Dear Residents of Chailey,

I want to share with you a true story written by a lady called Joy Gadsby about the power of prayer. The story is called, 'It was just a card.'

When I visited my nephew, then a vicar in Suffolk, a year ago I was prevailed upon to stay an extra day as the clergy from the deanery were going by coach to visit Mother Julian's chapel in Norwich and there was a spare place for me.

In the bookshop there I bought an attractive postcard with the well known words of Mother Julian, 'All shall be well, and all shall be well; all manner of things shall be well.' I put the card in my prayer book and there it stayed until several months later I received a phone call from one of my Northumbria Community friends asking me to pray for her. Her life, she said, was falling apart, she had lost her job and temporarily at least her faith. She felt, she said, completely at sea. I remembered the card and sent it to her with a message of support on the back, and she put it in her Bible.

Several weeks later she phoned me again. This time to say she was about to start a new job, her life had got back together again and prayers had been answered. Then she told me about the card. She had woken up one morning and suddenly felt prompted to take it out and put it in her window of her front room which faces on to the street - the card could be clearly read from outside. A week later there came a knock on her door and a strange young man was standing there, he said he'd read the words on the card and could he come in and talk to her. Rather hesitantly, she invited him in and offered him a cup of tea. He told her he'd won a scholarship to Oxford University but found the pressure too much and had suffered a severe nervous break-down. My friend, having had a similar experience, was able to help him and he went away more hopefully than he had set out.

At a 'Churches Together' meeting a week or two later she met the boy's mother, who told her that her son had not spoken one word to her or anyone since coming home from Oxford until the day he'd read the card and come into my friend's house for help. He was now fully recovered and had recommenced his studies, this time successfully. The sceptic would say that it is a series of co-incidents, but I believe it is the intervention of the Holy Spirit.

Prayer is a very powerful thing, and throughout the years of my ministry I have seen many answers to prayer, some of them miraculous. I have seen people miraculously healed of all kinds of serious illnesses, by the laying on of hands with prayer. We have a ladies prayer group that meets every Tuesday and they have seen many answers to prayer as they pray for our parish and the world at large. You do not need fancy words or long prayers, as you can see Mother Julian's prayer was very simple and short, but God hears our prayers and answer's our prayers, but in order for Him to do that, He needs to hear from you first.

The Agricultural Board advises poultry keepers to pay special attention to their stock at the present time. The country is very largely dependent on home supplies of eggs during the continuation of the War. Every effort should therefore be made to select and retain young and healthy laying stock and pullets and one year old hens should receive careful attention. In feeding poultry much that is often regarded as refuse may be profitably utilised; small potatoes, cabbage leaves, 'tailings' should be carefully conserved and fed in order to obviate the use of food required for other purposes.

Although there are large stocks of food in the country it is urged as the duty of every occupier consideration of the needs of others to relieve hardship that a rise in food stuffs will entail. A local committee consisting of the under named gentlemen, Messrs R.C. Blencowe, H.W. Bessemer, R. Norman and R.A. Ravenhill exists for the Parishes of Chailey and Newick to deal with this important matter.

Chailey Litter Pickers

We've collected 96 bags so far!

A small group turned out for our last group picking event on Saturday 2nd July. Seven black bags of litter were cleared from the A275 between North Chailey roundabout and the Warrs Hill Lane turning and along Warrs Hill Lane itself (plus two gas bottles which had been dumped on the verge).

Litter is now regularly picked from Cinder Hill (opposite the Five Bells pub), Mill Lane and Honeypot Lane (past Chailey school), the A275 from Beggars Wood Road turning up to the North Chailey roundabout and along the full length of Beggars Wood Road. I hope you have noticed a difference!

- Please contact me if you have noticed any areas of heavy littering and we will prioritise it for being picked.
- Please also contact me if you notice any fly tipping; this should also be reported
 to Lewes District Council via their online reporting form, but I can monitor the situation
 and chase them up if need be.

We need You! Yes, we really do need more volunteers to join the ranks of litter pickers. Well done to anyone who already picks up litter around where they live. I'd love to hear from you. But we need more pickers to cover the wider Chailey area especially along those country roads where car drivers throw out a lot of litter.

Shaping Chailey: The Steering Group places current drafts of our Plan on the website for comment. Your comment and advice is valuable and essential - please use this 'prompt' to consider the Group's initial thoughts on Housing & the

Environment: and on Design.

The Council met with Highways on July 18th and requested clarification of the policy on verges. It is guite clear that Highways cannot permit any obstruction to be placed alongside the highway as it might cause and/or contribute to an accident. Highways agreed to investigate on our behalf whether a previous scheme to protect interesting verges, in particular from being mowed, still exists. The Council emphasised that several residents were interested to protect rare or attractive wild plants and flowers. and will inform residents of the results. This thought and possibility has also been passed to the Neighbourhood Planners.

Highways quarterly meeting: At the same meeting, we also discussed the unsatisfactory nature of grass-cutting this year, which has been a difficult year with a change of contractor and vigorous growth as a result of the inclement weather. The contractor is now on schedule and we anticipate the next cut will be at the end of August. We had hoped to update ourselves on Warrs Hill Road and the results of the Survey; however the officer concerned was unable to be present and we expect to discuss with him after our print deadline.

Finally, we discussed complaints in regard to the footway along the North side of the A272 from the King's Head to Hazeldene Lane and have asked for overgrowth to be cut away.

Co-option: Alan Scott has resigned and the Clerk anticipates co-opting a new Councillor in the autumn to make up our complement of eleven Councillors. He will advertise the procedure on our website, in Chailey News, and in the Parish Pump.

We make no apologies for repeating our appeal for volunteers for the Volunteers: many societies and activities which are the backbone of our village life. The Bonfire Society's appeal last month made Councillors forcibly aware of the opportunities for volunteers in our village societies. We know that organisations as different as the Chailey Youth Group and the Newick Health Centre Driving Service are looking for volunteer support. Chailey has a fine set of societies: this is not an appeal to residents' wallets. but an appeal to get involved!

Parish Council Office: Several residents have already taken advantage of our Office now being located within Chailey to visit and meet the Clerk in order to discuss Parish matters. Please check in advance (by e-mail or telephone) to give the Clerk the opportunity to prepare - for example, by locating any information required, and so avoid a wasted journey.

As a general rule, the Office is open between 10.00 and 12.00 on weekday mornings.

Our July Members' Meeting started with the clanging of a loud bell together with shouts of 'Oyez', 'Oyez'! It was our speaker of the evening Peter White, who is the Town Crier of Seaford, and he gave his talk entitled Town Criers and Bellman Past and Present. He was resplendent in a uniform based on authentic

RUBBISH COLLECTION – what you do you think – have your say?

All councils throughout England are looking to save essential services and improving them, whilst

struggling with funding and finding ways to save money. The Lewes District Council's Leader and Cabinet are currently looking at waste collection – I should add that I am not on the Cabinet and would prefer to see a more democratic system where decisions are made by all Councillors at full Council meetings. The Cabinet system was imposed on Councils in 2000, but in 2011 The Localism Act encouraged and allowed new freedoms for local authorities. Not every Council in England has a Cabinet system, some have a modern, streamlined committee system or hybrid arrangements. I think it is what best suits the people we represent. Not all agree with me.

I was asked a direct question not so long ago and I should be shirking my duty if I didn't answer honestly: "Do I agree that we should continue our weekly household refuse collection?" The answer is Yes – I do.

Many (but never all) residents tell me that they want their – 'smelly' waste to be collected every week: disposable nappies – all female sanitary articles, incontinence pads, foodstuff. The vast majority of us do wish to recycle as much as we can and want it to be nice, easy and hygienic. Most of us want praise – not punishment. All other 'non-smelly' waste can be inter-mingled, jumbled, mixed and recycled in modern processes – green waste, a separate issue.

There is - and will be - convoluted words and combinations on spreadsheets that

promote changing our current system by offering a simpler, more extensive service, but the bottom line is: will our 'smelly' waste be collected every week?

In my view, all residents should have their say. The views of people living in Chailey and indeed the entire District should be considered by the Cabinet.

Chailey and District Horticultural Society

We had a very successful Summer Show on16th July in the Village Hall. It was a lovely summers day with entries well up on last year and a good crowd in the afternoon.

Our Autumn Show is on 10th September so please make a note and if possible enter or if not come and see the exhibits. I have some spare schedules if required so please contact me.

An idea has been floated to have a weekend of open gardens probably alternating between North and South Chailey. All gardens of whatever size or layout with maybe some refreshments provided and prehaps donations to local charities.

Now for gardening matters. The Summer is coming to an end and the Autumn crops are beginning to ripen. Tomatoes and potatoes are liable for blight especially in warm wet weather. The spore is carried in the air and can only settle on wet leaves so greenhouse tomatoes are usually spared provided the leaves are kept dry. Blight first appears as brown patches on leaves and rapidly spreads to adjacent leaves and fruit and eventually to potato tubers. Prevention is difficult. Ensuring a free flow of air helps as does prophylactic spraying with Bordeaux Mixture (soon to be withdrawn). However once it has struck little can be done. With potatoes remove all growth above ground to prevent spread to the tubers. With tomatoes remove infected leaves and if mature take the fruit inside to ripen. There are blight resistant varieties of both tomatoes and potatoes so they might be worth a try.

Cut out the fruiting canes of summer raspberries and tie in the new growth. Remove the fruiting branches of currants.

Figs will be starting to ripen and the big problem then is birds. It is usually impracticable to net the whole tree, so I use old pieces of cloth to make bags to protect the fruit as soon as signs of ripening appear.

French and runner beans need plenty of water during dry spells and continual harvesting to ensure continual cropping. Also remember that the mature bean of both varieties can be dried and added to stews etc.

Don't forget the Autumn Show on 10th September.
