Dear residents of Chailey,

I believe that one of nature's most beautiful works of art is the spider's web. Its intricate pattern consists of strand upon strand of delicate engineering and it always makes me gasp when I see one. Add a few drops of rain or a frost and there before you lies the Taj Mahal suspended by threads in the air and then the beautiful becomes exquisite.

In the Autumn we were trapped in a giant spider's web at the Rectory and it was a little bit unnerving. The scaffolders arrived and began building a giant meccano set around our house, that too became a work of art, but not so beautiful. We could not go into any room without wondering if someone was watching us. I spent a lot of time checking if the coast was clear, so that we could do all the things that we had to do. We felt trapped, but we knew it would only be a temporary prison, just a gentle house arrest.

The builders left just before Christmas and left us with the most generous gift. Warmth. I have been cold for 30 years, albeit in Church or in Vicarages. Poor heating, poor insulation and draughty windows. Now we have cavity wall insulation! What joy. I can close my eyes and dream I am on a tropical shore. Well Brighton on a sunny day. Add to that the duvet our son gave us for Christmas and life is good and warm.

Change of Scribe

When I arrived in Chailey 8 years ago it soon became apparent that we needed to move the Church forward and extend our facilities to reach out into the community. We needed to make it easier for parents with young children and the schools to use the building and therefore we needed a purpose built lavatory, with baby changing facilities. We built this, but we are still cold. As our catering opportunities grew, we needed to build a kitchen and we have. We now feed 40/50 people every month at our Lunch Club, but we and they are cold. Our toddler group, which meets on a Friday morning, and is free to attend, is thriving, we are meeting new babies and parents every week, but we need more space and we are cold.

Our concerts are successful but we are cold. At St Peter's Church we have a welcoming group of people who work hard to make our Church a friendly place. We are striving to continue to bring our Church into the 21st century, but we need space to achieve this and we need warmth. We have created space at the back of the Church, but we need more.

Now we must begin Phase 2 of the work

We have written numerous applications to charities asking for financial help and grants, but we must now begin our own fund raising. To that end we are having a Gift Day on the 31st March in Church. A Gift Day is a day for people who do, or don't attend Church regularly, to have the opportunity to make a one-off gift to help support the Church and in our case, the building project. We hope that as we give the Parish the opportunity to show their thanks for the Church, its ministry and all the memories that life in a rural Parish brings, you may feel happy to make a contribution to our work. The Church will be open on the 31st March between 2-4pm. There will be musical entertainment, tea coffee and cake. We would like to invite you to come and enjoy the beautiful Easter flowers, or just come and sit if you wish to enjoy the peace of our lovely Church. Or make a gift, if that is your wish.

We have to re-new our heating system as our boiler is rapidly failing, we have been told it probably will not last another year. We want to make space for the toddler group

and to be able to seat more guests at our Lunch Club and also make it easier to hold Craft Fairs, Art Exhibitions, Concerts and all the other activities we are involved in. We believe that God will provide all that we need, therefore we hope that you will come on the 31st March and we pray that you will be happy to make a gift. You can put your gift in an envelope and only the Treasurer will know the contents. You can also be totally anonymous too if you wish.

After a funeral I took some time ago in Church, I heard two elderly men speaking, one said to the other "I am absolutely frozen," to which the second man replied, "I haven't been to Church for years and now I remember why."

This is your Church and we need your help. Thank you.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN: PROGRESS REPORT AND AN INVITATION Progress Report

The Steering Group has been working diligently to refine the policy proposals in the draft Plan, particularly regarding future housing development in the village, and to strengthen the underlying evidence base. (It is not enough for the Plan simply to reflect residents' views: the Inspector, who will have to approve the Plan, before it can come into force, will need to be satisfied that its prescriptions rest on a firm evidence base rather than just a wish list.)

To this end, Chailey Parish Council has engaged the research arm of Lewes District Council to conduct on its behalf a Housing Needs Survey during February and early March. The earlier Shaping Chailey Questionnaire, which was the first step in drawing up the Neighbourhood Plan, identified in qualitative terms the general direction which Chailey residents thought that future housing developments should follow. The objective of this latest survey is to provide more precise evidence about the sort of new housing that Chailey residents judge to be needed in the coming years. This information will provide the evidence base for the housing policies to be included in the final version of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Invitation to Villagers

The survey will be posted to all households in Chailey in the second week of February. Please complete the survey, ticking the boxes that apply to you and the members of your household, and return the completed form in the pre-paid return envelope provided promptly.

Participation is voluntary, but the Council hopes that most residents will wish to take part in this important initiative. All responses will be treated as confidential and will be protected under the 1998 Data Protection Act. Specifically, individual responses will be seen only by the researchers who will analyse and tabulate the returns. Neither Chailey Parish Councillors nor the Parish Clerk will have access to any individual forms: they will see only the summary results.

There will be no attempt to identify individuals or to use the data for any purpose other than that specified above.

POWER NEED

In early January, I contacted UK Power Networks suggesting that Chailey should be monitored as to the use of its network and whether our numerous networks are able to meet the energy demand

required for now and the future.

I have received a response from the South East Community Affairs Officer and he is helpfully willing to investigate if dates and locations of power cuts are identified.

We often have short power cuts and, on behalf of residents I am asking whether we need an up-grade. Clearly, the overwhelming majority of power faults occur due to damage from trees, high winds – storms, electrical equipment or motorists/bikers crashing into electricity poles as some of us experienced on 27th December.

I am sure many residents have this information, but here it is again:

SOUTH DOWNS NATIONAL PARK BRIEFING MEETING FOR LEWES DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

Not many of my fellow colleagues attended this meeting. Representing Chailey residents, in my view - I believe it was important to attend and learn how much weight the National Park's Plan will have over and above national policy and our local Lewes District Plan policies. So many of us cherish and wish to protect the South Downs and the National Park is 85% farmland. It was unusual to include Lewes town in the park as it is the largest urban town in any Park in England. As far as planning and development, the problem lies with our northern rural villages that are outside the park within the District of Lewes – we and our sister villages are vulnerable.

I continue to support resident's wishes of ensuring Chailey retains its rural character whilst wanting to attract young families to our community.

Over Christmas and New Year my husband and I were able to spend a few weeks in New Zealand. We were based in Christchurch a city on the east coast of the south island, but also travelled around a bit, including a week of cycling. The slower pace of cycling allows you to take in the countryside and really appreciate the emptiness of the country in comparison to the UK.

What amazed and saddened me was that while the city was noticeably free of litter, everywhere we went in the countryside there was visible and regular litter. As in the UK common items were plastic bottles, cans and crisp/chocolate wrappers. Litter really is a worldwide problem!

With a population of 66 million the UK has relatively little free space and so there are short distances between villages and towns. In New Zealand there are 4 million people and lots of empty countryside with long distances between settlements. This must make it more difficult to deal with litter as walking those roads to pick it would be pretty impossible.

Here in Chailey our litter pickers are out walking the roads of the parish on a regular basis, giving their time and energy to make where we live a better place. It has been really great to have a few new people join us in the last month. If you hate litter why not join us and do something about it? We'd love to have you along.

Chailey Horticultural Society

February has arrived and may be things are starting to move in the garden.

Seeds must be ordered and potatoes should be chitting in a light frost free place.

For those with a heated greenhouse or warm conservatory this is the time to start growing potatoes in buckets or potato grow bags to give you a crop of new potatoes at the beginning of May. I think the best variety for this is Swift as it combines early cropping with good texture and flavour. Rocket is an alternative though any first early will do. Place 4" to 6" of compost in the bottom of the bag or bucket and on this put 4 potatoes green shoots uppermost and cover with 2" of compost. As the green shoots come through just cover with more compost until within about an inch of the top. Keep well watered and ensure drainage by standing it on bricks. Any earth or compost will do prehaps with some added grow more. At frost free times they can be moved outside and later sowing can be done for a later crop. An excellent way of saving space and great fun for children.

Now is the time to order grafted plants. Most tomatoes, peppers, aubergines, chillies and cucumbers have grafted varieties. A vigorous disease resistant root stock is used and on to this is grafted the fruiting variety. The plants tend to be more vigorous and produce larger crops and do not suffer from soil borne diseases.

Plant now tomato and aubergine seeds for greenhouse growing as they need a long growing season. They will need to be started in a propagator and given plenty of light and warmth to prevent them from becoming leggy. Transplant when the first true leaves appear. Chillies and sweet peppers can be planted next month. A few lettuce seeds started on a windowsill and moved into the greenhouse will give an early crop..

Cut down Autumn fruiting raspberries to ground level and cover with a good layer of manure. The rhubarb patch will also benefit from a good covering of manure.

First Aid Course

Following the success of the CPR and defibrillator training course we propose to run two courses on First Aid.

The first course is Emergency First Aid at Work .This is a 6 hour course and is a recognized certificate in all workplaces. The course covers Care of the unconscious casualty, recovery position , CPR, Defib, choking, heart attack/angina, stroke, bleeds and shock and banging, burns and anaphylactic shock, stroke, diabetes, and asthma. The second course is Emergency First Aid Awareness. This is a 3 hour course and will give delegates a basic overview of the main life threatening First Aid subjects to include unconsciousness and recovery position, CPR and AED, choking, bleeds and shock and bandaging, heart attack/angina.

Early in February, the Church remembers Jesus being presented in the Temple. Wise and holy old Simeon, utters the words of the Nunc Dimittis, including: to be a light to lighten the Gentiles and to be the glory of your people, Israel. It is the proclamation that Jesus is not simply for those associated with him, the Israelites, but for everyone else as well, the non-Israelites, the Gentiles.

Clergy get used to people casually referring to God and to prayer as 'your department' or 'your business'. 'Have a word with your boss' people joke; 'say one for me.' It is as if people acknowledge prayer as valuable, even important, but consider it someone else's business. Perhaps there is too much truth in those jokes that imply prayer is for the specialists or professionals rather than everyone else. The 2018 Year of Prayer reminds us that prayer in the name of Jesus, like Jesus himself, is for everyone and not just for those most publicly associated with him.

Certainly clergy should pray for their people daily at Morning and Evening Prayer, but they are also bidden to ring the church bell to tell everyone that it is happening. Church bells both announce that people are being prayed for and call them to join in whether in Church or elsewhere. If you cannot hear a church bell, you can set an alarm on your watch or mobile phone creating a regular reminder to pray. There are many opportunities to learn about praying this year, not least in Lent which also begins this month, but let me commend to you the Daily Prayer of the Church, which you can download to your PC, smartphone or tablet. Just visit your App Store, search for Church of England, download and join in.

In January we welcomed Ian Kirby who gave us a History of Chailey Heritage. Ian has been a volunteer at the Heritage for 25 years and he described how it has grown from in 1903 when Dame Grace Kimmins came down from London

bringing seven boys with her until today when there are over 80 pupils. It was interesting to hear how during the First World War men who had lost limbs in the fighting came down to learn from boys with the same disabilities how to cope. Now there are many activities for the children, from the hydrotherapy pool, riding ponies, doing artwork and many more. The latest is the establishment of a small farm. The staff/pupil ratio is very high, at least one-to-one and frequently two or even three to one which means a huge amount of money needs to be raised to maintain the Heritage.

Chailey Commons Society

As we move into the second month of the year, we can see that the days are slowly getting longer, and we look forward to spring again. Heavy rains and storms during January have helped to restore the water table and the commons have been rather soggy.

This is a good result for the commons as the ponds and stream are an integral part of the habitat and we now know from surveys during 2017 that we have some special ponds, and there are some quite rare species in them, such as the Mud snail and the Fairy shrimp. The water quality has been found to be good apart from where there is run off from the roads, and we shall be continuing to progress our work in this area with the help of the Flagship Ponds Project through the Freshwater Habitats Trust, guided by their Southern Officer – Francesca Dunn.

Our meetings continue during February with an Indoor Talk called 'Lumps, Bumps and Holes in the ground – history on Chailey Commons' by Linda Ball and Ian Seccombe in the Chailey Village Hall at 7.30.p.m. on Thursday February 8th 2018. Parking and refreshments and visitors most welcome. I look forward to meeting you there.

A final thought for you - no Full Moon in February 2018 - how is this possible? This last happened in 1999 and occurs about 4 times a century. February is the only month that this is possible because the lunar cycle is longer than the number of days in February. When this does occur January and March usually have 2 Full Moon as it does this year. February 1918 - Prisoners of War Concert

Lieut. Clift R.F.C. gave some extremely humorous and rousing songs and Lieut. Rawnsley R.F.C. showed us how much melody could be evolved from

At the conclusion of the concert Mr Skinner proposed and Mr Blogg seconded a very hearty vote of thanks to all those who took part in the programme for the very enjoyable evening. The amount realised was £6 and after the necessary expense it is hoped to hand over the sum of £4 10s to the local Prisoner of War fund.

Well now is your chance to find out. Do come to this very interesting lecture on the origins of drinking glasses and the different drinking habits and customs in other countries

Wine implies a party and throughout the world ceremonial events and festive banquets are always celebrated with wine and the vessels used for this, over the years, have also taken on their own importance. The Greeks were drinking wine from the 13th Century BC. and often drank well into the night whilst discussing ideas, dreams and philosophy., (no change there!) The Germans liked to drink from a large community cup and also favoured the cantir, from which the wine was attempted to be poured into the drinker's mouth via a spout with much merriment involved.

The lecturer Jane Gardiner trained at the V & A where she specialised in early European ceramics and glass. She was also a senior lecturer at Sotheby's Institute of Art for seventeen years. The lecture will be accompanied by a digital presentation and followed by tea and biscuits and a chance to talk to Jane.
