Dear residents of Chailey,

The month of January is named after the Roman god Janus, who is an appropriate personification of the start of the new year. This particular Roman god had two faces so that he

could look ahead toward the future and back at the past at the same time. As we get rid of the old year and look forward to the new one, we all try to be a little like Janus. We know through experience what we did wrong and what we did right, and hope to do better this year.. Some people make ambitious new year's resolutions, which are normally broken quite quickly, where others just take a deep breath, step off into the year and hope for the best. But whichever one you are you will have exactly the same amount of time to use.

Thinking about the subject of time may be discomforting, but its not a bad idea especially at the beginning of a new year. As we look into 2016 we look at a block of time. We see 12 months, 52 weeks, 366 days, 8,760 hours, 525,600 minutes, 31,536,000 seconds. And it is all a gift from God, we have done nothing to deserve it, earn it, or purchased it. Like the air we breathe, time comes to us as a part of life. The gift of life is not ours alone. It is given equally to each person. Chailey Commons Society

A Happy New Year to everyone. Last year seems to have gone by so quickly and our series of meetings, both indoor and outside, have been mostly well attended and hopefully enjoyed by all who came along. We have been busy preparing the new programme of activities for 2016 and there will be a wide variety of things to attend.

The Society has been considering the changes on the commons during 2015 and the committee and our volunteer surveyors have been looking at the flora and fauna. We are working closely with the Ranger and the land owners to feed back our findings and our involvement will continue during 2016. The grazing ponies are now on Red House Common and a small private herd of Soay sheep on Lane End Common. There is now some winter work to take place on parts of the common to continue the restoration of the heathland by way of tree and scrub clearance but always leaving a mosaic of growth for the established indigenous wildlife.

Our indoor meetings for 2015 concluded in November with a talk by Alison Wright updating us on the continuing work of the charity 'Rwanda Trust' in that country. We heard of the work which has been done with the agriculture and tree establishment to give the farmers and countryside dwellers a good chance of utilising their land to the best advantage.

Our first meeting on Thursday January 14th 2016 will be our Survey Results meeting as usual in the Chailey village hall by the Five Bells pub at 7.30.p.m. Raffle and refreshments and all welcome.

Chailey And District Horticultural Society

Now Christmas and The New Year have passed now is the time to prepare for the new season.

New potatoes need to be ordered and chatted. For small gardens it is really only worth growing early and second early crops. Main crop varieties take up a lot of space;maybe prone to blight and really offer little over what can be bought. Early new potatoes are well worth the effort for their flavour alone. They mature before blight strikes and are relatively free from slugs and eelworm. They can be grown in the open ground or for a really early why not try potato bags which can be started in a greenhouse whether heated or not or in a conservatory.

The best floury variety is Sharpes Express,of the more waxy varieties try Red Duke Of York, Casablanca or Maris Beard.

Old egg boxes are useful for chitting, placing the potato with the 'eyes' uppermost in a light and frost free place. Tips on planting next month.

In January clean greenhouses, poly tunnels, tools and pots using Jeyes fluid as directed. Prune apples and pears and remember to protect brassicas for the birds and Winter gales.

Also the time is right to divide rhubarb crowns and put pots over rhubarb to be 'forced'.

We Parish Councillors hope that 2016 brings you great pleasure, good health, and joy.

Coming home:The Parish Council has now resolved to bring the Parish Office to Chailey Green. Work will begin at the end of this month to convert the Storage area in the Reading Room into an Office for the Parish Clerk; telephone/Internet lines have been laid and we expect to be able to announce our new address next month. We anticipate that this will be a more convenient address for residents and will enable the Clerk to be less distant from the affairs of our village.

But please note that the Reading Room itself is unchanged and will continue to be available to clubs and societies for their meetings

Website: Our re-planned website is currently running on a dummy site while we transfer and relocate material. Cllr Stephen Avery has been instrumental in preparing the site in its new guise and anticipates that the New Year will bring up the New Website – but with the address unchanged. Full details will be published in next month's Chailey News.

Internal Audit: The Parish Council accounts are the object of two visits a year by our Internal Auditor who recently reported to the Chairman: *I am very happy with the records that are now being kept. I think you have improved the reporting considerably. As a result of my visit, there is nothing that I need to draw to Council's attention.*

The Auditor went on to say that on his next visit he will want to review our Standing Orders, Financial Regulations, Reserves Policy, Risk Assessment, and Asset Register.

The review of these documents is currently in hand.

Highways:We shall be meeting with Highways on January 11th, and anticipate the agenda will include the following: an update on Warrs Hill footpath; advice on traffic movements within the New Heritage; and advice on a signing request for the Sports Club, on changes to improve parking at the unofficial lay-by opposite St Mary's, and on a request to consider a 20mph limit at St Peter's School. Prior to the meeting, the Council will have considered its current position on a possible pedestrian refuge at Mill Lane/A275, a project where costs have escalated massively.

"Shaping Chailey" Questionnaire Results

OVERALL RESULTS

We have received and analysed the responses from 125 villagers. The Parish Council thanks all of those who chose to respond to the questionnaire – it is, even now, not too late to make your views known.

The responses showed that the best perceived features of the village are those associated with its quiet rural setting and environment, in particular the Common, the overall rural feel of Chailey and the beauty of the surrounding countryside – especially the South Downs.

On the other hand, respondents identified a number of aspects of Chailey where they judged there to be considerable scope for improvement: job opportunities, public transport services, leisure facilities and shops. Weak community spirit, which is exacerbated by the extremely dispersed location of the village and the absence of a recognisable village hub, was another negative factor. The balance between praise and criticisms for the main village facilities and infrastructure was as follows: Job Opportunities: -90; Public Transport: -73; Leisure Facilities: -59; Shops:-41; Housing: +6.

THE RESPONDENTS

Every respondent bar one lived in Chailey – the sole exception was someone who has moved away since completing the questionnaire. 24% of respondents were active in some local group; 12% ran businesses locally and 9% worked in Chailey.90% used the shops in Chailey, 74% used the pubs, 77% the Common, 70% the footpaths around the village, 32% social facilities, 10% educational establishments and 6% the sports facilities. 89% used a car as their main method of getting around the village, 30% walked and 13% used busses.

DETAILED FINDINGS

a) The Adequacy of Village Facilities

76% of respondents described **job opportunities** in the village as poor or inadequate.

<u>Public transport</u> was rated as poor or inadequate by 61%. <u>Leisure facilities</u> were judged similarly by 59%. <u>Village shops</u> fared only a little better – 46% rated them inadequate whilst 17% found them to be excellent or good. The one overall positive response related to <u>housing</u> in the village. 27% rated it excellent or good, slightly more than the 22% who rated it poor or inadequate.

Housing Needs

The vast majority of respondents accepted the need for some more houses in the village, provided they were of the right type ,built in the right places – e.g. not ribbon development along the A roads, were built in small developments, and of appropriate design in keeping with a rural village. 9% of respondents were opposed to any more houses being built in Chailey.

As regards the size of new houses, 43% favoured 1/2 bedrooms; 28% 3/4 bedrooms; 2% 5/6 bedrooms. As regards the type of new houses, 55% supported starter homes, 24% family houses, 16% sheltered housing, 11% bungalows and 10% apartments. 2% of respondents specified that all new housing in Chailey should be limited to affordable homes.

c) Job Opportunities in Chailey

65% of respondents judged these to be poor, very poor or non- existent. Only 3.5% judged them to be good and no one rated them excellent.

Strength of the Sense of Community in Chailey

54% of respondents judged this to be Fairly Strong or better (Strong or Very Strong). 36% judged it to be weak or worse. Geography - the spread out nature of the village – was cited as the major factor which worked against a stronger sense of community, despite the sterling efforts of the churches, "Chailey News" and the Bonfire Society.

Priorities for the Neighbourhood Plan

The responses suggest that housing is a prime concern in the parish. 9% of respondents viewed the Plan as the vehicle to prevent any further house building in the village; 4% want the Plan to prescribe that all new building in the village should be affordable housing for the young; 22% want the Plan to determine the type and nature of all future building in the village; 7% want the Plan to prescribe the specific locations for future house building in Chailey. 16% stated that the Plan must include policies designed specifically to maintain the village's peaceful, rural nature, including previsions to ensure that new building occurs in small scale developments and NOT in mega estates.

Communications in the widest sense also featured strongly in the responses. 18% of respondents want the Plan to include policies to improve the quality of public transport serving the village. 9% want specific provisions to ensure that a footpath, suitable in all weathers for prams, buggies and cycles, is built alongside the A275 from the King's Head cross roads to St. Peter's School; 8% want the Plan to establish more street lighting; 9% want the Plan to address road safety issues; 2% want the Plan to support increased and improved children's playgrounds.

Reflecting concerns expressed about the relatively poor strength of community spirit, 10% of respondents want the Plan to include policies specifically designed to enhance community spirit in Chailey.

NEXT STEPS

In the light of the responses to the questionnaire, the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group is preparing a statement of what the village should be like in 2030, the end of the period covered by the Plan. Three Task Groups - on housing; economic development & transport; and community facilities & the environment – comprising villagers who are interested in these topics, Steering Group members and parish councillors, will develop policies needed to realise the 2030 vision. Villagers will be consulted, before the Plan is finalised, about the vision and its supporting policies.

LORRIES THROUGH NORTH CHAILEY

I have been contacted by many residents complaining about the huge amount of lorry movement throughout the village. On their behalf,

I have spoken with Wealden Council's Enforcement Officer, Lewes District Council's Enforcement Officer and the Highway Liaison Officer at East Sussex County Council.

It would appear that the contractor is working within the remit of the planning agreements and conditions. A key worry has been the amount of mud on the road that blocks the drains on the A272 and A275 which could result in winter flooding. It is hard to hold Brown's responsible for the clearing of the drains as it proves difficult to provide substantial evidence that the blockage is solely their responsibility.

Gullies were last cleaned in September 2015 and are on a 12 monthly cycle for cleaning. Work is scheduled on a priority basis in order of urgency; for instance where properties are in immediate danger of being flooded.

GRINLING GIBBONS

This lecture, the first of the New Year, celebrates the extraordinary work of Grinling Gibbons. He lived and worked during the reign of five monarchs and was awarded the title of Master Carver by William III. His best work, outside Hampton Court, survives at Petworth House, Sussex and Chatsworth, Derbyshire. His cascades of fruit, leaves, flowers, foliage, fish and birds sometimes fooled observers into thinking they were real! The lecturer Launce Gribbon will take us through Grinling's life with the help of many excellent illustrations. Using recent research, he will discuss the old problem as to what is and is not actually by Grinling Gibbons - many of his rivals tried hard to imitate his style. Launce began life as a professional painter and has worked at the V & A and as a tutor to Sotheby's Educational Studies
