Dear residents of Chailey,

My husband is unable to write the introduction to this months Chailey news, so here I am again, as first reserve.

I have a very gifted and talented friend, who is an artist.

She wraps presents in the most beautiful way. So, as I

had a family birthday looming I decide to copy her style. I bought some pink tissue paper, some pink gingham ribbon, cellophane wrap and a pretty pink shell, because last Christmas she even put small shells in with her gift. I was excited to get going and cleared the decks, I needed space to create. I fiddled, wrapped and re-wrapped and wrapped again and finally I was finished. Was I pleased with my efforts? No. It looked like two cod and chips and a finger nail ripped off in the potato chipper, all tied up with pink gingham ribbon. Vinegar?

The beautiful gift of gift wrapping belonged to my friend. I cannot wrap presents as she does, but I will continue to do my best, my way. My task now, which will use my gifting, is to be the best Grandma I can be, as I seek to raise my granddaughter. I had six children under the age of 9 and have been preparing for this time now, for nearly 50 years. To that end I am reading a book sub titled "transforming ourselves, empowering our children." It is a wonderful book and I am encouraged by Chapter Two "A conscious (grand)parent does not emerge overnight." Phew! That's a relief. It is hard to read a self help book, when a lot of damage has already been done and I'm just picking up the pieces. I tell Daisy that 'the worst thing that can happen to you is in the past and the best thing that is going to happen to you is in the future.' We can move on together with the help of God.

My sisters have just been to visit us and they both remarked that they wouldn't want to be raising a grandchild at their age and they both admitted they are both too selfish, but this is the calling on my life not theirs and I'm so grateful and thankful to God that He has entrusted me with this child's precious heart. I thank Him everyday and I will do my best. Whatever circumstances you find yourself in God promises "You will forget your trouble.....as water gone by" Job 11:16. It's time to move on, no matter how bad things look, always remember the words "it came to pass" not "to stay." Life doesn't stand still, there will always be challenges. Don't let them destroy your confidence, instead, use them as opportunities to grow. Once you've grown in the areas where God thinks you need additional maturity, the season you're in will pass. Nothing lasts forever. Although its hard to believe at the time. 'You will forget your trouble and remember it.....as water gone by.'

One author writes 'To forget isn't to develop amnesia. It's to reach a place where the misery is pulled from the memory like poison is removed from an insect bite. Once it's gone healing is inevitable. The memory will become 'as water gone by.' When the water that is flowing around your ankles today passes, you'll never see it again.' Kristin Armstrong says 'when someone died in Old Testament times, those who were mourning marked their faces with ashes. They allotted a specific season, after which they scrubbed up and moved on. How much healthier is that than our society? We put on make-up, or a happy or stoic face and prohibit people from having compassion and respecting the limits of where we are. We are so busy hiding, we're buried under ashes on the inside. "God will call us to arise and shine when our light has come." (Isaiah 60:1). Ask Him to set your time limit and be ready to wash your face.' Then move on. Just be yourself, do your best, be open to the transforming Spirit of God.

Whilst speaking on the phone to the mother of our twin grandsons, we heard them screeching in the background. One twin came to the phone and stated "we're just

practising our war." Not sure what chapter that comes under in my book.
I shall pray they find peace.

Chailey Horticultural Society

Autumn is the time to start clearing the garden and thinking of the coming year. I am informed that there may be some allotments available at North Chailey. Anyone interested should contact the Parish Council.

Garlic, overwintering onions and shallots should be planted now. Plant overwintering broad beans and peas at the beginning of November. Aquadulce Claudia are the best broad beans for Autumn planting. They crop before black fly become a problem. Either plant direct into the soil or raise in roottrainers or small pots before planting out. This method is useful where squirrels and mice are a problem. Meteor is the best pea for planting now. Use 5cm pots, 4 peas per pot. Mature plants are about 2ft high, so twig supports are necessary, planting the pea close to the base. A fleece covering is advisable if the weather is very cold.

Protect white cabbage, sprouts and cauliflower from pigeons and bend the cauliflower leaves over the developing curds to prevent frost damage.

In the fruit garden, make sure summer fruiting raspberries are firmly tied in before winter gales come. Also, a good mulch will feed plants and suppress weeds. Do not shorten the canes until early spring. Winter fruiting raspberries should not be cut down until January/February.

Fit grease bands around the trunks of fruit trees to discourage moths and their larvae.

St Peter's



School

Flamingo and Gazelle classes are visiting the church as part of their learning about Christian worship. Our school was set up by the church in Victorian times in a house on Chailey Green and moved to the present site in 1853. The children will also learn about St. Peter who was born in Syria, became one of Christ's disciples, became the first Pope and died in Rome. His tomb is below St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican. Our school badge bears two symbols related to Peter. The cockerel refers to Jesus' prediction at the last supper that Peter would deny knowing Him before the cock crowed and the keys are a metaphor for the keys to the gates of Heaven and signified the authority of the Pope. We still regard ourselves as part of the local church community and have a foundation governor, appointed by the church, as a member of our governing body. All the children look forward to John's visits to lead our collective worship - and when the teachers attended the last one the vote was unanimous that they would attend all of John's assemblies in the future too!

We are now under the control of the local authority and the school is open to pupils of any religious persuasion or none.

Our sensory garden has been redeveloped with the help of our chair of governors, Mrs. Bowen and the project was partly funded by Flamingo class who, as part of their learning about keeping healthy, ran a smoothie cafe for two days.

As reformations go I suppose I've had my own during my lifetime. I was baptised and confirmed in the Church of England but left to join the Methodists because they had the best youth club in the village. For many years I photographed first communions at a local Catholic church and on Saturday I'm off to Greece, staying on the island of Thira(Santorini) which according to legend was the birthplace of Aphrodite and because of the favourable exchange rate I'll probably buy another silver icon to add to my collection. as convention requires I'll take it to the Orthodox Church and ask the priest to bless it for me.

ELECTORIAL REVIEW – BOUNDARY CHANGES

The boundary commission is looking at every Council in England with the view of each ward/parish having approximately 2000 residents who are eligible to vote for 1 Councillor. They base

their figures on the electorate in 2021. Currently, Chailey is 38% (762) over that number. Barcombe, for instance, is 240 voters below the target number. The commission will consider accepting - maybe 8% over the recommended number, but not much more. Wivelsfield is only 5% over, Newick 7% over. Currently, we have a joint ward of Chailey and Wivelsfield.

Ultimately, the Boundary Review Commission will make the decision, but they are inviting all Councils to make their suggestions and recommendations and residents are entitled to have their say.

A Working Party of all political Leaders in Lewes District Council has been formed: Cllr Smith (Conservative, Telscombe Cliffs), Cllr Osborne (Lib Dem, Plumpton), Cllr Rowell (Green, Conveyor, Lewes), Cllr O'Keeffe, (Independent, Lewes), Cllr Barnes (UKIP, Denton/Newhaven). It is hoped that this Working Party respect the views of us here in Chailey and do not recommend changes we simply don't want. But again, the Boundary Commission will have the last word.

Our Parish Council will receive consultation documents for their comments. There might be 'exception' cases in the country where although a ward/parish is way over the number, it would be too complicated and disruptive to change every neighbouring ward and parish to fit. Perhaps, we could be such an exemption? The boundary changes do not consider putting wards/parishes in to other Districts. One could say: "if it's not broke, don't fix it" but it is considered to be fairer. I believe it is worth having your say.

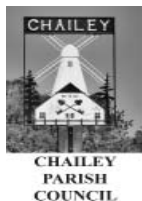

Allotments: It is possible that the Council may be able to offer to residents of Chailey one or two allotments – this statement is vague because certain allotments are not being cultivated and the Clerk will ascertain whether the current holders wish to continue their relationship with the land. There is a waiting-list but others interested to rent an allotment should contact the Clerk.

Highways: Parish Councillors met with East Sussex Highways on Monday October 5th. We reviewed the proposed signage for the 50mph restriction from Scaynes Hill to the King's Head; this will provide a focus on the access to Chailey Heritage and, as might be expected, the two steep bends leading to and from Pellingbridge.

Warrs Hill footpath: this project has still to complete consultation, but it is hoped that the design stage can now proceed.

We also asked Highways for advice on the speed of traffic at South Street; and requested further improvements for pedestrians along the raised pavement to the Stores.

Finally, we spoke about the persistent traffic of Brown's heavy lorries, transporting spoil to Northall Farm in Fletching; it is our understanding that this exercise will cease in mid-November when Highways will remake and repair Northall Lane.

Shaping Chailey: Have you completed the Questionnaire enclosed with *Chailey News* last month? If not, please do so – additional copies are available or can be downloaded from the Parish Council website. We need a wide response to guide and validate the plan.

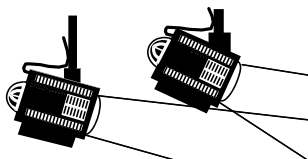

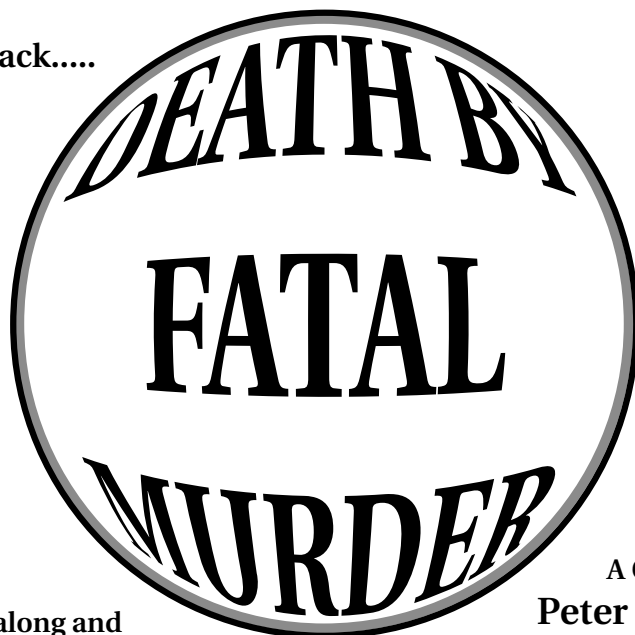
