Dear residents of Chailey,

Vicar's Corner Over twenty years ago my husband and I took up the challenge of walking part of the Great Wall of China. We were undertaking it on behalf of the Children's Society and had to meet the rest

of the party at Heathrow Airport. We arrived at the airport and it transpired that over a 100 people had also volunteered for the fund raiser, we didn't know any of them. There was great excitement as we boarded the plane, and I sat next to 'Rose.' By the time we got to China, Rose and I were great friends. She was gentle, humble, self effacing and charming. We chatted for hours, but I still didn't know anything about her life at home. Maybe she was married, maybe she had a family? She didn't say, I didn't ask.

By complete contrast was the lady sitting next to my husband. She was a 'soap - star' and well known actress. She was witty and funny, but it was exhausting being in her company and listening to her tell stories of the rich and famous. She was surrounded by an entourage, a photo shoot crew trying to get a 'good' picture and we were amazed that they even photographed her as she changed the plasters, on her blistered feet, once we had got on the wall. Rose walked silently on, even if she had blistered feet no-one would ever know. Rose and I walked together most days and she told me she lived in Kent. She asked me if I would go and speak to 'her little group' once we had completed the walk. The she walked silently on. The actress with all the drama, spent time walking with my husband. She unburdened herself of all her worries and asked if she could keep in touch when we got back to the U.K. He knew her complete life story by day three.

The walk was gruelling and a great challenge. The climb to get up to the top of the wall was sometimes over a 1,000 steps and once up there, there were no facilities. You have to carry water and food. Some nights we slept in basic Army accommodation. The walk ended and on the way back to the U.K. I sat next to the actress and Rose was silent. As the plane flew over the Channel the actress went into the lavatory and came back with a 'Ta dah.' She was beautifully made up, she had changed her clothes and was wearing perfume. "That's what the public expects," was her explanation. She also asked me not to get off the plane with her as the press would presume that she and I were "an item" and we were returning from a holiday together! Rose was silent.

Looking back on the trip the actress thought she was very important, more so than any of us and we knew it. Two worlds collided, the silent and the loud. Scripture declares "that all people are equal in the sight of God and that all are equally in need of redemption achieved through the saving death of Jesus Christ. All believers have equal status before God, despite differences in their social standing and back ground."

I didn't expect to hear from Rose, but the invitation came inviting me to speak to her 'little group.' My husband and I set off for Kent with our overnight bags. The directions went as follows "Once off the motorway keep going for 2 miles and when you reach the cricket pavilion at the top of the hill, turn left and we are down at the bottom of the hill!" We turned left and my heart missed a beat, there before us lay the Kentish version of Sandringham, complete with flagpole and Union Jack flying. The only thing I could think was that my Mother would be cross with me because I was wearing jeans! Rose flung open the oak doors and I still loved her! She showed us to our beautiful room, it had shelves of books, some leather bound and as I opened them they were inscribed to 'Rose and Robin with love from the Thatcher's, The Majors, Princess Margaret and many names I did not recognise. Rose was still silent.

I spoke to her 'little group,' it went well. I told them of our adventures, as I tried to rescue animals that were being cruelly treated in Bejing. When you are an ambassador for the Children's Society you cannot get embroiled in animal welfare issues, but I had a good qo. We went down to breakfast in the oak panelled dining room and there we met Rose's husband, who had just flown in from abroad where he had been on business.

He was the former Governor of the Bank of England. Rose didn't tell me, Robin didn't tell me, they remained silent. I saw his name on an envelope, what he did do though was offer my husband a job, to be Rector of the parish, he was the Patron. The Rectory was an 18th century farmhouse complete with sheep and cows. Unfortunately we had a job in Surrey and it didn't feel right to leave 'our' flock for a real flock and herd.

When I met Rose she knew she had nothing to prove to anyone, she was just undertaking a challenge and if she found a friend on the walk, that would be a bonus. For me, not her. She didn't have to impress anyone, she would always be loved because she was the person she was, not because of her position. God uses people and alters their assignments. Gideon in the Bible was a farmer and became a General. Mary the peasant girl became the Mother of Christ. Paul the Rabbi became a world evangelist. God changed Joseph from baby brother into an Egyptian Prince. He changed David from a shepherd to a king. Peter wanted to fish the sea of Galilee, Christ called him to lead the first Church. God gives us our assignments. But what about painful changes that are hard to understand? I have had lots of those and they are difficult, but it is like your time in the womb, you are being developed for a greater time outside. It is only outside the womb that you can fulfil God's purpose for your life. Your life in this world is simply to prepare you for your life in the next one. Paul wrote "These little troubles are getting us ready, ready for eternal glory that will make all our troubles seem like nothing." Eternal glory -- you can hardly imagine it.

We are all equal. God loves us all the same. At Christmas, Lady Rose wrote to me to say that she had lost her Lord Robin, she is heartbroken. I will never forget you Rose, your silence taught me so much, you know that in God's eyes we are all equal, you didn't have to boast or name drop to be validated. You knew that in God you move, you breathe and have your being. You don't know what the future holds, but you know who holds your future. If the only prayer you pray is 'thank you' then that is enough. Thank you Rose.

Back to Chailey. Please may I commend the Church Teas to you on the 3rd Sunday of every month. They are fabulous and one of our passing visitors calls them the "groaning table teas!" You will not get a better tea anywhere unless you are in Harrogate and go to "Betty's." Talking of Betty. I must tell you that she has decided to join the RAF Search and Rescue team, probably hoping to meet the Duke of Cambridge and play with Lupo the little black spaniel. I say she "wants to join the team", what I really mean to say is that she ate a large wooden helicopter and we are now awaiting the great unveiling of the rotor blades in the garden. Daisy bought the helicopter in Corfu and she hasn't noticed it is missing. Don't tell her.

Why do you do it Betty? Because you can I suppose.



Defibrillator Update

Now that we have provided AED defibrillators around the villages it is time to offer some training for those of you interested enough to give up two hours of your time. For your information there is one at Newick Village Hall,; one at the Newick Surgery, one at the Sports Pavilion King Georges Playing Field, and one half way up Allington Road near the school. We also have placed one at Chailey Free Church, South Chailey. At the moment there is not one for North Chailey due to finances, but a Community First Responder lives in the area.

If you would like to take part in some training, which will take about two hours, and will give you confidence to carry out CPR(Chest Compressions) and use of the defibrillator then please phone me on 01825 722660. When we have sufficient for a course (12 persons) then we will contact you and give you a time date and venue I must emphasise that you do NOT have to have completed the course to use the defibrillator. The unit talks you through the procedures exceptionally clearly. Finally if you are in the unfortunate position of being with someone who is having a heart attack and their heart stops, then immediately phone 999 and the Ambulance service will tell you what to do straight away and also where the nearest defibrillator is to be found. We look forward to meeting you on one of the courses.

JOIN YOUR PARISH COUNCIL and be co-opted as a Parish Councillor

The Parish Council Election was uncontested because only six people put their names forward to fill the eleven places on the Parish Council: Stephen Avery; Roger Barnard; Mark Evans; Katherine Matthews; John Millam; and Peter Olbrich. We should very much like to co-opt interested residents to make up our numbers, as the responsibilities of the Council won't just melt away!

The Parish Council is a statutory consultee on all planning applications in our village; it has itself considerable land-holdings, including the allotments; it is responsible for looking after a number of village facilities from grass-cutting to the Windmill, and it works with East Sussex Highways to consider speed limits and to improve our roads. Current or future projects include working with others to refurbish the Sports Pavilion, draft a Neighbourhood Plan, and build a pedestrian crossing or refuge at Mill Lane in South Chailey.

Being a Parish Councillor is a positive way to help your village thrive and develop (Parish Councillors are unpaid volunteers).

Small Grants: The Council makes a number of Small Grants (typically, £250 or less) to assist societies and other Chailey organisations with their administrative costs. The closing date is June 30th and Grants are considered at Full Council on July 21st. An Application Form and further details can be downloaded or consulted on our website.

Chailey Youth Group: is another amazing voluntary group, but Gemma Kybert who has been its leader since it started is standing down. The Group has fifty members and organises a series of events for young people in Chailey and on expeditions outside the village. We very much hope that a volunteer organiser will step forward to take Gemma's

place and to run this valuable Group. Contact Gemma or contact the Group through the Parish Clerk.

Mill Lane – junction in South Chailey with A275: The Parish Council has been discussing with East Sussex Highways the possibility of placing a pedestrian refuge on the A275 to the South of Mill Lane. Initial estimates suggest that this project could cost £25-30,000 and, under the Community Match Initiative, half the cost would be paid by the Parish Council. We should welcome your views; would a crossing at this point (close to the bus-stop) be used? By whom? Is it necessary? Write to the Clerk with your views.

Chailey & District Horticultural Society

The Society had a very successful plant sale, raising over £400. We would like to thank all those who came to support us.

June is now with us and Summer is here at last. All danger of frost is now passed so all those frost tender plants can go out into the garden.

I always grow outside tomatoes as I think the taste is better. Sungold, Gardeners Delight and Alicante make a nice mix of small sweet tomatoes and larger ones for sauces. The main problem with outside tomatoes is tomato blight which can rapidly destroy both plant & fruit. The spores are airborne and need wet leaves and a warm humid atmosphere. The danger period is from July onwards. A good idea is to join "Blight Watch" on the internet. It is free. Giving them your postcode allows them to alert you either by e-mail or mobile phone that conditions are right for blight to strike. Prevention has to be with spraying. Bordeaux Mixture (copper sulphate) is the traditional preventive but is being withdrawn this Autumn. What will replace it I do not know. After the first warning spray every 2-3 weeks depending on the weather (more frequent if warm & wet). Remember that this is the same as potato blight so try to avoid growing the 2 crops too close together. Greenhouse tomatoes do not usually suffer from blight as the leaves remain dry so also remember to water them from the base and keep the leaves dry.

Continue to plant lettuces, radishes and beetroot to maintain a steady supply and start preparing the ground for winter brassicas.

Sweet corn and winter veg next month.
