

Dear residents of Chailey,

As we approach the festive season, I thought I might share with you a Christmas Parable which I hope that you enjoy.

Chailey Commons Society

The year seems to have passed by quickly again but has been accompanied by some stunning autumn colours which lasted well until the November frosts came. The commons have remained quite dry with the usual wet areas needing some winter rains to soak them again,

Our ever-popular Fungus Foray was on Red House Common and, despite predictions of a shortage of specimens to look at, some rain had fallen just in time and we could explore the common and find a surprising amount of colourful fungi including the wonderful red Fly Agaric, the prominent yellow and brown Sulphur Tuft and a whole collection of brown ones of various shapes and sizes. Our leader was Rosalie once again giving the benefit of her knowledge about this marvellous kingdom waiting to be discovered. We were glad of the children to help us with their keen young eyes and boundless enthusiasm, especially Alexander who seemed tireless in his efforts to search amongst the bracken and birch trees. We thank Rosalie for her enthusiasm and this is her last year of leading the walk as she is easing up on her commitments in this way. Who will lead us next year – could it be you I wonder?

We have also been out walking with the Ranger to help plan the winter work on the common, and have also met with Francesca from the PondNet Project, one of the three projects within the Freshwater Habitats Trust. She has special records for our ponds at Chailey, notably for the Pond Mud Snail and the Fairy Shrimp. We spent an afternoon pond dipping to find these creatures as they are quite rare and need recording. We are going to set up a small Pond Group to carry on surveys, so do let us know if you can help. There is no meeting in December so our next one is indoors in the Chailey Village Hall on January 19th 2017 at 7.30.p.m. when we hope to have a visit by Roy Hale to tell us about the story of Gideon Mantell the Dinosaur Doctor.

In November our speaker was Kevin Gordon, a trustee of Seaford Museum, talking about the Lost Village of Tide Mill, situated between Newhaven and Seaford. The Mill was erected in 1761 and the village, housing about 100 workers, grew up around it. As the time of the tides changed, so the workers had to alter their working hours which including working during the night at times. The worst storm in living memory took place in 1875 causing much damage. The price of flour dropped and finally the mill was knocked down by the Railways in 1901, with the last residents being forced to leave in 1939. The area was cleared and then played an important part in army training during the war. This was a most interesting talk and we were delighted to welcome a number of guests and visitors.

Merry Christmas and A Happy New Year! Councillors wish all residents of Chailey a peaceful and joyous Christmas and happiness, good health and good fortune in 2017.

Chailey Common: Jo Heading, our Ranger, has written to say that there are now no animals grazing on the combined commons (Memorial, Pound and Romany Ridge). The Exmoor ponies are remaining on Red House and there are also ponies grazing at Lane End. [NB Emergency number for the Sussex Pony Grazing and Conservation Trust is *07917 420296*]

Sports Pavilion: The Council is commissioning a refurbishment of the Pavilion adjacent to the Ground on Memorial Common, working in consultation with Chailey Sports Club. The first task has been to rewire the Pavilion to bring it up to current standards and this work will be completed during November. The Council has commissioned a surveyor to oversee the project and to act as principal designer on our behalf. We anticipate that the refurbishment (which will be funded in varying proportions by the Council and the Club) will begin on site before next Spring, working around the continuing use of the Pavilion.

Volunteers: It is regrettable that Chailey Youth Group is currently in abeyance. The Group has played a significant and enjoyable part in our life for some eight years and enjoyed modest financial support from the Parish Council and Sussex Police. The Club met fortnightly in the Village Hall or on Away-days outside Chailey and the programme included both games and learning – for example, to cook.

The Parish Council, Cllr Peter Olbrich, would be very happy to know of and hear from any resident willing to take on this rewarding responsibility

Public telephone box: BT are consulting (until November 30th) on the future of the red Gilbert Scott telephone box on the A272 adjacent to the Old Post Office. The Parish Council will also consider this matter and will take into account any advice received from residents no later than December 15th.

Play streets: Lewes District Council has told us of a new scheme whereby residents have the opportunity, if they wish, to apply to Lewes District Council to request the temporary closure of the road where they live for a few hours on selected days or evenings to give children the opportunity to play there. Residents in the road where the proposed play street is situated must agree to the idea. Applicants have to demonstrate that at least 60% of residents and businesses affected agree to the road being closed. Further information on the Lewes DC website or from Lewes District Council.

It really is amazing what we find when we're litter picking; today I found a kettle hanging in a bush; a while ago I found a hunting knife. But the most common items seem to be discarded by car drivers; Red Bull cans, McDonalds food wrappers, Costa coffee cups, soft drink bottles, cans, cigarette packets, crisp packets, chocolate wrappers and so the list goes on. Almost every time we go litter picking we find car hub caps, which makes me wonder how they manage to come off with such regularity.

Whilst litter picking does result in a feeling of satisfaction, of a job well done, there can also be a feeling of disappointment that the issue is never ending. We really do depend on the goodwill and generously given time of people who are willing to pick up other peoples rubbish. At this festive time of year, when we think of others rather than ourselves, I challenge the people of Chailey to join the fight against litter, to take a few minutes each week to pick up a few pieces of litter, to not pass by, but to make a decision to become part of the solution. Together we CAN make a difference!

Chailey Horticultural Society

Our schedule for 2017 is now available. I hope to be able to leave some copies in the pubs and South Chailey Surgery for anyone who would like either to look through it or take it home. Unfortunately there will not be any in the shop.

Hopefully this will encourage you to come and see the shows and prehaps enter.

December and January can be quite quiet times in the garden. However it is wise to keep on top of the fallen leaves and not let them rot on the ground but rot them down in a compost heap Also prehaps now is the time for some reflections on the recent season. One of the most obvious changes in recent years is the dramatic decline in bees and other pollinating insects. It would appear that many factors are at work here including changes in agricultural practices with large fields of monoculture and general loss of

habitat. However the widespread and indiscriminating use of insecticides must also be to blame. There is little the amateur gardener can do except not to use them. Always be careful using any spray and strictly follow the instructions and avoid spraying during daylight when pollinators are active. Good plant hygiene and the use of a biological control should help reduce the need for chemicals. There are many varieties of bees and flies which act as pollinators. As Einstein said without bees humans would quickly die out through starvation.

Garden centres have many bee friendly homes which can be deployed throughout the garden. Also leave patches of wild growth with nettles and wild flowers.

It is the responsibility of all gardeners to protect their best friends - bees and worms! December and January are the months to look through the catalogues and plan. Think of plug plants and if you have not done so why not try some grafted tomatoes, peppers and chillies.

For those with a frost free conservatory or heated greenhouse growing potatoes in a sac is well worth it for a very early crop of lovely new potatoes. Foremost or Rocket make good choices. Get them as soon as possible and get them chitted in a light and frost free place. As soon as they start to sprout get them in the bag! Place about 6 inches of compost in the bottom of the sac and then place 4 or 5 potatoes, sprout upward on top and just cover with a layer of compost. As the potatoes grow through add more compost until just below the top of the bag. Remember to keep moist and look forward to early May when they will be ready.

ST. PETER'S CE PRIMARY SCHOOL - SAFETY PROBLEMS

I am trying to help Mrs. Munch Morrow, Head teacher of St. Peter's and the children that need assistance crossing the road to attend school. I have written to Rupert Clubb, Director of Transport and Environment and Cllr Carl Maynard who holds the portfolio and asked them to consider deviating from the national Road Safety Guidelines. I have done this as the District Councillor for Chailey, as I am informed that the local Councillor can appeal - which is what I am doing. It is possible for the precedent to be changed and local circumstance can, and should be considered. Whilst I appreciate the guidelines that are set down, I have asked for St Peter's to be looked at with a sensible and flexible approach. I have the support of our County Councillor Jim Sheppard. It is a hard job for all our County Councils in England to look after services with less funding, but I am of the opinion that St Peter's is unusual in its safety needs. The school was built when horses and carts travelled along the A275 and the rural community walked to school. Not so in the 21st-century.

Chailey School in Nepal: What an amazing experience - so what did they do – and see? Twenty-six Year 9 & 10 students, along with three members of staff, flew to Kathmandu where they spent two days seeing the sights, before taking a fourteen-hour bus journey into the Everest mountain region, arriving at their campsite in pitch black and with no electricity.

The journey was well worth it however, when the following morning students awoke to the sight of the sun rising on Mount Everest itself.

Six days of hiking and camping followed in order to reach Maati Village, where students camped for a further four nights while spending their days carrying out volunteer work and giving donations to assist in the rebuilding of the local school following last year's earthquake; they also provided the villagers with clothing and supplies for the winter months and for the children's schooling. The students' efforts were hugely appreciated by the village, who demonstrated this with a traditional Nepalese ceremony of thanks on their departure.

The group arrived back in Kathmandu after one further night camping and another fourteen hour bus journey through the mountains. A few hours shopping in the local area was taken before flying back to the UK for a well-earned shower and sleep!

Ben Austin, leading the expedition commented that all of the students were exceptional throughout the trip and were a credit to themselves, their parents and the School. They showed remarkable resilience under some very testing conditions and admirably handled every challenge that was thrown at them.

Fiction to go! Our Library is key to our English language and literacy programmes. The School has invested in an exciting selection of new Key Stage 3 and 4 fiction. Some of the books are 19th century classics which support the new GCSE English syllabus, but the selection of several hundred books includes a wide range by current popular and award-winning authors, representing different genres. But after cataloguing, the books did not come to rest on the shelves: Heather Duck, our Library Manager, laid them out on the Library tables, encouraging students during their library lessons and in the morning and lunch breaks to view and borrow them to read at home.

Enterprise Day: Students value the opportunities of an extended curriculum, and Enterprise Day challenges Year 10 to create a product that meets a given brief; and present it to judges in a clear and concise manner – for example, in 2012 students were challenged to create a promotional object related to the Olympics. During the day students work in small groups to create their vision, to research the market, and to produce materials to promote their product – all the time keeping a beady eye on finance and business planning. The School recruits experienced business people to give their time and expertise to come into the school to assist the teams and, at the end of the day, judge the outcomes. The winning group will enjoy a mystery adventure at Bewilderbox in Brighton, an enterprising start-up in its own right.

Lunchtime clubs: A vital and regular part of the extended curriculum are the Lunchtime Clubs, run by teachers working with students: sometimes these represent extra tuition, but frequently the Club is practical work based on classroom learning – in STEM Club in Science and Technology, for example, students recently suspended solids such as beads, cherry tomatoes, popcorn kernels, bolts and ping pong balls among layers of honey, syrup, milk, water, dish soap, paraffin and rubbing alcohol to make some really vivid layers (or density columns) – all due to the different densities!

December is the season of school Christmas productions, some of them Nativity plays, that tell the familiar Christmas story....or at least a story put together from various parts of the Bible.

Just two of the four Gospel writers, Matthew and Luke, give us an account of the Christmas story. John tells us about the Word made flesh in a prologue to his Gospel and Mark presents us with an adult Jesus ready to be baptised.

Luke tells us about the Archangel Gabriel, Mary's visit to Elizabeth, the journey to Bethlehem, Jesus' birth and the laying of the baby in a manger because there was room at the inn. Then we hear about the shepherds.

In Matthew's shorter story, it is Joseph who is visited by an angel and there's nothing about Elizabeth, a manger or shepherds. What Matthew does tell us about, is the visit of wise foreigners and their gifts, a story of terrible brutality towards children, the distress of their grieving parents and how the saviour of the world became a refugee.

Stories of equally callous brutality in Syria and Iraq have stained 2016 with fresh blood and the airwaves carry the cries of contemporary agony. Matthew's saviour-refugee will speak of judgement on the behaviour of those who respond to the needs of the stranger, the hungry, the homeless, the detained prisoner and the sick. Our care for the homeless, the hungry, the prisoner and the refugee, is the welcome we offer to the one born in Bethlehem at Christmas.

May this Christmas be a joy to you and to everyone.
