Chailey Cricket Club

Fortunately, the rains came after our season finished and after we completed our end of season work on the square. Sadly, we are having to continually repair the rope round the edge of the square, not because it snaps but because it gets cul! If anyone witnesses the culprits, please advise that the rope is there for a reason. Furthermore, if you do see the rope down, it would great if you contact one of our officials...see website or, of course please attempt a repair. Last moan this year!

Not much else to report other than whilst searching newspaper archives an article popped up reporting on the sad death of a Chailey cricketer (John Boots) whilst playing cricket against Newick. This is also recorded in the parish records. The incident happened on or around 31 May 1737, which would suggest that our birth was more likely around that time rather than first thought as 1758. We continue to trawl records in the hope of finding more gems to report to you all.

One gem – on 13 September 1890, the Sussex Agricultural Express issued a report of a 12-a-side game between the two ends of the village - North and South. The game ended in favour of the South 74 to 66 after which all adjourned to the Five Bells for the rest of the afternoon / evening – as if!! No doubt there were some sore heads the next day! Our 2024 season will start in late April / early May. The fixture list is coming along nicely. Agreed fixtures can be found on our website.

Prior to the beginning of next season weekly nets have been arranged – no, not outside, but at Warden Park Academy - from 24 January 2024. There will be a hire charge so those attending will be expected to help cover the cost. Priority will be given to existing club members but if you are interested in joining the club as always, please contact one of our officials – website below.

Subscriptions (players) for next year will be confirmed at the AGM details of which will be announced in next month's Chailey News. That said the annual subscription is likely to remain the same at £40, although with increasing costs may increase slightly – still unbelievably cheap membership fee for a season of cricket. Obviously, any donations from our collection of vice-presidents would be very welcome.

Chailey Horticultural Society

A very happy and productive new year to you all.

The society intends to have a full range of events in 2024. The dates of our shows are spring- Saturday 23rd March , summer- Saturday 13 July and autumn 14th September. All taking place in Chailey Village Hall. The plant sale will be on Saturday 18th May from 10 am to 12 in the village hall car park. As soon as the 2024 schedule is published it will be posted to all members and copies will be available from committee members and at The Five Bells. In addition to the potatoes in buckets children's competition we will be running two further challenges involving decorating a bag and producing a small trug of garden produce. Details next month.

January can be a frustrating month with a desire to get going hampered by the weather. Although the days start to lengthen the mornings seem to remain dark and gloomy. Often cold and wet it is difficult to get started.

However January is a good month to tend to rhubarb with the splitting of old crowns and planting new ones. If splitting an old crown which should probably be done every five to seven years, use a spade to cut it into segments each with a growth bud. Plant in a hole with plenty of well rotted compost and the growth bud level with the surface. New crowns are planted in the same way. The choice is huge but Champagne is a good one for forcing and produces tender pink stems. Timberley Red is the earliest maturing variety without forcing. Victoria is a classic old variety producing a heavy crop of greenish pink stems of excellent flavour. To force rhubarb place an old bucket with a small hole at the top over the crown or best of all invest in a true terracotta rhubarb forcer which can become a family heirloom! January is the ideal month to start forcing. The heat captured by the forcer and the small area of light make for an early and slightly sweeter growth. Only force a crown every three to four years as forcing does deplete the crowns strength. For the unforced crowns a good covering of garden compost will guarantee good strong plants.

Originally from Russia for a time rhubarb was literally worth its weight in gold as one of very few naturally occurring laxatives.

This year has been a good year for berries generally but Christmas and the New Year are particularly associated with Holly and its berries and now is a good time to plant Holly trees and bushes. Only female trees produce berries and they will need a nearby male for pollination. Holly will grow almost anywhere but if in a pot must not be allowed to dry out. Besides the berries there is also a number varieties with variegated leaves for added interest. Don't worry too much about a male since as in life generally there is probably a male lurking in a nearby garden, hedge or wood!

However there is now a self fertile variety called J.C. van Tol.

Other jobs for January are to make sure all structures and tools are clean and seeds and plants have been ordered. This particularly true of seed potatoes which can be started off in sacks at the end of January provided you have a light and frost free space. Swift is the best first early variety for planting in sacks and will give a harvest in ten to twelve weeks. More about potatoes next month.

Keep warm , dry and cheerful.

Highways: the Parish Council meets with Highways twice a year and our next meeting will be on February 19th. Residents are invited to tell the Clerk before the end of January of any concerns they might wish us to raise with Highways.

East Sussex has contracted Highways to Balfour Beatty (who also contract for West Sussex and Hampshire) and who have stated their aim to be right first time, meaning an intention that repairs only need to be done once. Matthew Milligan, our County Councillor, has reported that Balfour Beatty has set in place a control hub to monitor activity, track work and find ways to improve the service. The introduction of the hub follows the County Council's decision to invest an additional £15.7 million to address increasing road damage caused by extreme weather.

To alert the Hub to problems, residents are invited to go on-line: <u>eastsussexhighways.</u> <u>com/report-problem</u>

Grass cutting: the Parish Council has again opted for Highways to cut our verges twice during 2024. Cuts are scheduled roughly for the end of the first growth period in early summer and again for late summer, but certain areas (e.g. road turnouts) may be separately cut where visibility is seriously obscured. Residents should alert the Clerk and/or go on-line as above to alert the Hub directly.

Planning:

Have your say on future development in Lewes district. Lewes District Council is encouraging as many residents as possible to have their say through this stage of consultation on future development in the district.

The consultation is about gathering your views, and evidence the sites and suggested policies, which together will form strategy and policies. The draft Local Plan, when published in Spring 2024 will set out the policies and framework for new homes, employment space and community facilities. The consultation is running from 29th November 2023 to 8th February 2024. You can view the consultation document online at planningpolicyconsult.lewes-eastbourne.gov.uk

Chailey Map: Ten years ago, the Parish Council celebrated the Queen's Jubilee by commissioning and publishing a pictorial narrative map of Chailey. A copy was presented to each resident at that time. Being homeless and sleeping rough is tough at any time of the year but during winter it can be life-threatening.

This is why the government funds rough sleeping projects in our local councils so that no one has to sleep rough during the winter months. This programme has reduced rough sleeping by nearly a third compared to areas that have not taken part with Rough Sleeper teams in England getting £203m funding to support their work.

It is the case that some rough sleepers either refuse accommodation or fail to stay in the accommodation given. This is not a lifestyle choice, but very often they struggle to maintain a tenancy because of mental health and addiction issues. However we find that once the temperatures start to drop most will accept accommodation, even for a short while.

This year a special effort if going in to housing veterans who find themselves homeless and accommodation is available for anyone who is sleeping rough. Whether it is in a town or a village then we encourage the public to report people sleeping rough to the streetlink team via https://thestreetlink.org.uk This way you do not have to worry who your local council is , the street link team will report it and the local rough sleeping team will visit the area and offer support and housing to the individual.

This is especially important as we head into below freezing temperatures and when the SWEP protocol kicks in where most local authorities provide rough sleepers with a bed in a shelter, food, and washing facilities. This provides shelter from the weather and helps prevent health problems. For example, the opportunity to change out of wet clothes to avoid trench foot. Some charities set up winter shelters during the coldest part of the year and our local councils work with them so that no one is sleeping outside in the cold. So if you spot someone sleeping rough please do report it , the rough sleeping team will visit and offer accommodation and support. We would rather the team visited multiple times than not at all so that this winter everyone has the option of a roof over their head.

Chailey Commons Society

Now that we are past the winter equinox, we can look forward to the days getting longer. Last year finished on a changeable note having had a very cold snap in early December and this was then followed by more rain blowing in from the west. Local rainfall 2023 totals were Oct 7.55 ins, Nov 5.5 ins and Dec 2.95 ins giving a year total of 39.4 ins (compare 2022 – 34.2 ins).

Exmoor Pony News - The four Exmoor ponies are still doing well on the common. Their winter foraging sees them continuing to eat the bramble and mouthfuls of gorse which is nutritious for them. Holly may be next on the menu! Just a reminder, please, not to feed them - they will find their own natural food to which they are adapted. They need to keep foraging and not hang around people or develop bad manners. The daily pony checkers still have challenges as the ponies move widely on the common, however the bramble amongst the woodland edges around the car park area still seems a favourite in the afternoons.

Winter work on the commons has continued and has included further trimming and flailing of the longer growth in the bracken and birch, and some maintenance has been done on various streams and ponds. We are working in association with the Leaky Dams Project and some ponds have been made, restored, or cleaned of invasive growth.


