### Bishop's Letter - July 2015

Finding a peaceful, prayer place

The advent of email means we live in a world where we expect to be able to contact people (and get a response) almost instantly. The volume is so great that many, even when they go on holiday over the next few weeks, will not turn them off, fearful of the enormous inbox that will await when they get home.

This obviously makes it difficult to switch off and relax. You come back from holiday more stressed than when you left!

The Christian life should be different. Jesus' life looks much more like working from rest rather than resting from work. He seems to be occupied, but never busy; constantly in demand, but never driven by the expectations of others. Above all the things he does always reflect a higher agenda that God the Father has set him.

He plugs into this agenda through a life of prayer and thus finds peace. He is never driven 'beyond the call of God' (an excellent book by Pamela Evans, perhaps some holiday reading?).

A few weeks ago at Pentecost we launched our diocesan strategy. Every parish is being encouraged to examine their activities, the resources they have and the needs of their community and then choose one thing they want to major on in 2016 to be more effective in service and witness.

It is not an invitation to be even more frantic. We hope that as folk examine what they are doing they might actually stop doing some things, or maybe do some things differently. Jesus said, "My yoke is easy and my burden is light." If we portray a life of discipleship that is adding yet more stuff to an already busy life, it's hardly a great marketing strategy! I hope the summer might be an opportunity for all of us to slow down, reflect and recommit to live out of that prayerful place that is peaceful not frantic.

# 2 MOTOR BIKE ACCIDENTS ON THE A272 - SPEED LIMITS

On Friday 12th June, a motor biker was taken to A and E. I was around 2-3 cars in front of this

incident and like the cars behind me, I was stationary and patiently waiting for a gap in the traffic to turn into my own driveway. I only heard the crash, I did not see it, but it appears that either the motor biker was unable to stop in time, or was trying to pass - I cannot state which.

On Sunday 14th June - also on the A272, another motor biker was taken to A and E. I am led to believe that the motor bike lost control round the bend, and crashed near Holford Manor Lane. The person driving the motorbike suffered extensive burns. We wish them both a speedy recovery.

I have, since 2005, presented a number of petitions and requests asking for a lower speed limit of 40 mph on this stretch of road. I have suggested double white lines would discourage overtaking and be a deterrent for those that want to race from Scaynes Hill to the King's Head roundabout. On 13 December 2010 a recommendation for 50 mph was confirmed by East Sussex County Council and Sussex Police. I was disappointed with this decision, but some reduction was better than nothing. It has taken until 2015 for this lower speed to be implemented – the work will be done within a month. I have followed this up, every month for five years. I often say – patience is a virtue.

Of course: cars, commercial vehicles, motor bikes, cycles, do not drive themselves. A few people are driving too fast, out of the limits of their capabilities and a minority will drive recklessly whatever the speed limit, but lowering speed limits might help reduce accidents. Currently, there is a camera monitoring this stretch of road and I have written to the Chief Inspector, Lewes District Commander for his comments.

#### GRANTHAM CLOSE

Our elderly residents use the bus service on a daily basis and shop every day, so it's important that the bus drivers stop near Grantham Close, rather than some distance away. An email to our helpful East Sussex County Council Officer and the bus driver will happily accommodate this service.

#### NEW RE-SURFACING OUTSIDE GARAGES IN SOUTH CHAILEY

I was very pleased that a local resident contacted me to help solve an on-going problem. I was keen to support residents, as in my book - it was the duty of Lewes District Council to carry out the works. I contacted the Head of Housing and we are all happy with the superb result. If I can, I will try to help and find a solution, although it often takes longer than I would wish.

**Parish Clerk:** Councillors regret that Bettina Newell, who took up the post of Clerk in April, has tendered her resignation. The Parish Council has been fortunate in being able to recruit Stephen Treharne who took up his appointment in late June.

**Small Grants:** The Council makes a number of Small Grants (typically, £250 or less) to assist societies and other Chailey organisations with their administrative costs. The closing date is June 30th and Grants are considered at Full Council on July 21st. An Application Form and further details can be downloaded or consulted on our website.

**JULY 23rd:** Jack Cranfield who leads the Steering Group for our Neighbourhood Plan will convene the Steering Group, specifically to discuss Housing policies. Residents are welcome to attend and to contribute to the discussion.

The Steering Group envisages setting up three specialist Task Forces to contribute to the Plan: Housing & Environment; Local Economy; Community. We are still looking for greater interest in the Neighbourhood Plan – under the rules of the game, it is residents who are asked to engage in drawing up the Plan. The Council, guided by the Steering Group, can commission specialist services to arrange surveys and organise public consultation and questionnaires, but it is residents who must engage with ideas.

**Your support will be welcomed:** It is not only the Neighbourhood Plan which requires greater participation; the Bonfire Society and the Chailey Youth Group are also looking for volunteers to assist and promote their activities.

And the Parish Council expects to co-opt and welcome three new Councillors in July (which still leaves room for two more!).

**Mill Lane – junction in South Chailey with A275:** The Parish Council has been discussing with East Sussex Highways the possibility of placing a pedestrian refuge on the A275 to the South of Mill Lane. Initial estimates suggest that this project could cost £25-30,000 and, under the Community Match Initiative, half the cost would be paid by the Parish Council. We should welcome your views; would a crossing at this point (close to the bus-stop) be used? By whom? Is it necessary? Please write to the Clerk with your views.

**BEWARE:** Our Community Support Officer emphasised at the Annual Meeting that the Police are concerned by the increasing number of 'scams'. As a first precaution residents should note that nobody, neither Police nor your Bank, will ask you for Bank account details. Further information will be found on the Sussex Police website.

### Friends of Newick Health Centre

We have now nearly completed the installation of Defibrillators in the Chailey Parish Area, except that we would like to put one in the Chailey Green area. In North Chailey although there is no public defibrillator available, there are two Community First Responders in that area and they each have a unit. The cost of supplying and installing a defibrillator, even with the discount negotiated by The South East Ambulance Service, is around £1250.00 which unfortunately we don't have. Somehow we need to raise this sum if we are going to make the area safer for the public, so if you would like to make a donation, which would be most acceptable, could you please send it to our Hon. ## **Challey & District Horticultural Society**

Summer is now with us. Everything, weeds included, is growing fast, but the harvest is also increasing. Early potatoes are ready for digging, and ideally they should be the size

of hens' eggs. Lettuce, beetroot, broad beans, peas and early carrots are also ready.

Remember to keep planting salad crops and beetroot to give a lasting supply into autumn. Loose leaf lettuce do particularly well in later planting season.

Sweetcorn which was planted in blocks now needs attention. Tap the plants every time you pass. This helps fertilisation by dropping pollen from the tassel onto the cob. When the tassel turns brown, peel back the top of the cob. If you see it has turned yellow, pierce a kernel with your fingernail and if milky liquid comes out, the cob is ready. Pick and cook straight away, because as soon as the cob is picked the sugars begin to turn to starch and the cob will lose its sweetness and become chewy.

Now is also the time to plant winter brassicas - sprouts, cabbage, kale, cauliflower. Protect from slugs and birds with netting and keep a watch for caterpillars. Either squash them on a daily basis or spray.

Runner and French beans will soon be ready. Water in dry spells and pick regularly to encourage cropping. With outside tomatoes and potatoes, keep a watch for blight. Spray with Bordeaux mixture and with potatoes remove the foliage to prevent infection of the tubers. Pick courgettes when small. Don't let them get too large or marrow-like because this will prevent the production of new fruit. Water well in dry spells and protect from slugs.

In the greenhouse feed tomatoes weekly when the first truss has set. Stop the plant by picking out the growing end after six trusses have set.

Use a fine paintbrush to aid fertilisation of aubergines. Chillies and peppers are self fertilising, so do not need help. Watch out for whitefly, greenfly and red spider mite. A daily fine spray of water will help, as will fly paper and, if you must, chemicals.

Enjoy the early summer harvest and do bring some to exhibit at our summer show on 18 July. Please contact me for schedules. Help is always available for staging exhibits.
