Dear residents of Chailey,

Daisy our granddaughter was fifteen in July, she has lived with us for over half her life and we are thankful to God for the privilege of raising her and guiding her through all of her

struggles, of which there are still many. One of her biggest struggles is that her Father walked out on Christmas Day, when she was three. Not too many 'Hark the Heralds' that Christmas, but plenty of 'In the bleak midwinter' interrupted by sobs. We moved her and her Mother to Mayfield where we lived and began the job of caring for them. The local School had class sizes of nearly forty, so we managed to get her into a little Prep School. I volunteered to be their Chaplain to offset the cost. She had her fourth birthday in a hall in Mayfield and as my wife walked hand in hand with her back to our house, Daisy looked at my wife and asked "Does my Daddy know I am four now?" It was going to be the title of my wife's next book.

It was at this little School that Daisy met William. A very handsome four year old with olive skin, brown eyes and long lashes. They became inseparable friends. Where William was there you would find Daisy. Playtime, Assembly, shared desk, shared games, tennis, football and meal times. Best friends. Then fate took a cruel turn, Daisy had to move on. Her life to be changed forever again. We thought her home life was settled and happy and when the Bishop asked us to come to Chailey we did. Later things became bad for her at home and after a year Daisy had to come and live with us and her Mother went to rehab.

We always spoke fondly of William and his family, we wondered where he was and how he was. We heard he had gone to School in Battle, but that was all the news we had. Daisy saw the briefest glimpse of him on social media, but chose instead to settle for an old photo of him at Sport's Day sitting next to each other on the grass, when they were both six. Last Saturday we were outside the Rectory and two School mini-buses pulled up and the young people began to embark grumpily, they were on a Duke of Edinburgh expedition. Another gang of teenagers wandering lost around Chailey and its countryside, as Daisy did last year! We looked closer and they were from Battle Abbey School. I went out to introduce myself, as I always do and to welcome them to the Parish, the youngsters don't want a welcome, they would rather be in bed, but the staff appreciate the gesture!

They got out of the buses and my wife glanced across at the Church wall and there he was. Olive skinned, long eyelashes but now sporting the beginnings of a moustache. It was Will. Even my wife's heart skipped a beat! Daisy was watching from behind a twitching curtain, wearing her tennis kit about to leave for a match in Kent. She gasped and froze. She panicked, she couldn't do it, she couldn't speak, she couldn't meet him again. He looked up at the window, she fell to the floor. Two fifteen year olds with a once lovely innocent friendship, unable to re-connect. My wife hummed 'Ding Dong Merrily on high.' But it wasn't going to be. Adolescence had silenced the friendship. The fire had gone out. Will had gone. They glanced at each other as Daisy's tennis lift arrived. We were all sad. Will had gone. He didn't even know she lived here. They hadn't seen each other for 7 years.

Sometimes this is how it can be with God. God is longing to be with us, but we reject

Him. We miss opportunities and reject Him or fail to understand that He is calling us to come back, or even meet with Him for the first time. God is "out there" and sometimes we don't even try and walk out to see Him. We hide, we pretend we don't need Him. "where the lost can become found. Keep the fire burning." "Did not our hearts burn within us while He talked with us?" I uke 24:32.

After the resurrection Jesus met two of His disciples who'd seen Him crucified and didn't know he'd been raised from the dead. Then later as He ate supper with them at their house, an interesting thing happened: 'Their eyes were opened they knew Him and they said to one another, "Did not our hearts burn within us while He talked on the road, and while He opened the Scriptures to us? (vs 31-32). This story has much to teach us about keeping the fire of love and devotion to Christ burning in our hearts. As you walk with Jesus and spend time in His presence, He talks to you and reveals Himself through the Scriptures. We all know that to keep a fire burning you must tend it, stoke it, and keep fuelling it. Why do some of us go on to higher heights and deeper depths in our walk with God, while others seem to go round in circles without getting anywhere? Because one group commits itself to pursuing God until His presence becomes a daily reality in their lives, while the other group doesn't. It's that simple. The question is, which group are you in? If you're lukewarm and half-hearted in your walk with God, today He is saying to you, 'Return to me and I will return to you' (Zechariah 1:3). Or in layman's terms: 'Turn around and come back. You'll find Me where you left me.' So the word for you today is: keep the fire burning.

As I have been writing this it transpires there is good news of Will. I'll tell you next month.



Chailey Commons Society

If you like the heat then late June and July have been the time for you. Temperatures of around 30C have been regularly recorded with June making the headlines as 'with many seeing their warmest and driest June on record'. The commons are now at their driest too and the muddy patches are baked hard and the well worn paths have a sandy surface.

Our late evening walk to find the nightjars was successful and we had a good combination of both cuckoo and nightjar on Red House and also on Memorial. We were joined by Dave and Penny Green from the Sussex Moth Group who set up two moth traps on the east side of Memorial and we reached them at around 11.15.p.m. to see the results. Recording of the catches and finds gave us 26 species including heath specific ones and the full list will be on the website. Thank you to them.

Our group outing to the Knepp Rewilding project was very interesting and we toured aboard a cross country vehicle, pausing to view interesting areas from both ground and tree platform levels. Long Horn cattle, Exmoor ponies, deer and rootling Tamworth pigs were to be seen around the now very wild looking estate land. Tea and cake half way and a chance meeting with butterfly specialist Neil Hulme BEM completed our visit.

Our August activities are, firstly, our ever popular Bug Hunt on Wednesday August 15th for children and families and all those interested in foraging for the unsuspecting wildlife. Starting at the Sports Club car park by the A272 North Chailey at 10.00.a.m. we shall spend a couple of hours with nets, jars and magnifying glasses looking at our finds. Bring those and a picnic for a fun morning.

Secondly, we will be going on our Early Bird Walk on Wednesday 22nd August starting at the Sports Club car park at 7.00.a.m. and this will be followed by a hearty breakfast at the Forget Me Not Tea rooms.

Chailey Horticultural Society

At the time of writing we are enjoying a long dry spell of hot weather. This makes it essential that those plants that need it get a constant supply of water.

Plants prefer tepid water. Water straight from an outside tap or well is too cold and will slow growth and scorch leaves. It is best to fill water butts and then wait for 24hrs to allow the water to warm up. If using buckets stand them in the sun for an hour or two before using.

One advantage of the dry weather is the low risk of blight on tomatoes and potatoes. I do fear that when the rain comes blight will rapidly appear. Blight can only infect wet leaves so always water at the roots. There is no chemical control so prevention is vital with wide spacing of plants to allow a good flow of air. As soon as potatoes are infected cut off and burn the foliage to avoid spread to the tubers. Prehaps most importantly try growing blight resistant varieties.

Onions will soon be ready as the foliage dies back and bends over. There is always a disagreement as to whether you should bend the foliage to try and speed up ripening or let nature take its course. Personally I don't think it matters what you do! Loosen the onion in the soil for a week before lifting and then dry preferably outside. Be careful if doing so in a greenhouse as it may get too hot and cook them!

Prune gooseberries by shortening new growth by a third, cutting out old and diseased branches and try and form an open cup like structure.

Dead head roses to encourage continued flowering.

Wisteria is best pruned twice a year. Summer pruning consists of shortening the long whip like new growth back to five leaves.

A final bit of advice. If a hosepipe ban is threatened water all plants well and then cover with a layer of well rotted manure, compost or bark clippings.

Rail Update

Having met with many rail users who use local stations such as Wivelsfield, I know how unhappy residents were with the proposed new timetable and removal of services. Since then the Southern rail timetable changes have been a disaster for the whole network and as a fellow commuter I know that locally it has left us with reduced services, short formation trains and station skipping. Along with other local MPs, I met with the Transport Secretary in Parliament to ask him to remove Southern Rail's franchise and plans are now in place to prepare for an alternative rail operator to take over if rail services do not improve this month. Commuters locally have simply had enough of Southern Rail and at my most recent meeting with the Secretary of State I have asked that the services we lost, initially, are restored in the next few months and that the October shut down of the line is cancelled. I will keep you updated on this as minsters are looking at this request.

Please do keep me updated on your journeys locally as the figures being presented to ministers on train numbers, delays and short formation are very different to what is actually happening and any evidence I can get locally I will be sharing with ministers. Help with Universal Credit

Universal Credit is a new benefit which helps people on a low income or not in work meet their living costs. It combines six benefits, including Housing Benefit and Working Tax Credit, into a single monthly payment.

To help people prepare for Universal Credit, Citizens Advice is highlighting how it differs to previous benefits.

Three key changes the charity wants people to be aware of are:

- Universal Credit payments are made in arrears once a month, rather than every week. The date you get paid will depend on when you make your claim.
- Payments will go straight into your bank account. This means you may need
 to set up standing orders for expenses, like rent, if it was paid directly to your landlord
 under the old benefits system.
- New Universal Credit applications, and any change in your circumstances, need to be made online.

Last year, the government made a number of changes to Universal Credit to help people avoid financial difficulty while they wait for their first payment. This includes the removal of the seven waiting days before a claimant can apply for Universal Credit.

We can help at every stage of the process - from guiding someone through the online application form, to offering budgeting advice and helping people best manage their monthly payment.

Some clients are experiencing long delays before receiving the first payment so it is important to get in touch with us as soon as you are experiencing difficulties or complications with the application process.
