

A note from St Peter's

Nearly half way through 2019! Last month, we enjoyed spells of unseasonably warm and sunny spring weather, which, as someone pointed out, although wonderful for us, was actually quite wrong in terms of climate. True, of

course, but it has been lovely to see the birds busily nest building and rearing young, and in many cases the earlier warmth and the more recent clement weather will have prompted some of them to raise more than one brood.

In church, we follow the seasons, too. We are still in the Easter season, believe it or not, even as you have this magazine popped through your door at the beginning of June. This period comes to an end at Pentecost, or Whitsun as it is often more commonly known. This year, that date is Sunday June 9th.

Pentecost is the annual Christian festival commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit on the disciples of Jesus after his ascension from earth to heaven on Ascension Day. It always falls on the seventh Sunday after Easter. Pentecost means "fiftieth day", as it is celebrated on Pentecost Sunday, the 50th day of the Easter season (including Easter Sunday) Depending on the date of Easter, written about in a previous magazine, It can fall as early as May 10th and as late as June 13th.

Whit Sunday, Whitsun, meaning "White Sunday", was once a particularly popular day to be baptized, and the name is derived from the white garments that were commonly worn by adults and children who were baptized on this day.

Pentecost is followed by Pentecost Monday (also known as Whit Monday), a public holiday in many countries with Christian traditions, including the UK in years gone by. In 1971, the Banking and Financial Dealings Act changed the date of the holiday to make it fall on the last Monday in May rather than on the day after Whit Sunday. So, the Late May Bank Holiday is a "secular replacement" for the Whit Monday holiday and is usually known just as the Spring Bank Holiday.

As has happened over the past few years, St Peter's is again hosting leading Sussex choir 'Coro Nuovo's annual 'Sussex Young Musician of the Year' semi-finals competition. There will be 11 musicians with connections to Sussex competing in the event, from which four very talented young people will be selected to go on to the finals later in the summer. If you want to be awe-inspired by the raw musical talent of these 18 to 25 year olds who are all en-route to pursuing a professional career in classical or jazz music, make the afternoon of June 2nd a date for your diary and come to hear this year's very special free concert. It begins at 2.30 pm, and if you would like to come along but cannot spare the whole afternoon, you are free to come and go as you please between pieces. St Peter's will be hosting a variety of social events in the coming months, to which everyone is warmly welcomed. The first one will be a quiz, with food, booked for Friday evening June 28th, so we hope you will make it a date, maybe gather a team together, or come on your own, and book your place(s), for what promises to be a fun evening. Please keep an eye on our website for the finer details and the method of obtaining your tickets.

The record of foreign service he has just completed in such historic places as Malta, Mudros, Salonika, Sebastapol and Constantinople, during the Great War of 1914-18, will add another page to the history of those Rectors of Chailey who have served their King and Country in the hour of national need.



School Funding - Maria Caulfield

I fully support our local schools calling for more funding as over the last few decades schools in East Sussex have been underfunded by as much as 50% less per head of population than our neighbours in Brighton and Hove. Since being elected I have campaigned for this injustice to be reversed and was pleased when last year schools across the Lewes constituency saw an 8% increase overall in school funding. However, I recognise that more needs to be done.

Although more money is going into our schools than ever before and school funding is at a record high, with the increase in demand and rising costs this still leaves our local schools in Lewes struggling. The core schools' budget has increased to £42.4 billion this academic year and is set to rise to £43.5 billion in 2019-20. This follows the additional £1.3 billion of funding over and above what was promised in the last Spending Review.

However, having met with most local schools I do share their concerns and that is why I have met with the Secretary of State to lobby for more school funding in the spending review which is due to take place soon. Last year I successfully secured an 8% increase in funding for schools across Lewes. This year schools locally are seeing another increase. For example, South Malling school, is getting extra funding as the baseline budget is going from £941,000 to £998,000 which is a 3.29% increase in per pupil funding and a 6% increase over all. On top of that the Government has just announced that it will fully fund the 23.6% increase in teachers pensions contributions. Staffing accounts to close to 90% of most schools' budgets and the proposed pensions increase was a huge pressure facing most schools.

I fully recognise the financial pressures our local schools are facing and having been successful last year in getting a significant increase I will continue my efforts for a long term, sustainable settlement. We are lucky to have such wonderful schools locally and I will do all I can to support them.

Chailey Commons Society

As April changed to May the temperature changed again from very warm to cold and heavy showers, occasionally of hail, came along suddenly and sometimes caught us out.

There was a magnificent continuing show of spring flowers and the bluebells were amazing, taking over from the carpets of wood anemones. The sheep's sorrel *Rumex acetosella* covered some areas of the open spaces of the commons with the rich orange, red and brown tones of the short flowers. On Pound Common the ponds were displaying a speckled array of the small white flowers of the Water Crowfoot *Ranunculus aquitilis* which seemed particularly strong this year. These are part of the Ranunculus family of which the best known is probably the Buttercup.

The English Longhorn cattle have continued grazing on the lower commons helping to check the fast growth in the herbage. The horse bridge over the central stream on Romany Ridge has been strengthened with more robust sleepers to allow continued / safe use by people and horses. This is the route which the cattle also usually take when moving across towards the Holford Lane area. The present pedestrian crossing has been moved to an existing crossing located in the trees just to the north of the present one and improved using sleepers. This is to allow habitat recovery from the foot poaching impaction. This is an important hotspot for marsh gentians / wetland flora / fauna.

Our outdoor activities will continue in June with the Nightjar Walk on Tuesday 11th June starting from the Sports Clubs car park by the A272 at 9.15.p.m. As usual our route will be chosen to be one of listening and looking, varying as required, to follow the churring of these nocturnal or crepuscular birds in their search for their predominate food of moths. Nightjars are inactive by day but become active at dusk. They are well camouflaged birds. it's a lot easier to spot the birds in silhouette than amongst the dark trees. The walk will finish in the dark so bring torches.

Our annual outing will be to Wiggonholt and Graffham Commons West Sussex on Saturday June 15th from 9.30.a.m until 5.00.p.m. by minibus departing from the car park by the A272. Chailey Repair Café had another successful day when they opened for business on Saturday May 11th, with more than 100 visitors and nearly 90 repairs attempted, including everything from a synthesiser, which was coaxed

into birdsong and a magnificent toy robot, which was encouraged to spring back into life.

Founder and coordinator Bryan McAlley said: "We appear to be attracting visitors from far afield now, including parts of Kent where so far they don't have a Repair Café - we also have welcomed visitors who are thinking of setting up one in their home area and wanted to see what goes on" Bryan added "We are now seeing a wide range of items being brought to us for repair - this time we looked at a camera, some adjustable dumbbell weights, an overlocking sewing machine (a complicated beast!), a child's car seat, a car battery charger, a barometer, several items of clothing and much more."

Chailey Repair Café is part of a world-wide movement where volunteer experts repair things free of charge - although a donation towards running costs is invited. Anyone can bring along broken items or clothing needing repair from home, and have a cuppa and some cake while they wait!

Chailey Repair Café next opens at Chailey Village Hall (next to the Five Bells Pub) 10am -1pm on Saturday 8th June and Saturday 13th July and then on the second Saturday of each month.

Chailey Horticultural Society

June is the month when everything seems to be growing at its fastest and that includes weeds. It is important to keep on top of the weed situation as it is very easy to let it get out of control.

Strawberries will be ripening and becoming prey to birds and molluscs. Netting will keep the birds away but dealing with molluscs is more problematic. Straw is often used to keep the fruit off the ground and clean but may become a hiding place for slugs and snails. Slug pellets are of some use but now only those containing ferric phosphate are available and they are not a contact killer. Sometimes it is possible to use small twigs etc to keep clusters of fruit off the ground.

Runner beans will be starting up their poles. It is actually better to grow runner beans up a straight line of poles rather than in the traditional V shaped pattern. More open growth

allows a better flow of air and better pollination and setting and avoids over crowding as the beans reach the top of the poles. They require regular watering and if not growing self setting varieties a fine spray of water after a hot day may help setting. Pick regularly to ensure continued cropping as like many vegetables once it has set seeds in mature pods the plant may decide its duty is fulfilled and give up!

The same applies to French beans both dwarf and climbing although both are usually

self setting.

Keep greenhouse tomatoes well watered and well supported and stop after six trusses have set. Outside tomatoes will also need watering in dry weather and it is vital to do this without wetting the leaves to avoid blight. Usually four trusses are sufficient for outside crops. Both need a weekly feed once the first truss has set. Try using a seaweed based feed as I think this may improve flavour.

Chillies, sweet peppers and aubergines need feeding once the fruit has formed.

Keep marrows, courgettes and pumpkins well watered.

Try to use water from a water butt as this will be at the right temperature. Water straight from the tap may be too cold and cause scorching in hot weather.

Autumn sown broad beans will be coming to an end. They do not usually suffer from black fly but those sown in the spring may well do. The infestation always starts at the top of the plant. To try and avoid this remove the growing top as soon as sufficient pods have set. This can then be used as a spinach like vegetable.

Finally start thinking about our summer Show on Saturday 20th July and what you might be able to enter.

From our old minute book:

Sunday cricket was a contentious issue for some in the village. At an annual meeting held on 14 April 1947 opponents of Sunday cricket moved the motion '...the playing of Sunday cricket and proposed that it be banned as far as Chailey was concerned.'. A discussion ensued during which participants gave their reasons for and against Sunday cricket in Chailey. The subsequent vote:18 to 3 (2 abstentions) dismissed the motion in favour of continuing Sunday cricket.

That same year Chailey rested at the bottom of the reformed Lewes & District Cricket League [it lapsed during the war years]. Led by captain Bob Bentley the wooden spoonists of 1947 saw a reversal of their fortunes the next year:1948 repeating a feat they had previously achieved in 1938 by becoming league champions.

Stoolball

Stoolball is said to be the forerunner of cricket. Unfortunately, Chailey no longer has a stoolball club. Chailey used to have a very successful, stand alone and flourishing senior side that played in the Mid-Sussex Stoolball League. Sadly, like the Senior Football side that folded some years earlier, the stoolball followed suit a few years later.

Since the demise of the stoolball club the cricket club has stored their wickets, boundary rope and markers, marking board and some old bats and balls in its store in the hope that the club will rise from the ashes. Lewes District Citizens Advice

Buyers beware, as thousands of customers report being ripped off on online marketplaces. Lewes District Citizens Advice's tips for using online marketplaces:

Check the product details

This should include: photos; a description; cost of the item; delivery charges; contact details for the seller; and any cancellation rights.

It should be clear if it's being sold by a trader or private seller - this is important as your rights are different.

Read previous reviews for potential issues, but watch out for fake reviews. "..too good to be true, it probably is!"

Take screenshots of the item you want to buy

This will help if the item you receive is different to what you saw on the website.

Use a payment method that protects you

You'll have a better chance of getting your money back if there's a problem by using a card or Paypal, particularly if it's an overseas seller. Avoid paying by bank transfer.

Go back to the seller if there's a problem

Explain what's happened, how you'd like them to fix it and give a deadline for them to respond.

Getting your money back from a private seller

The product description must be accurate; if information is missing you won't be able to ask for your money back.

If the item doesn't match the photos on the website, you may also have grounds to get a refund.
