

Dear residents of Chailey,

As I begin packing up my home and moving for the forty third time, I have started to reflect upon our time in Chailey. We believe God called us here and we have worked hard, but for me, my role of Vicar's wife changed after a year and my priority had to be Daisy our granddaughter who came to

live with us. It was the only option for her and after the court case, the social worker told us we were doing a good job and that not many Grandparents wanted to raise a child in their late 60's. It has been the greatest joy in my whole, interesting, well travelled and

fascinating life.

When Daisy first arrived I decided that I needed to build up a bank of happy memories for her as she had few she could draw on. I made her a 'den' in the sitting room and there she sat for three months, with Betty, having her meals served to her, in the safety of the darkness. That den space has now become her desk covered with her practise Common Entrance exam papers. Chailey became the platform on which to build the memories and Betty the Great Dane became her best friend. I often saw the poor dog limping along in wellingtons, or modelling pink pyjamas, with matching scarf and hat! I can't remember how many bras I caught her wearing. Betty and Daisy would bounce on the trampoline and if allowed, they would snuggle up together in Daisy's large brass bed. Actually that was all the time.

She cycled to the moat, we fed the pigs, had picnics on our very own 'dragon fly bridge.' It wasn't really "ours." We sat in the garden at twilight and counted the bats, forty six was our best score. We watched planes in and out of Gatwick and followed vapour trails. We collected tadpoles and watched them grow fat enough to be released back into the pond. She sledged on the Common, we counted deer, she went on the annual nature walk with William Coleman. Thank you for your enthusiasm William. We hid behind Daisys curtains and spied on the brides walking up the Church path. We marked the dresses out of ten. You won Sally. We slid down the bannister at the Rectory and slid down the stairs on a tray. We stuck cling film across doorways to booby-trap Grandpa We hid in a laundry basket, making everyone playing, scream. We pushed each other on the swing, hanging in the hallway. We danced. We sang all the hits. We built snowmen on the Green and played hide and seek behind Church walls. We lit lanterns along the Church path at 11pm every Christmas eve, scaring each other, by jumping out. We were frozen, but we knew everyone would love seeing the twinkling lights. We watched all the dramas unfolding at the Rectory. We had hysterics when someone phoned the Rectory at 9.30pm as we were both sitting in the same bed reading and they asked "Do you have a donkey I could borrow?"

We had talcum powder fights, unable to breathe through the haze of talc and of laughter. We hid all the Easter eggs for the hunt in Church and tried to turn a blind eye to the thirty one Daisy was given the first Easter she came to us. Thank you for your generosity to her 'ladies of the parish!' She played tennis and netball in the front garden, we roasted chestnuts and marshmallows. We made pancakes and I taught her to cook. We camped in the garden (the longest nights of my life, as Betty leapt from airbed to airbed and I nearly shot through the canvas every time). We lifted the lid from the well in the garden and dropped pebbles in to see how deep it was. We visited her Mother in re-hab on Boxing Day, Daisy's decision, what a brave girl. We walked our favourite beach at Ferring. She went to Chailey bonfire with my husband and helped judge the floats. She read beautifully in Church. This Christmas we had our family lunch in Church, little bit

weird, but the facilities are much better than ours at the Rectory.

We made 'telephones' with empty baked bean tins and string. Shouting loudly to be heard (we didn't need the tins). We had an end of Summer pancake party and Daisy invited all her friends. We threw a surprise birthday party for 'Monkey' the other constant in her life, all of the soft toys were invited. We had ice cream and jelly and they all sat at the table. We made a fairy glade in the middle of a toadstool ring and bought the fairies on-line. We had catapult competitions, knocking tins off of a fence. My artist friend Ann, helped her to paint. Daisy slept in a hammock in the woods, under the stars, during a three day woods survival course at School. We had darts and table football competitions in the hall at the Rectory.

Now it is time to leave, we have no idea where we are going but we are both full of memories, the house, the village, the Church and its peoples, her School. Daisy is head of her house Grenfell, at School and she is also a peer mentor. She has just been chosen with two other children to interview the person applying to be the Registrar at her School. I watched as God turned her life around. He can heal, He can restore, He can comfort, He can mend broken hearts. I'm so grateful that He brought us to Chailey and that He gave me the strength to be part of the memory building team. Thank you God for the wonderful miracles we have seen here available to anyone who calls out to you. Thank you Chailey for your kindness, your generosity, your love and your laughter. Thank you for being part of Daisy's healing. Daisy I am so proud of you.

For the last time, thank you for reading.

It is necessary that they should carry into manhood and womanhood some clear idea of the causes which have brought about this terrible set-back to civilization and progress.'

Precept 2016/17: The Parish Council terms its budget 'the Precept' which is the money needed to service and maintain Parish assets such as the Reading Room and the Windmill; and to make Grants or provide financial support to Parish organisations. It also pays the cost of maintaining the Parish Office and employing the Clerk. We estimate we shall spend £54,800 next year on these and other recurring items, slightly lower than the budget set a year ago.

However, this year we are budgeting for two exceptional items of expenditure: refurbishment of the Sports Pavilion for which we have set aside £35,000 from our reserves; and secondly, a deficit attributable to the Council which has accrued in the Local Government Pension Fund for which we are setting aside £12,000 (the amount which will need to be paid and the timing of the payments are not yet determined).

This means that we are planning to spend a total of £101,800 in the next financial year. This cannot all be paid for from the amount raised by the Precept and the Council will use a significant part of its existing reserves to meet some of the expenditure.

However, Councillors have resolved that, because of the anticipated depletion of its reserves, an increase in the Precept is necessary to ensure that the expected day-to-day costs of running the Parish can be met in full out of the amount raised by the Precept. Councillors have therefore agreed a sum of £40.68p to be paid next year by a household with a property in Band D for Council Tax purposes. For such a household this represents a rise of £3.53p in the annual amount paid, or an additional 29.4p per month. The additional amount payable will be lower for properties in Council Tax Bands A to C and higher for those in Bands E and above.

Parish Council address: Current works are on track to permit the Council Office to move to the Reading Room during the course of March. We shall confirm our new address and telephone details on the website during March and in the April issue of Chailey News. Residents should note that the Office will be housed separately (in the refurbished Storeroom). The Reading Room continues to be available to be booked for meetings, and other functions.

Planning Applications: Lewes District Council have determined that, from April, Parish Councils will no longer receive paper copies of Planning Applications. Applications will only be made available on the District Council's website for comment and consultation or, as we understand it, in person at the District Council's offices.

Website: Our website now includes images of the many historic postcards which are held at the Windmill Rural Life Museum. One postcard of the Reading Room with sheep

& cattle is based on an 1898 painting by William Sidney Cooper, who was a well-known Kentish artist. The Council would be interested to discover where the original painting is now kept.

Neighbourhood Plan Village Meeting April 2016

As part of the Neighbourhood Plan, we have produced a Vision Statement outlining the aim of the Chailey Neighbourhood Plan and what it intends to achieve for the village. Based on the views that were expressed in our recent questionnaire survey, this is the current draft of our Vision Statement...

The Parish Council's Vision for the future of Chailey is that it will retain its quiet, rural character throughout the period up to 2030. Any future house building should be consistent with this and therefore comprise only small developments in keeping with their surroundings and close to supporting infrastructure. The built and natural heritage of the Parish will have been retained and protected. The most highly valued countryside areas in the Parish will have been recognised and conserved. Job opportunities within the village will be actively encouraged to provide improved prospects for local people. Throughout the period of the Plan, the sense of community spirit and cohesion will be fostered and increased.

We will be holding a **Village Meeting on Friday 29th April at 7.30pm** in the Chailey Parish Hall, to discuss the next step in the Neighbourhood Plan, which involves forming Task Groups, who will be responsible for developing specific aspects that will be covered by the plan. These task groups will cover Environment & Housing, Local Economy & Transport and Community. This meeting will be an opportunity for you to ask any questions you may have regarding the Neighbourhood Plan, learn more about the Task Groups we intend to form, and to express an interest in getting involved. We would also love to hear your views on the Vision Statement.

Local incidents from January 1st -

CAD: 1137 - 07/01

Theft - A shipping container on site at Waspbourne was broken in to overnight. A high value chainsaw was stolen from the container.

Burglary other than dwelling - A property on North Common Road suffered a break to an outdoor storage building in which several high

value garden tools were stolen. Tools included strimmers and chainsaws.

Vehicle damage - A vehicle parked in Mill Lane suffered some criminal damage within a few hours of being parked.

Burglary dwelling - A burglary occurred at a property on Station road sometime in the day. The home owner returned to discover this. Entry was reported to have been gained from the rear of the property.

CAD: 1103 - 25/01

Theft - A high value wood splitter was stolen from a property in Warrs Hill Road.

CAD: 1463 - 11/02

Laser pointer - It was reported to police that on the evening of the 11/02, someone in the Chailey area was shining a laser pointer at an aircraft. This seems to be a common report the police are getting but not specifically from the Chailey area.

Road Collisions in Chailey -

11/01 – Collision involving $\mathring{2}$ vehicles – A275, Sheffield Park. This resulted in injuries to the drivers.

12/01 – An incident involving a cyclist who slipped on the ice on Warrs Hill Road. The cyclist was injured but not seriously.

17/01 – Single vehicle collision outside the 5 Bells. The driver was not injured.

19/01 – Single vehicle collision on Beggars Wood Road. The driver was not injured.

20/01 – 2 vehicle collision which resulted in a car catching fire. There were no injuries but the incident did result in a road closure while the blaze was tackled.

25/01 – 2 vehicle collision outside St Peters Primary School. There were no reported injuries.

This site offers a detailed description of local incidents including locations and outcomes. **Chailey local priorities –**

At this stage the main priority for the Chailey area seems to be around speeding. The A275 in particular is raising concern.

Chailey speedwatch team are still active but have been restricted by the poor weather and loss of some volunteers.

The local policing team have also been restricted by the weather but will be looking to deploy speed monitoring equipment on the problem sites.

District priorities -

Scams– Scams are becoming an increasing problem across Sussex and surrounds with many people falling victim.

Scams are being achieved through phone calls, mail, emails and even door to door.

An example of current scams are –

Letters or emails stating you have won money

Emails with links attached which can include a virus or stating your computer is being used for illegal activity

Door to door salesman who try and buy goods for cheap prices or gather information from a resident with the intent of committing a burglary.

Scam calls trying to obtain bank details. These are the most common scams which do see a lot of victims.

The best advice we can give people is that nobody who calls you will ask you for bank details, not even your bank.

Also never discuss personal details with those you do not know.

We have been receiving reports of scam calls from people claiming to be police.

The caller will give false police details and state that the victim's bank details have been cloned and that they need to confirm them.

A member of the police will also never ask for bank details.

The caller will try and get you to trust them by saying you can call 101 and ask for them. The caller however will not hang up their end which means you will get through to them again.

We encourage that if anyone looks to return the call on 101 to check the officer is genuine, use a different phone. Mobile etc.

If you would like further information on scams please contact your local officer.

Burglary – Burglaries to both dwellings and outbuildings are becoming a common call to the police. Breaks to dwellings will normally see the offenders target jewellery, cash, electronic goods such as laptops and tablets. Outbuilding breaks will normally be for high value tools such as chainsaws, leaf blowers etc.

Sussex Police still offer crime prevention advice through local officers.

Op Crackdown - Op Crackdown has been put in place to allow members of the public to report Anti-social driving or abandoned vehicles easily without having to use the switchboard. This method has proven to be very reliable with a number of drivers being dealt with accordingly thanks to the reports made on Op Crackdown.

To make a report on Crackdown simply visit www.operationcrackdown.org. Each report will take about 5 minutes.

The Society held its annual tea party and get together on Saturday 6th February at the Village Hall. There were various demonstrations and plenty of tea , cakes and good company. Although those who came obviously enjoyed themselves the overall numbers were a little disappointing. As a local society we depend on support from the village so please come and support us at our Spring Show on the 19th March at the village hall from 2.30 onwards. For the children the potato growing competition starts at the Show.A bucket, potatoes and advice sheet are provided free to all. The results are judged at the Summer Show and the heaviest crop gains the competitor £10 courtesy of Drivepoint.

Let's hope now that the worst of the winter weather is passed and planting for the new season can start. However a word of warning; keep off the soil if it is still very wet since walking on our heavy clay soil when it is wet will only compact it. The other old adage is 'only plant seeds when you can feel the warmth of the sun on your back'. The soil needs to warm up and not to be too wet for seeds to germinate. However most seeds can be started in a greenhouse, propagator or on a windowsill. Those that need a long growing season such as aubergines, peppers and chillies should be planted as soon as possible. Lettuce, peas, broad beans, beetroot, spinach and chard can all be started in pots in the greenhouse and planted out when conditions are favourable. Carrots and parsnips should be planted where they will grow and are best left to early April. First early potatoes are traditionally planted on Good Friday and for me that signifies the real start of the new season.

Languages for real: Our School specialises in languages: in October we took the chance to use our special knowledge when twenty-one students of Art and Spanish spent four days in Madrid. Of course there was time to experience Spanish culture: Flamenco and Tapas, and a visit to the Prado Museum. But we also split into two groups: the Art students went off to do some sketching and photography in the Retiro Park in preparation for their GCSE Art exam; while students of Spanish had a two hour lesson in a local language school in the heart of the city. THE BENIN BRONZES

The Benin Bronzes are a group of more than a thousand commemorative metal plaques that decorated the royal palace of the Benin Kingdom in modern-day Nigeria. These marvellous images, sculpted in high relief, are some of the best examples of lost-wax casting.

In 1897 most of the plaques were removed and taken to the British Museum where they received great popular acclaim as, until this point, African Art had been dismissed by most Europeans as simple curiosities of pagan cults. Not surprisingly since independence Nigeria has been requesting their return. They have become an important example in the international debate over restitution, comparable to that of the Elgin Marbles.

Our lecturer Dr Claire Walsh has worked for the V&A and for the Open University. Visitors are always most welcome and the cost is £7 on the door with, as always tea and biscuits afterwards, and a chance to talk to the speaker.
