It's a good day today for me, so here I am again wife of 23918099. It is strange how one's husbands Army number can be forever etched on one's psyche. I shall never forget

it and in fact when our son was born in a military hospital in Germany, on his crib was written S/O 23918099 (Son Of) Cheek! My husband wasn't even there, turned away at the door by a Captain, a midwife in the QARANCS. Who told him when we arrived at the maternity unit, "We don't need you here go away." So he went and played football, but I scored the winning goal.

I was transported back to Germany again this morning, in my mind's eye, by a smell that took me back 50 years. When I was at School in Germany, in the holidays and on Saturdays, I worked in a large NAAFI shop (Navy, Army and Air Force Institute). The supermarket served all of the military personnel and their families. I ground coffee beans and sold cigarettes, both of which were rationed because they were tax free. This morning I opened a new jar of coffee "Oh that smell" and I was back serving and wishing everyone "Guten Morgen." I was back in the 1960's, wearing a mini skirt so short, that I was unable to retrieve a single dropped coffee bean! All of our life experiences and memories make us who we are today. We have had plenty of trials, we are in the middle of one at the moment. Sometimes our troubles can lay us low. Sometimes they make us feel lonely and scared. Sometimes all that we have to hang onto is God and at times like this, we are lifted and encouraged by this verse in the Bible. "Fear not, for I am with you, be not dismayed, for I am your God, I will strengthen you, I will keep you and I will uphold you with the right hand of my righteousness." Isaiah 41:10.

As we have been raising Daisy, it is a fact that we teach what we know, but we reproduce what we are. Our children may sometimes doubt what we say, but they will always believe what we do. We try to speak words that build them and others up and not tear them down, that edify rather than criticise, that are spoken in love and truth and not twisted by our own desires and expectations. It is hard to get it right, but we keep trying daily. Daisy has suffered pain, trauma and experiences that have led her wanting to become a drink and drugs counsellor. Her motto is "if it doesn't kill you, it will make you stronger." Her Father has a new family now, Daisy has to navigate her route to integrate with them, without feeling left out, which is impossible. She has to cope with people at School thinking we are her parents. Unless I get a sign to hang round my neck stating "I am her Gran." Which is obvious to me! So maybe that wouldn't help. She has had to deal with living in the Rectory and all of the nonsense that goes with that life. Rude and ill-mannered people showing their anger. Life lessons every day. It will equip her for the future.

On the plus side and there is always a plus side, she has seen God at work in her life and in ours too and that has given her strength when she needed it. She has met wonderfully kind people in Chailey, who really love her. She has begun her counselling calling because of her experiences. She is the 'go to' person at School if anyone has a problem. She is always on hand to listen and offer wise counsel. She helps friends through worries, heartache and trials. She always seems to know the path they should take. She is wise beyond her years. It will equip her for the future.

Now back to Will. He tracked Daisy down a few months ago but didn't know where she

lived, or that she lived with us. He tracked her down via her number (not 23918099). They have been in constant touch, we didn't know, but that didn't matter. I'm just pleased she was able to help him. He'd had a difficult time a while back and had contacted her to ask for advice. He had girlfriend trouble and who could help him? His best friend from years ago, Daisy. She was able to talk him through all of that, or text him through! He is a Christian now and back on track, with God's help, which he found comforting. We missed you Will, welcome back.

I believe that we are trained by our troubles "Our affliction is working for us!" 2 Corinthians 4:17. Contrary to what you may think, the ideal environment for our children is not one that's devoid of problems and trials, although sometimes we all wish it were so. Though its hard to accept at the time, our children need the minor setbacks and disappointments that come their way. How can they learn to cope with problems and frustrations as adults, if their early experiences are totally without them? Nature tells us this. A tree that is planted in a rain forest is never forced to extend its roots downward in search of water. As a result it remains poorly anchored and can be toppled by even a moderate wind. By contrast, the mesquite tree that's planted in a dry desert is threatened by its hostile environment. How does it survive? By driving its roots down thirty feet or more into the earth, seeking for water. By adapting and adjusting to harsh conditions, the well-rooted tree becomes strong and steady against all assailants. Our children are like these two types of trees.

Children who have learned to conquer their problems are better anchored and better able than those who have never faced them. So your task is not to eliminate every challenge your child faces. Rather, its to serve as a confident ally on their behalf, encouraging them in their distress, intervening when the threat becomes overwhelming and being available when the crisis comes. You need to give them the tools with which to handle the inevitable problems and pressures of life. The Apostle Paul expresses it this way: "For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, is working for us.' Bottom line: we are trained by our troubles." It will equip them for their future.

St Peter's Bell Ringing

Local solicitors support children's charity

Solicitors from across the South-East have partnered with Chailey Heritage Foundation to support the charity's annual Make A Will Fortnight campaign.

Taking place from 10th to 21st September, members of the public can book an appointment any time during the two week period.

Participating solicitors will kindly be waiving their fees for a fixed number of appointments made during that time. However, individuals are requested to consider a donation to the charity in lieu of payment. Suggested donation amounts are £75 to add a Codicil to an existing Will, £120 for a Single Will and £180 for Mirror Wills.

According to a 2016 survey, only 37% of the British public have made a Will. Writing a Will doesn't just give you peace of mind. It ensures that your wishes will be respected and also saves your loved ones from added stress when the time comes.

Chailey Commons Society

The high summer continued through July and into August, punctuated by brief, but welcome, stormy and wet interludes. The commons are very dry, and the bracken has been very tall but is now collapsing, having done its work of food production for growth. Bracken ferns are classified as autotrophic because they can make their own food through photosynthesis. No wonder they try to have such big top growth!

High temperatures continued to occur, and plants have suffered from stress and lack of moisture. The plants with deeper roots do better as can be seen on lawns and grass areas. Pollution can increase, especially in urban areas. Good indicators of levels of pollution are the lichens. Bushy (Fruticose) lichens need clean air, leafy (Foliose) lichens can survive a small amount of air pollution and crusty (Crustose) lichens can survive in

more polluted air. Why not have a look on your garden gate or fence to see for yourself? Our summer butterfly walk was on a really hot day with the sun beating down. We tried to find some shade, but the open areas were good for us to see the more common species. Silver Washed Fritillary and Holly Blue were good ones and Gatekeepers and Large and Small White were in abundance.

Our indoor meetings start this month in Chailey Village Hall on Thursday September 13th at 7.30.p.m. with an illustrated talk by Peter Lovett on 'Spiders – fascinating and worth a closer look'. Come and hear all about spiders – parking and refreshments and visitors welcome.

We will have our Late Summer walk on the common on Saturday September 22nd starting at Memorial Common car park by the A272 at 2.30.p.m. when we will do a leisurely stroll looking at plants and trees and the rejuvenating heathland.

Note: Mary first married James Corrall a rich coal merchant and they lived at Reedons just outside Newick. After his death she married William Henry Hallett, whose family ran a large brewery in Brighton and he was Mayor there some three times.. He died in 1895 and Mary continued to live at Reedons.

Founder and Coordinator Bryan McAlley welcomed Ken Jordan, Chair of Chailey Parish Council who presented the Café with a cheque following a successful bid for a small grant. "This morning has exceeded everybody's expectations" said Bryan "We had 19 volunteers, nearly 40 visitors and attempted 26 repairs (many successfully), including several bicycles, a hedge trimmer, several hoovers an antique evening bag, a necklace and a china cow!"

First repair was Guy Boyling's bicycle – presenting him with a bottle of Prosecco to mark the Cafe's very first repair, Bryan joked that not everybody coming to the Cafe would be quite so well received, but that the cakes on offer were always unbeatable!

Chailey Repair Café is part of a world-wide movement where volunteer experts repair things free of charge. Anyone can bring along broken items or clothing needing repair from home, and have a cuppa and a cake while you wait!

Horns Lodge Community Pub

Last year Lewes District Council granted an Asset of Community Value Order on the Horns Lodge Inn in South Chailey to a group of Chailey residents. This order provides an opportunity for the local community to attempt a bid for the pub should it be put up for sale. Following notification that the owners wished to sell the pub, a public meeting was held in July to gauge how much support there was for doing this. The meeting was well attended and demonstrated strong support for attempting to buy the pub, including pledges of financial support from the community. The District Council has now been notified that we wish to try and bid for the pub and we have been granted until December 8th this year to develop a business plan, raise the finance and be in a position to bid. The first step in this process is to form a working group who will undertake the task of making the bid a reality. A number of people who were involved prior to the public meeting are happy to continue their involvement and some others have volunteered, however we are keen to offer the opportunity of being on the working group to the wider community. It is hoped that the working group will be fully formed early in September.

Chailey Horticultural Society

We are now entering the time of mists and mellow fruitfulness. The summer is drawing to a close and summer fruit and veg is being gathered in and the rest prepared for the winter.

French and runner beans will still be cropping and will need regular picking and watering. Don't forget if you get fed up with them, just leave them to form a bean and as the pod dries ,pick and dry and use them in the kitchen. I think it is always best to buy fresh seed and not use homegrown. This is because cross pollination may occur so you are never entirely sure what you are getting.

Tomatoes will continue to ripen through out the month but be on the lookout for blight. If in doubt bring them in and ripen them on a sunny windowsill. Sweet peppers and aubergines are eaten fresh but chillies can be dried or frozen. I tend to dry them by leaving them in a bowl in a sunny spot. When dried they will keep for years.

Dig main crop potatoes and only store those in perfect condition in a hessian sack in a cool dark place. Those not perfect use straight away.

If need be support sprouts and keep a constant vigil for caterpillars.

Autumn raspberries will be fruiting. When they have finished leave the canes and cut them down to ground level in January and February. Summer fruiting raspberries should have the fruiting canes cut out and the new ones tied in.

Apples will be ready to pick. If you are unsure if they are ripe cup one in your hand and lift and gently twist. If it comes away it is ripe. Also when cut in half the seeds should be dark brown.

Pears are more difficult. As they ripen the neck gets to shows a little softness and may become faintly yellow. Sometimes it is best to pick, store and try!

Next month is the time to plant over wintering onions, garlic and I think shallots. Prepare the ground with a general purpose fertiliser and a little added lime well raked in.

Early Autumn is the time to plant out next years strawberries from runners raised in the summer. They like a rich soil with lots of well rotted compost added lime and a sunny position.

Also don't forget all the free pleasures available in the autumn in the form of sloes, blackberries and mushrooms.

As a society we are always looking for new ideas and new members. Our A.G.M. is at 8pm in The Reading Room on the 18th October so please come along and join us.

Chailey Litter Pickers

834 Bags so far!

One of the items of litter that we pick up on an all too frequent basis is the disposable coffee cup. The Environment Audit Committee is calling on the Government to introduce a 25p "latte levy" on these cups, and for all coffee cups to be recycled by 2023.

Cups are already technically recyclable, something that some coffee companies promote on their packaging. However, due to the complicated way in which they are produced,

the vast majority of coffee cups do not end up being recycled.

- UK throws away 7 million coffee cups every day, that's 2.5 billion cups every year
- Less than 1 per cent of coffee cups are recycled
- Half a million cups are littered every day

Though they are made largely of paper, disposable coffee cups are lined with plastic polyethylene, which is tightly bonded to the paper making the cups waterproof and therefore able to contain liquid. This means cups cannot be recycled at standard recycling plants, and must instead be taken to special facilities — only three of which exist in the UK.

Un-recycled plastic takes hundreds of years to break down, meaning lots of it ends up impacting the natural environment; microplastics are ingested by animals and chemicals created can be toxic.

The paper component of coffee cups is not without its environmental harms either. Many paper cups are made from virgin paper pulp. That means trees must be felled to produce a product that only ends up being used for the length of time it takes to drink a latte. Add to this the carbon footprint of coffee cup manufacturing and distribution for these single-use items, and it is clear that disposable coffee cups have a major impact on the environment.

What can we do? Use re-useable cups, take your own cup to a coffee shop, look for coffee companies who take this matter seriously and support them and please don't throw them away on the verges of the countryside.
