoppers, including having very legitimate-looking websites.

From your letter, there are signs it could be a scam. We've detailed information on our website about how to spot the signs of a scam that you might find useful to check. As you've already parted with your money, the first step is to contact your bank immediately to let them know you think you've been scammed.

In terms of getting your money back, a lot depends on how you paid. We have full details on our website on the routes you can take. It's always a good idea to report a scam, even if you haven't got your money back yet. You can do this by contacting Action Fraud. For more advice on dealing with suspected scams or problems with traders, call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline 0808 223 1133 or talk to an adviser on 0808 278 7892.
