



Dear residents of Chailey,

It seems a bit odd to be writing about Christmas in November, but as you have no doubt noticed on the television there are already adverts by the large retailers, and this years 'must have' presents.

Just before I started to write this news letter I read a survey taken by Premier Christian radio which saddened me and also made me realise how far the spiritual compass of our nation has shifted. It also asks the question 'has the established Church failed in its mission?' The survey showed that: Only 12% of adults know the Nativity Story, more than one-third of children do not know whose birthday it is, meanwhile 51% of people say that the birth of Jesus is totally irrelevant to their Christmas. There is also a story of a teacher in Birmingham who got his pupils to chant 'there is no Christmas.' The Christian faith has been at the core of our nation for centuries, many have given their life for their faith, but over the years the element of a living faith has been eroded, which has created a spiritually bankrupt society. When I went to School many years ago, even though it was not a particularly good School we had assembly every day, we learnt the Lords prayer and sang hymns, and listened to Bible stories. Many people I meet now who come to arrange a wedding or a funeral do not know any hymns or parts of the Bible.

Without Christmas there would be no Easter. At Christmas God stepped into our world in human form, He came as a baby born to a young girl, a virgin. He did not have to do it, He chose to do it to show His love for you and me, in Jesus we see the perfect image of God. In an article written by a wonderful Christian writer named Max Lucado he paints the picture of the birth of Jesus very well.

'The ground is hard, the hay scarce. Cobwebs cling to the ceiling, Mary looks into the face of her Son. Her Lord. His Majesty. At this point the human being who best understands who God is and what He's doing is a teenage girl... She remembers the angels words, "His kingdom will never end." Majesty in the midst of the mundane. Holiness in the filth of sheep manure and sweat. Divinity entering the world on the floor of a stable. This baby had once overlooked the universe. His robes of eternity were exchanged for the rags keeping Him warm. The golden throne room abandoned in favour of a dirty sheep pen. Worshipping angels replaced with shepherds. Meanwhile the city hums. unaware that God has visited their planet. The innkeeper would never believe that he'd just sent God out into the cold. And people would scoff at anyone who told them that the Messiah lay in the arms of a teenager on the outskirts of the village. They were too busy to consider the possibility. But those who missed His Majesty's arrival that night missed it not because of acts of evil or malice. No, they missed it because they weren't looking for Him!'

This Christmas, in the midst of the toys, the tinsel, and the tumult, stop and look for Jesus. If you know Him as your Lord and Saviour, take time to worship Him. And if you don't, make Him your Lord and Saviour. If you do it'll be the best Christmas you've ever had. It's time to put the Christ back in Christmas.

We hope that we will see you at one of our services over Christmas or at our Christmas lunch on the 17th December.

We wish you a very Happy Christmas and blessed New Year.

The Society held its A.G.M. on the 22nd of October. Plans for the coming year were made and we were very pleased to welcome five new committee members

On Saturday 6th February we are holding a tea party and social get together in the Village Hall from 2.30 to 5 pm. December is the month to order seeds etc for the coming year.

Complete winter digging and muck spreading so the soil has the rest of the winter to settle down. Stake tall sprout and broccoli plants against winter gales and cover with netting to discourage the birds.

Bare rooted fruit trees should be planted and time to start pruning apples and pears but not stone bearing fruit trees such as peaches, plums and apricots. Also time to prune the grapevine.

Ensure all fallen leaves are raked up and composted and then sit back and enjoy a lovely Christmas.

LEWES DISTRICT COUNCIL - BOUNDARY CHANGES

I voted against the recommendations made by the Electoral Review Working Group on Monday November 9th, together with my colleague

from Barcombe and Hamsey - Cllr Isabelle Linnington and our County Councillor representative - Cllr Jim Sheppard. We are unhappy that interests and identities of local people were not considered by the cross-party working group.

We submitted evidence and criteria that reflect the interests and identities of our local communities, as well as material considerations based on our local knowledge. We

pointed out that there would be many 'exception' cases in rural areas, such as Chailey. We do not support the decision to amalgamate Chailey with Barcombe and Hamsey. We do support retaining the joint ward of Chailey and Wivelfield. Chailey Parish Council and Wivelsfield Parish Council also strongly see no reason for Chailey to amalgamate with Barcombe and Hamsey. We shall all submit our separate recommendations of objection.

AIRSPACE

Residents have contacted me as far as the increased aircraft noise in our village and, indeed County. Gatwick is to hold an independent review into the new and intrusive flight paths. For us to learn more, it would be helpful if Chailey residents wrote to the Chief Executive asking Lewes District Council to take the initiative and write to Gatwick, on our behalf, for more detailed information. SPEED LIMITS – AGREEMENT 5 YEARS AGO – A272 Pellingbridge to North Chailey – Safety Improvements

Every month, for 5 years – I have contacted the Director of Transport and the Lead Member for Transport asking them why the agreed works have not been done. It was unfortunate that East Sussex were advised by the police to work with West Sussex, as it has made the consultation incredibly complex and slow. The new 50 mph limit (we were not successful in getting 40 mph, Sussex Police did not support this) will run from Scaynes Hill through North Chailey.

At this time of peace and goodwill, I have suggested to the Director of Communities, Economy and Transport that it would be appreciated if our patience be rewarded by commencing work.

CHEC

Some 112 years ago a nurse and seven disabled young men came to Chailey and moved in to what was then Chailey Workhouse. The nurse's name was Grace Kimmins and what she started in 1903 was to become known as Chailey Heritage. Her aim was simple. To teach disabled young people a craft through which they could earn a living. When I came to Chailey Heritage in 1983 it still bore the name, Chailey Heritage Craft School, a name that reflected those early ambitions. Over the years however the disabilities became so severe and complex that the aspiration of work became unrealistic and the word "craft" disappeared from its title. However even today there are young disabled people, who most would assess as having little or no capacity to work yet who still hold the aspiration of having a job on leaving education. Where does this aspiration originate given that most of their experience in education and care has been devoid of such an expectation? Maybe it lies in observations of the world that surrounds them and the experience of parents, peers, siblings and friends or maybe it's a basic characteristic of humanity that we each need and seek a purpose.

20 years ago CHEC (Chailey Heritage Enterprise Centre) came into being to address this need of some severely disabled young people to have a purpose through doing a job of work. In 2002, in order to address wider charitable objects, CHEC separated from its

parent Chailey Heritage School, (now called Chailey Heritage Foundation) and today, whilst still residing on the Chailey Heritage site, exists as an independent charity its trusteeship and management having sole responsibility for all aspects, including funding, of its operation.

Over its 20 year life we have been joined by two dozen or so young people, some who are still with us, others who have moved away, and some who sadly have passed away. All came of their own volition in an attempt to add purpose and value to their lives through having work to do. In addition recent research has identified sociological, emotional, psychological as well as physical benefits that result of "having a job".

As the advert in this edition of Chailey News explains CHEC achieves its charitable objects by designing and printing onto a range of materials for a range of purposes. Currently we design, print and supply products for a growing number of local organisations, companies and individuals This magazine was printed in CHEC, many of the large banners you may see around the villages of Newick and Chailey were printed by CHEC. If you're a current user of CHEC services....pass it on. If not visit our website and please consider us next time you are looking for printed and embroidered items for whatever purpose. If the particular item you are looking for isn't there give us a ring. New processes and product lines appear quite regularly so we may be able to help. Its early morn and every lay-by , every inch of solid ground has a yellow dumper parked on,


Wouldn't be so bad if it were only a few but there are loads waiting for their 09.30 curfew, They are not allowed to do their business until after this time,

Two fully laden dumpers parked in Haywards Heath high street are causing a stir, They are blocking the taxi rank and the cabbies are ruffling their fur, One of the dumper drivers has ripped his jacket and its hanging by a thread What on earth are they doing here, Oh! I see, hot pasties a piece from Greggs.

All quiet on the dumper front this morning sshhhh! not one yellow peril in sight, No Scania signs in my interior mirror to give me a fright. I have just arrived at HH station and I'm in total total despair Yellow flipping dumpers everywhere.

St Peter's At a special assembly the children sang the songs of Harvest Home and



School I started school during the first week of the Second World War. Mrs. Garbutt, our Deputy Head, asked me if I would speak to her class of 5 and 6 year olds about life when I was their age. The children knew in advance that someone was coming to speak to them but they didn't know who. All they had was a picture of me as a child. It was the day after Armistice Day so the class knew a little about war. I told them about rationing and air raid shelters and also that naughty boys were subject to corporal punishment. They asked me lots of questions and we compared life today with all its gadgets and electronics to a time when we had none. I stayed on for the class assembly and told them the parable of the Good Samaritan. I suspected that the children would not be au fait with the geography and politics of Palestine two thousand years ago so I changed the road to Jericho to the road to Lewes and I replaced the Samaritan with a girl with a van from Newick. Speaking to them afterwards they understood who their neighbour was.

I have recently returned from my holiday in Greece. The Greeks have long taken the Samaritan parable to heart with their philosophy of Filoxenia that translates as friendship for strangers. While I was there I had an amusing encounter with two young women passers by outside my hotel. They engaged me in conversation about the family of cats

that were sleeping on the door step. The girls told me that they were on holiday from Wiltshire. Then one of them asked me how it was that I spoke such good English. It would seem that there might still be Moonrakers in Wiltshire.

On behalf of the pupils, staff and governors heres wishing all our readers a Happy and Peaceful Christmas.

Chailey School Shanghai-ed!

In fluent Mandarin, spoken by a variety of students, Mr Ji Changzhan and Mr Hu Yiqun, two Maths teachers from Shanghai, were welcomed to Chailey School last month. Sam and Jason (in Shanghai it is the custom for students to adopt an English name when they start learning English at the age of four and to keep this name into their adult life!) have been teaching Maths at the School while, at the same time, taking part in seminars for teachers from other Schools in Sussex.

Chailey is the Maths Hub for East Sussex, a tribute to its excellence which brings the responsibility of being the centre where teachers from across Sussex can view and discuss the School's methodology to further their own professional development.

The Shanghai Maths project is part of a project initiated by Newick and provides an opportunity to research and identify those parts of the Shanghai approach to teaching mathematics that can be implemented in English school settings.

Lost on the Titanic

Our lecturer Dominic Riley will tell the story of just one of the many valuable items that sank with the Titanic on the 15th April 1912. Sangorski & Sutcliffe a bookbinding firm was founded in London in 1901and their most famous work, 'The Great Omar,' a copy of the Rubayat of Omar Khayyam, contained over a thousand jewels. It was the most elaborate and opulent binding ever created. Dominic will tell us the very moving story of life after the Titanic and of one young man in particular who decided to recreate the binding.

Dominic studied Art History at University and Bookbinding at the London College of Printing. He has lectured in UK and the USA, runs workshops, training seminars and was editor of 'Gold Leaf' the journal of Hand Book Binders.

Come and enjoy what should be a very interesting lecture. Visitors are always most welcome, the cost is £7 on the door and as always there will be a chance to talk to the speaker. We have installed a unit on the outside wall of The Chailey Free Church. It is available 24hrs a day for use. But before collecting it dial **999** first and talk with the Ambulance Service. They will talk you through the procedure using CPR and then the defibrillator by which time hopefully you will have either a Community First Responder and/or a Ambulance with you. The rules on using CPR have recently changed and so that you can know about them we shall be running a training course or two depending on demand. 
