Dear residents of Chailey,

I have a favourite book written by Dr Tony Campolo, who is a pastor, author, lecturer and professor of sociology, called 'Let me tell you a story.' As the title suggests it is full of

interesting stories and one I found particularly interesting and want to share with you is called 'In our Image.' From the chapter called 'What we hear about cultures.'

George Bernard Shaw wrote once that, "God created us in His image and we decided to return the favour." This process of creating God in our own image so as to have God represent the dominant values of the culture is known as totemism. Dr Campolo goes on to say, this totemistic tendency was evident to me when I visited a Chinese Catholic church in Philadelphia. In the front of the church there was a stained glass window, and can you imagine what I saw. There was Jesus; but instead of Jesus looking Jewish, He was very Chinese. The people of the church had recreated Him in their own image. In a Sunday school class in an African-American church, the famous print of Salamon's head of Christ was removed one day from the wall. In its place there was a new picture of Jesus, in which Jesus was portrayed as a black man. When the teacher commented that Jesus was not African-American, one of the young men in the class mumbled back, "He wasn't any honky either."

That young man didn't want Jesus made into a white man any more than white people want Jesus made into a black man. Each group wants a Jesus that deifies themselves. But in the end, such religion is nothing more than a group worshiping a collective representations of themselves.

Totemism is what the Apostle Paul was talking about in the first chapter of his letter to the Romans when he describes the process whereby people take the image of the incorruptible God and transform Him into an image likened unto corruptible man (vs23). Is it any wonder that the Ten Commandments tell us that we should make no graven images unto God? That is because the image we make of God is more of an expression of what we are like than it is of what God is like.

He is the same yesterday, today and forever, we are not.

Keep a little distance and watch nature at work. They have usually eaten loads of honey before they left the hive to sustain them on their journey, so are very placid albeit noisy. They will settle somewhere in a huge ball (between the size of a rugby ball or melon).

Please do not consider calling a pest control person to kill these precious insects. Bees are struggling enough with pesticides, poor weather and lack of forage due to more intensive farming. I am more than happy to come and remove these bees. I do not charge, but a donation to my charity (Air Ambulance) is always gratefully received. I live in Newick but will travel to recover swarms.

BOUNDARY COMMISSION CHANGES – LAST CHANCE TO HAVE YOUR SAY

The draft recommendations propose changing the joint ward of Chailey and Wivelsfield and putting

Chailey with Barcombe and Hamsey – a huge, sprawling joint ward that abuts the West Sussex County border, Mid Sussex/Wealden Districts and reaches the Lewes town boundary.

I have made it plain that I see zero advantage in this proposal and voted against the recommendation at our Lewes District Council Meeting, together with Cllr Jim Sheppard, our East Sussex County Councillor, Cllr Isabelle Linnington, Barcombe/Hamsey and a small minority of other colleagues. Chailey, Wivelsfield and Barcombe Parish Councils do not support this change either.

We believe that it is simply a number crunching electoral arrangement and doesn't consider our different communities and interests: our transport links, our medical

services - to name but a few.

Chailey WI - May

Our next meeting which is on Tuesday 3rd May at 7.45 pm will be the annual Resolutions meeting. It is always interesting to see which resolutions are debated before being taken forward to the National Annual Meeting in October so do come along and join in. Also in May we are marking the Queen's 90th birthday by going out for a celebratory Cream Tea.

The April meeting was a talk 'My Friends the Elephants' by Edward Paget, who had spent three years managing a game reserve in Zimbabwe. We learnt a lot about elephants generally (who knew that male elephants have five toes on each foot whereas the females

have only four?) as well as their behaviour and interaction with the family and other animals. Members were asked to bring along any small decorative elephants they had and we had quite a collection, with a prize being donated by our speaker.

We meet on the first Tuesday of each month at 7.45 pm in the Village Hall, when guests and prospective members are always most welcome to join us for the nominal charge of £3.

Chailey & District Horticultural Society

The Society had a very successful Spring Show with record numbers of entries and an excellent attendance in the afternoon. The standard, as usual was very high.

Our next event is the Plant Sale on 21st May outside the Horns Lodge from 10am to 12 noon. All varieties of plants will be on sale so please come and see what we have to offer. By now the weather is really warming up and at the end of the month it will be time to start planting out frost tender plants such as French and runner beans,tomatoes,sweet corn,marrows,courgettes and squash. More about the management of these next month. The asparagus season is now upon us. Cut the spears every two days at just below ground level.

Continue to earth up potatoes to protect against a late frost and to encourage side shoots to get a larger crop. Slug damage is usually not much of a problem with early varieties but consider using a biological control for later crops (watered on so also kills slugs underground).

Continue to sow salad crops every two weeks.

In the greenhouse tomatoes will be coming into flower and to encourage setting spray with a light mist night and morning. Peppers, chillies, aubergines and cucumbers are often rather slow until night time temperatures remain above 14c but be on the lookout for aphids.

Remember to feed plants grown in pots as this the time of most vigorous growth.

If codling moth is a problem with your apples and pears consider a pheromone trap. The maggots of the moth burrow into the young fruit and then out again to drop and pupate in the soil. Pheromone traps work by tempting the male moth away from the female and into the trap using the scent of the female. Available from garden centres or mail order.

Soft fruit and tender vegetables next month.

Don't forget the plant sale on the 21st May.

Her Majesty turns Ninety this year, and the Parish Council have resolved to mark this event by planting a Red Oak Quercus rubra on Chailey Green. Full details will appear on our website, once we have identified a suitably long-lived tree!

Annual Parish Meeting: The Meeting will be held on Friday May 6th in the Village Hall. All residents interested are invited for 7PM to enjoy a drink with Councillors and other residents before the Meeting begins at 7.30PM. We have invited Inspector Rob Lovell of Sussex Police to attend and brief residents on the significant changes to the system of Community Support Officers and the introduction of Area Teams for policing; and, following their Village meeting on April 29th, Shaping Chailey will be reporting on our developing Neighbourhood Plan.

The Annual Parish Meeting is not a meeting of the Parish Council. It is a meeting of the local government electors of Chailey. It provides the opportunity for electors to get together to hear about what is going on in the Parish and to be involved with issues that will affect the Parish in the future. It is hoped that as many electors as possible will attend the meeting. There will be opportunities for those attending to raise questions about matters relevant to the Parish.

Small Grants: Each year the Council makes a number of Small Grants (typically, £250 more or less) to assist societies and other Chailey organisations with their administrative costs, or with a special project. The closing date for applications is June 30th and the award of Grants will be considered at Full Council on July 19th. An Application Form and further details will be available to download from our website after the middle of May [For background information click Parish Council >What does the Council do >Grants & donations]

Warrs Hill footpath: East Sussex Highways set a public consultation period of April 11 -29 to consult on the long-standing project to run a footpath alongside Warrs Hill Road from the New Heritage to the A275, a project to be paid from funds set aside as a developer contribution when building the New Heritage. Because the footpath will run along the edge of Red House Common on common land immediately beside the highway but outside the fence line, it is a condition that the project should be put to consultation, personally with neighbouring residents and more generally, before it goes

to the Secretary of State for determination. Full details, plans and an online version of the survey were made available at: www.eastsussex.gov.uk/haveyoursay

Planning Applications: A reminder that, from last month, Planning Applications will only be handled electronically. Residents should consult and comment on Applications through the Lewes District Council's website. Chailey Parish Council will consider Applications on the first Tuesday of each month, but the documentation will be downloaded from the Lewes District Council website. The agenda for this meeting will be published on our website, usually three working days in advance of the meeting.

The summer terms are, for the final year (Year 11) increasingly dominated by national exams with the GCSE Art exam having already taken place on April 27-28. There will be an opportunity on June 14th to see the work submitted for moderation as well as ingenious and skilfully crafted designs from the Technology Faculty. The main GCSE examinations start from May 16th. Candidates will have been supported during previous months by www.chaileyschool.org a series of bespoke support classes in lunchtime, after School, and at home to help them face this crucial test, not to mention by

the work of the Careers staff through the year, introducing students to a variety of future courses, training and opportunities.

Also introducing students, but younger ones, will be the Year Five days this term when students from our local Primary Schools will attend a School Day at Chailey, taking lessons across the curriculum and experiencing life at a Secondary School. these young people arrive as fully-fledged members of the School they will be individually accompanied for their first two weeks by mentors to ensure that they settle smoothly.

On April 21st we were delighted to welcome author Alan Gibbons from Liverpool to talk to Years 9 & 10 about his work: Alan Gibbons is the author of Shadow of the Minotaur. which won a Blue Peter Award, of numerous other books, and is a teacher and an active campaigner for libraries. Chailey School's Library is a model environment and a vigorous supporter of the written word. Students are guided towards appropriate reading and mentored, when necessary, to develop their reading skills. Alan Gibbons completed his day with a creative writing workshop for 30 selected students.

Show Me 2 demonstrated not only the heart-stopping skills of the trampoline club, but the thoughtful and graceful skills of the modern dance club, presenting a series of routines which demanded not just physical balance but also the ability to memorise. The evening last March raised just over £900 towards the cost of additional equipment for the Gym Hall.

Such evenings are particularly valuable for students to gain confidence in public presentation (Chailey School has an enviable reputation for its public 'face') and five music students gave noteworthy performances at an external concert in St Peter's Church Chailey, performing with the Sussex-based Coro Nuovo under Andy Rees, organist at St Peter's but also known internationally as a tenor.



St Peter's Before the school closed for Easter the children enjoyed a session of egg rolling and also demonstrated their artistic bent in an egg decorating competition. We adults had a tea party where we bade farewell to Val Payton one of our long serving support assistants. Several of her former colleagues also attended.

School The children are now back at their desks. The younger ones are due to visit Drusilla's Zoo. Most of the school will soon start swimming lessons and the older pupils are due to visit the Globe Theatre. They have been reading A Mid Summer Night's Dream. I envy them the choice of play, it's fun. When I was at school we had Hamlet and Macbeth, hardly a laugh a minute.
