Dear residents of Chailey,



'For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die.' Ecclesiastes 3:1-2.

I know this scripture well and I believe it. When I was thirteen something happened to me that really should have changed my life. It didn't then, but many years later it did. I was living in Germany with my parents and going to School there. During one of my School terms, I became ill and for a while the illness was a mystery. I knew from the concern on my parents face that it was serious. Eventually the diagnosis came, I had contracted typhoid. I was to have no contact with anyone and I was admitted to RAF Wegberg hospital and put in a quarantine ward used for infectious diseases and there I stayed. I deteriorated and my parents were warned that the next 48hrs were critical.

That night as I lay, I could hear the radio playing in the background and I heard Petula Clarke singing 'Downtown.' I knew that I was in the present and wasn't hallucinating or dreaming. There were no harps or angelic voices, only Petula! Then I saw out of the corner of my eye and standing by my left shoulder, a figure. It was a man, I couldn't see his face, just his robe and I knew it was Jesus, even though I was a non believer. He told me that I couldn't die in the room that I was in, but that I had to find room 6 and go there to die. I had been in bed for weeks and had lost weight and was unsteady on my feet. I made a few steps out of the room, but fell over in the corridor. The RAF corporal who was my medic found me and picked me up, as he did, he shouted in my face, 'if you get out of bed again, I will tie you to the bed.' As he shouted, a drop of his spit landed on my lip and 50 years on, I can still feel it. I was just a child.

I have hardly ever shared this story and I didn't tell my parents, so why am I telling it now? Well recently someone said to me, 'I don't believe in God, but if I saw Him I might.' Well, I saw Him. I didn't suddenly believe in Him because I saw Him. I didn't NOT believe, it just didn't change my life, except, I would like to think, that getting out of bed to go and die, gave me the fight that I needed to live. Daisy has a wonderful faith and doesn't need to see God to believe in Him. She has seen from the tragedy of her previous life God's provision of a wonderful education and new life. She knows she has a safe, secure and loving home with us now. She goes to a christian group at her School and takes friends with her. They invariably say 'I won't believe in God until I see Him. She always replies "well my Gran has and she didn't." It wasn't until years and years later when my marriage was in crisis and we were on the verge of divorce that God revealed Himself to us again and we invited Him into our lives, because we had made such a mess of it ourselves and we needed His help.

It is an extraordinary privilege, as well as a heavy responsibility, to be invited to order our lives in line with God's will for each one of us. If we accept that, our ultimate happiness is in obeying the will of God, discerning God's path will lead to that ultimate happiness. He came into our lives and we submitted to Him and He turned our chaos into His perfect peace. He has guided us and kept us in the most miraculous way, we've been together now for 50 years. I don't know why it took 26 years from that first encounter for me to become a christian, probably because God doesn't come charging into our lives, we have to be ready and willing to invite Him in. All I know is that God's timing is perfect and all His ways are just. Sometimes we just have to trust the unseen. I know He has always been beside me. Don't

wait until you are dying, to search for God. He's waiting for you. Ask Him in, you don't even have to "mess up" to invite Him into your life.

I love the next piece of writing and include in it the Miller-Maskell's "ten commandments."

The man whispered "God speak to me." And a meadow lark sang. But the man did not hear.

So the man yelled "God speak to me." And the thunder rolled across the sky But the man did not listen.

The man looked around and said. " God let me see you." And a star shone brightly. But the man did not see.

So the man shouted. "God show me a miracle." And a life was born.

But the man did not notice.

So the man cried out in despair. "Touch me God, and let me know you are here."

Whereupon God reached down and touched the man. But the man brushed the butterfly away and walked on.



Chailey And District Horticultural Society

The Society is hosting an afternoon tea and information meeting at The village Hall on saturday 7th Feb between 2.30pm and 5pm. It is free and all are welcome:old and young,gardeners,cooks and those with skills in handicrafts. We would like it to be a two way event so the committee can learn what the society might do to generate more interest and all suggestions will be welcome.

February is the month to finish pruning apples, pears, currants and gooseberries. On currants remove all old growth down to ground level to encourage new shoots. With gooseberries the idea is to open up the centre of the bush to make it cup shaped so remove crossing branches and those growing towards the centre. Outside growth should be shortened by about a third.

Chit seed potatoes in a light but frost free place [using egg boxes is a good idea]. It is a little late for garlic but shallots can still be planted and it is a good idea to start them off in a 7cm pot in a warm and light place before planting out. The same can be done with onion sets.

For those that like to grow from seed now is the time to plant greenhouse tomatoes and aubergine[which need a long growing season] in a propagator. Moneymaker is a good variety of both tomato and aubergine though prehaps the best greenhouse tomato variety is shirley; producing medium sized early ripening fruit.

with seven members (three Councillors) volunteering their services and representing North and South Common areas. The Group met on January 8th to get formalities under way, so that we can move ahead.

The Group's thinking is that we shall need four focus groups – and Yes! we are looking for members of those groups:

- Consultation & Communication
- Environment & Housing
- Local Economy & Transport
- Community facilities.

The Plan is intended to profile our village and to state how we want it to develop up to 2030. Are you interested to join one of the focus groups?

What qualifications do you need?- an interest in your village and views on what will improve our experience of living here.

You can be a recent or long-standing resident, young or young at heart, you can work or have a business within the village or travel to work outside the village. We need a range of views to help develop the plan effectively.

Have you thought about becoming a Parish Councillor?

Local council elections are due to be held on 7th May this year. If you've never been to a Parish Council meeting before, you may be forgiven for thinking that Parish Councillors are a group of (probably older) people who meet now and then in a local meeting room. If, however, you live in a community where something 'big' has happened – such as a contentious planning application – you'll know that when people in the community need support and guidance, it is that same group of people in the meeting room that they will turn to. By becoming a Parish Councillor you become someone your community will look to for help, guidance and support – a community leader with the power to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better, as a result of decisions you have helped make, is something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride.

How Much Time Does It Take Up? The Council meets once a month for the Council meeting, to which members of the public are also invited. Meetings may last two hours, depending on what's on the list of items to discuss. The Council also has a Planning Committee which meets once a month.

How Long Does a Parish Councillor Serve For? Once elected, Parish Councillors sit on the Council for a maximum of four years. If they then want to stay in the post they can stand for re-election. It doesn't mean that you have to stay for four years, if you find it's not for you or you can no longer meet the commitment you can stand down.

Am I Eligible to Be a Parish Councillor? To stand for election on a Parish Council, you must:

- be a UK or Commonwealth citizen, or;
- be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland, or;
- be a citizen of another Member state of the European Union;
- be at least 18 years old.

To be eligible to stand for an election for a particular parish, you must:

be an elector of the parish, or;

for the whole of the previous 12 months have occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the parish, or;

during the previous 12 months have worked in the parish (as your principal or only place of work), or:

for the whole of the previous 12 months lived in the parish or within three miles of the parish boundary.

You may but don't have to be connected to a political party. The current Councillors are independent, with no political party affiliation. If you do become a Parish Councillor you will have to sign up to the Code of Conduct.

Don't Take Our Word for It! The best way to find out what it's like to be a Parish Councillor is to talk to someone who's doing it now. Go along to a Parish Council meeting, speak to one of the Councillors and find out what they think of the job.

Interested? If you want to become a Parish Councillor there are two things you need to do: get yourself nominated and get voted in at the election – the first much easier than the second! For further details, please contact the Parish Clerk

UNDERSTANDING JARGON – AFFORDABLE COUNCILLOR'S HOUSING

CORNER By Sharen Davy Many families understand the bureaucratic language attached to housing, so forgive me if you know this subject inside-out and I apologise for this lengthy note. But for those in Chailey who find it a bit baffling - I hope the following makes some sense and is helpful.

In thinking about the housing market it is helpful to recognize the distinction between housing demand, housing need and housing requirement. Some confusion arises in around the use of the term 'affordable housing'.

 Housing Demand is the quantity of housing of the type and qualify that households both want and can afford to buy or rent in the open market without subsidy. Housing demand thus takes into account both preference and ability to pay.

· Housing Need is the quantity of the type and quality necessary to house those households currently lacking their own housing, or living in housing which is unsuitable or inadequate and who can not afford to buy or rent suitable housing in the open market. So housing need takes account of those without adequate housing who are unable to resolve their situation without assistance or state subsidies.

• Housing requirement encompasses both housing demand and housing need, and is therefore the quantity of housing necessary for all households to have access to suitable housing, irrespective of the ability to pay. Put simply, it is the amount to of housing needed to accommodate the population at appropriate minimum standards as defined by government or in local (Lewes District Council) policies.

• Some confusion arises in housing policy around the use of the term 'affordable housing'.

• Market housing where the purchaser, owner or tenant pays the full market cost or rent without subsidy. That means low cost – starter market housing and is not considered for planning purposes as affordable housing.

• Social Rented Housing where housing is allocated on the basis of need rather than the ability to pay and rents are set below market levels. The development of new social rented housing is dependent on the subsidy of development costs either from public funds or cross subsidy based on the land value associated with the awarding planning permission. The social, subsidised rented housing sector comprises Council and Housing Association for rent.

• Intermediate Housing Shared ownership, (New Build HomeBuy) government incentives to assist those that are ineligible for social, subsidised rented housing but cannot afford market housing. For instance: part buy/part rent basis means you can buy shares worth between 25% and 75% of the property's market value and you pay a subsidised rent on the remaining share. Shared ownership provides an important bridge across the housing divide, allowing hard-working families on modest incomes to find good quality homes. Shared ownership is often a corner stone of aspirations for a better life and can help young people tremendously.

On January 27th I will be attend the Independent Examination Hearing for the Lewes District Council and South Downs National Park Authority. An Inspector will consider the soundness of the Local Plan. I am the only Lewes District Councillor that submitted an individual paper to the Inspector. It's important that I try to reflect and represent the views of the residents living in Chailey. The majority of people I speak with want well-designed, attractive housing that includes housing for families – modest housing for young, first-time buyers and the elderly - a good mix for our village. Few I speak with want high-rise flats and over-development in a rural environment. The subject I have been called to discuss is: Housing policies throughout the District. The Inspector conducts the Examination and makes the final decision.

ART IN ANCIENT EGYPT

The Art of Ancient Egypt must be one of the most instantly recognizable, rather static, formal and stiff.
