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'May the God of <u>hope</u> fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in <u>hope</u>.' Romans 15 v 13.

Dear residents of Chailey,

I think that hope is the most wonderful gift from God. In all my years as a Christian, hope has been my companion, my bedfellow, my steadfast friend, my everything. Without hope I would be lost and that's why I hang onto it with both hands. As we begin the New Year, my wish is that we will all be filled with hope. Because when grounded in God, hope provides the motivation to live the Christian life even in the face of trouble.

My life has become tricky at the moment, but I am filled with hope. Filled to overflowing. I had to have an MRI scan recently and went for the results. It could have gone better, but God was with me and I knew it. The Registrar who spoke to me, had a very soft voice, but I picked up an accent. The conversation went thus:

Me: "I'm trying to figure out your accent?"

Her: "I'm from Romania."

Me: "I took many convoys to Romania, we were the first trucks in, after the fall of

Ceausescu in 1989."

Her: "Where did you go in Romania?"

Me: "Cluj, and many, many villages."

Her: "That's my village, I remember you coming, thank you so much, you touched

many lives."

Me: Silence. (I couldn't speak, because I was filled with hope because I knew God

was with me that exact moment.)

The miracle of Romania and all the horrors, be it the Orphanages, the hospitals with no medicines or equipment, it's packs of starving and injured dogs or the leprosy colonies, was that <u>everytime</u> we got lost, there was "someone" on a street corner who spoke perfect English, (not many Romanians did then) who showed us the way, or told us where our aid was most needed. "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained Angels unawares." Hebrews 13 v 2. There were many angels in Romania.

Back to Sussex: The result of my MRI scan showed that apart from my MS which I have had for a number of years, they discovered I also have a brain tumour. When I met the Neurosurgeon, he said "I am your plumber and I'll sort out your plumbing," I said "I'm trying to figure out your accent," he replied "I'm from Romania." Hope, I'm full of hope! Because an absence of hope leads to a loss of vision (not eyesight, but where we are all going) a sense of despondency and ultimately despair. This contrasts sharply with the Christian hope. Who could imagine being thanked 30 years later for the work I did in Romania, whilst now living in Sussex. HOPE!

My husband was watching CNN news yesterday and relayed this story to me.

"A Police Officer on patrol in America found a man and a women living in a tent on wasteland, the woman was slumped against a wall just about to inject herself with crystal/methamphetamine a highly toxic addictive drug that is the cause of many, many deaths all over the world. When he approached her he saw that she was in the late stages of pregnancy and spoke to her about the damage that her habit was causing to

the baby she was carrying. She said that she was too addicted to be helped but she wanted help for her unborn baby. He kept in touch with her and when her baby was born she agreed to let the Police Officer and his wife adopt the child adding to the four children they already had. They adopted the child and called her 'Hope' and when asked by the interviewer why he did what he did, he said that God had told him to do it to save the child." God is always on hand to step into the misery of our lives and offer hope.

My hope for you is that in 2018 you will be filled to overflowing with hope, whatever your problem, whatever ails you, ask God to fill you with hope because without it we are hopeless. Hope will do something very special to your soul.

The Council would like to recover two tables that have been borrowed from the Reading Room. It appears that tables have been borrowed but the wrong ones returned. The Council will be very happy to release the two tables it has in its possession but which it does not own on the return of the Council's own tables. Quarterly Meeting – Parish Council with Highways: At our meeting on December 11th we discussed among other matters South Street. Highways confirmed that it was still the Police's intention to place warning posters to alert drivers to the 40mph limit through South Street. Discussion followed of the problems resulting from parking alongside and opposite South Chailey Stores; it became clear that there is no option to build out the lay-by, and the Parish Council would need to discuss parking with Lewes District Council.

In response to a problem experienced by an elderly resident, recently faced by thoughtless parking, Highways recommended that such anti-social driving be reported to Operation Crackdown: the website takes action against careless, deliberately aggressive or dangerous driving – www.operationcrackdown.org

To report, one needs to have the number of the vehicle, its colour and type.

Chailey and District Horticultural Society January and the start of the New Year.

Finish pruning apples and pears and now is also the time to prune mature wisteria. Prune back the spurs to 2 to 3 buds as these will produce the flowers in the spring. Flowering buds are plump and dark brown whilst grow buds are flat and green. Leave 2 or 3 flowering buds on each spur and this allows you to gauge the flowering potential in the coming year.

Most agapanthus are to some degree frost resistant but it wise to give them some protection with fleece or old sacking if the temperature is likely to drop below -2c.

As soon as possible start chitting seed potatoes. Old egg boxes make convenient containers. Place the potatoes with the 'eyes' upper most and place in a light frost free place. A really early crop can be obtained by growing first earlies (swift, foremost) in buckets or potato sacks. More next month.

First and second earlies usually mature before blight strikes but main crop varieties are these days, are usually infected. However there are now blight resistant main crop varieties especially the Sarpo range. The best of all in my view is Blue Danube. The tubers are dark blue and can be quite difficult to spot when being dug up. However they store well and being slightly floury make wonderful roast potatoes.

If growing onions from seed now is the time to plant them. Use John Innes compost and gently firm it down before sowing the seeds thinly on top. Being small and black they can be hard to see so why not use eyebrow tweezers and plant individually. Cover with finely sieved compost or vermiculite and place in a heated greenhouse or window sill. Transplant when in the question mark stage to individual pots.

Now you wonder where am I going to plant all this stuff! Use a simple type of crop rotation. This prevents the build up of diseases in the soil and allows the individual needs of plants to be met. A four patch method is the easiest to follow. Year one legumes (beans etc) with well rotted compost followed in year two with brassicas with added lime. The next year it hosts onions shallots garlic and leeks and finally root vegetables such as carrots parsnips beetroot and potatoes. Those crops that don't fit in such as salads courgettes and sweet corn just use what space is available.

Don't forget that January and February are the marmalade making months and the products can be exhibited at our Spring Show on 24 March.

What we all want to do is bring cheer to men who are doing so much at this crisis in the world's history and though we do the best that we can do it must seem but trifling in the face of the immense sacrifices to which our men our hourly called.

DRAFT LEWES DISTRICT LOCAL PLAN PART 2: Site Allocations and Development Management Policies

Does this affect us in Chailey? Please have your say. Draft Plan Consultation (Reg 18) November 2017 - January 2018.

Background

The Lewes District Local Plan Part 1: Joint Core Strategy (JCS) was adopted in 2016 and provides the planning policy framework to guide strategic growth across the District to 2030.

The Local Plan Part 2 **will only** apply to the area covered by the Lewes District Planning Authority (i.e. Lewes District excluding the area within the South Downs National Park). The South Downs National Park Authority is preparing its own Local Plan, which once adopted, will supersede all existing planning policies for that area.

On behalf of Chailey, I have had a meeting with senior Lewes District Officers to put forward questions and suggestions that particularly affect us in Chailey and asked that they be taken into account.

One of the many aspects of interest that affect us is protection of Chailey Common. A Site of Special Scientific Interest and also a Nature Reserve. Chailey Common is a Nationally Designated Site which has been given a high level of protection through both the planning and legal systems.

I know that for many of us, including our Parish Council - high quality design is crucial in our village to maintain and enhance our local character and distinctiveness.

FROM COUCH TO CANVAS ARTISTS AND THEIR SITTERS.

The Artist and his sitter can form the most intimate of bonds. Think of the 'Girl with a Pearl Earring' and Vermeer or Manet, and his portrait of his mistress Olympia, which caused quite a scandal at the time. Sitters who are now so famous today did not at the time fare so well and many died in poverty or took their own lives.

Lizzie Siddall worked in a hat shop until she was discovered by the pre-Raphaelite brotherhood. Over a period of several months, she posed for Millais' Ophelia in a bath full of water kept warm by lamps placed underneath. The lamps went out on one occasion and the water turned ice cold, and although Lizzie did not complain her father later sued Millais for the medical bills incurred.

John Iddon ran an MA degree in Museums and Galleries Interpretation at St Mary s University. In addition to art dealing he is a NADFAS lecturer in art history. He has lectured at the Peggy Guggenheim Gallery, Venice; on the Queen Mary 2 and as part of team of Tate lecturers combining with P&O to give talks on art on P&O cruises

Happy New Year everyone. With the New Year upon us let's keep up the pressure on litter picking in Chailey Parish so we have a beautiful and clean year. If you haven't joined us before, why not get involved in 2018.

Lewes District Council: 'No second chances' for fly-tippers

Lewes District Council is amongst the top councils in the country for dealing with fly-tipping and its prevention. The authority's no-nonsense approach was clear to see recently after imposing fines totalling nearly £1,000 on two offenders. The first incident involved the fly-tipping of six bags of dry wall insulation by a resident that resulted in a £400 fine. This was followed by another £400 fine for someone who thought they could dump cardboard and packaging materials.

Councillor Paul Franklin said: "Describing fly-tipping as anti-social behaviour doesn't really do it justice, it's a crime and we simply won't tolerate it in the district."

If a fly tip is reported, council officers visit the scene, take photographs and sift through for evidence, carry out house to house enquiries, check any CCTV footage, take witness statements and interview suspects. Everyone has a duty to ensure their waste, whether from a home or a business, is disposed of properly, including when a third party takes it away. On these occasions it's important to check they are licensed to dispose of your waste and record details such as the registration number of the vehicle being used.
