Dear residents of Chailey,



You may remember 25 years ago the brutal racist murder of Stephen Lawrence in London and the continuous fight, over many years for justice by Neville and Doreen Lawrence for their son. Yesterday (16th April 2018) I watched an

interview on Sky news with Neville Lawrence, who is a Christian, he stated that he had forgiven those who murdered his son, which, after all the agony the Lawrence family have been through, is an amazing thing to do. Can we forgive easily? I think our natural reaction when we have been hurt or injured is one of self-protection, we are rarely full of mercy, grace and forgiveness.

Do you find the act of forgiving difficult? We expect others to forgive us, but often find it difficult to reciprocate. Although forgiveness is difficult to do, it is necessary. In the Bible it is a very prominent theme and the Bible offers us clear insight and answers for many of the questions we might have about forgiveness. We are instructed to "forgive as the Lord forgave us" in **Colossians 3:13** "Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you." And it's not a one off act, Jesus answers Peter in **Matthew 18:21-22** when he asks "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother when he sins against me? Up to seven times?" Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy seven times." Jesus leaves us in no doubt that while forgiveness may not be easy for us, it is not a one-time choice and affectively we need to try and live in a permanent state of forgiveness. Jesus knew that even though we forgive, the memory of the hurt is still there and we need to try and free ourselves from the bitterness and resentments those memories bring. Jesus is our example, he forgave his persecutors on the Cross and it is against his example that we must continue forgiving until the matter is settled in our hearts.

Since forgiveness goes against our nature, true forgiveness can only come through faith, out of obedience to Jesus. We may really want revenge and retribution but we must trust God to handle the issue, so that the forgiveness will be complete. However, forgiveness is often a slow and painful process. The good news is that when we do forgive, the Lord sets our hearts free from the anger, bitterness, resentment and hurt that previously imprisoned us. We are the ones who suffer most when we choose not to forgive. Jesus commanded us to forgive and the Bible makes it very clear that if we do not forgive, neither will we be forgiven Matthew 6:14-16 tells us that "if you forgive men when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins." We also forgive so that our prayers will not be hindered, Mark 11:25 tell us "And when you stand praying, if you hold anything against anyone, forgive him, so that your Father in heaven may forgive you your sins."

We forgive out of obedience to the Lord. It is a choice, a decision we make. As we forgive we discover the command is in place for our own good, and we will receive the reward for our forgiveness – **FREEDOM**.

Year of prayer 2018 - A letter for parishes from the Bishop of Horsham

Dear Friends,

This month we shall celebrate Pentecost, or in traditional English nomenclature, Whitsun. Pentecost marks the gift of the Holy Spirit to Jesus' disciples and the iconography of flames and doves will be seen all over Pentecost pew-sheets, orders of service, banners and vestments. Another less visible symbol of the Spirit is the holy oil blessed by Bishop Martin at the Chrism Eucharist. The oil for baptism, for confirmation and for anointing the sick is both token and promise of the presence of the Spirit.

Oil shares a number of properties with the Spirit of God. Oil marks what it touches, sometimes permanently. The work of the Spirit in baptism and confirmation marks people indelibly as children of God. Baptism is a work with no need of repetition but people do sometimes get stuck and fail to exhibit that freedom which belongs to the children of God. It is then the property of oil to find its way between the cracks and joints of what is seized and inflexible just as it is the work of the Spirit to set free human beings and, having done so, to keep them moving. The Spirit lives to set us free to walk in the light. Light brings us to another property shared by oil and Spirit - the capacity to burn with a flame. It is with the indwelling spirit that individuals' lives are set alight to shine with the same love that Jesus has for all people. Come, Holy Spirit, set us free and give us oil in our lamps to keep us burning with the light of Jesus Christ.



U.M.C.A. On Sunday May 26th special sermons will be preached at the Parish Church and St Mary's by the Rev. F.R. Hodgson, formerly Archdeacon of Zanzibar, and the offerings at all the churches during the day will be given to this splendid Mission which has suffered more from the War then perhaps any other Mission of our Church. Forty two of the English missionaries were imprisoned by the Germans, two died and most of the rest had to be sent home at a great outlay in passages. Sad losses of late from various causes have been sustained in the staff both native and European.

NB The Universities Mission to Central Africa 1857-1965 was founded in response to a plea by David Livingston. The society pioneered the training of black African priests.

Patience can certainly be rewarded, and this was the case this spring when we had to wait a while for the weather to improve and produce the much-needed warmer temperatures and the drier times. The primroses and daffodils were spectacular having been paused by the cold times and then they delivered.

The commons have been rather wet in places and walking on them has been difficult, but we can now look forward to the bracken and trees exploding into growth. There will be some grazing this summer and cattle are back on Lane End, and they will also be on the lower combined commons. Ponies will be on Red House Common and need to be left alone to do their job. Please resist temptation to approach them and most importantly do not feed them. As before dogs should be kept under close control and this should ensure the ponies can be left alone to graze. Dog waste bins are available so please use them, I am sure that you don't want to tread in any more of this when leaving the car parks.

As the greenery and herbage develops, the birds will already have started nesting so please avoid disturbing the undergrowth so that this vital period of early summer can do it's best to accommodate them. It's all about live and let live and Fido needs a little help with this.

We have enjoyed a bird walk on Memorial Common on a fine morning and are grateful to Townings Farm for allowing us to visit to see the lambing season under way.

Our Spring Walk takes place on Memorial Common on Saturday May 19th starting at 2.30.p.m. from the car park by the A272 and we shall look at the trees and flowers and enjoy the views.

Chailey Horticultural Society

The Society had a very successful Spring Show. Although the number of entries was down, largely due to the weather, the standard remained high and there were excellent entries in the cookery , handicrafts and flower arranging. As usual we failed to attract entries in the children's classes so if you read this and have children or grandchildren why not get them to enter? Money, cups and glory are on offer!

In the garden prune stone bearing fruit trees and give them a fertiliser and potash boost. Plant main crop potatoes and still earth up the earlies just in case there is a late frost and to ensure the tubers are well covered to avoid exposure and going green.

Salad crops such as lettuce, beetroot and spring onions should be sown every two to four weeks to ensure a continual supply.

At the end of the month French and runner beans can be sown directly and those started off in the greenhouse planted out. I intersperse direct sowing and plants to extend the picking season. If you can, grow a number of different varieties including some self setting types such as moonlight as I think this improves setting overall. Also in dry spells ensure plenty of watering.

Early carrots will be emerging and require thinning. To avoid attracting the dreaded carrot fly do this in the evening and cover with an insect proof mesh. An alternative is to grow carrots in tubs of fine sieved compost. The poor carrot fly can only jump about 6" so above that level everything is safe.

By the end of the month greenhouse tomatoes will be producing their first truss. This is the most difficult to get to set. A light mist spray in the evening and gently rocking the plants will help. Once the first truss has set the others do not usually present a problem. In the greenhouse or poly tunnel plant out cucumbers, peppers, aubergines and chillies and start off marrows and courgettes in pots.

I think, in general, everything is about three weeks behind schedule so do not despair if it all seems a bit slow. It will catch up!

Don't forget the plant sale out side the Horns Lodge on Saturday 19th May from 10 to 12. Also the Summer Show comes up on Saturday 14th July.

Chailey Litter Pickers 679 bags so far!

BBC News report that: 'Increased fines for 'litter louts' come into effect': People dropping litter, including from vehicles, face increased on-the-spot fines of up to £150 as new penalties come into effect. Councils across England are being given the power to raise fines from the previous ceiling of £80.

The government claims collecting litter costs councils £680m a year! Environment Minister Therese Coffey said: "Littering is a scourge on our environment and we waste taxpayers' money cleaning it up - funds which could be better spent in the community. We want to be the first generation to leave our environment in a better state than we found it, and I encourage everyone to take responsibility for their litter and recycle more."

Edmund King, president of motoring organisation the AA, said: "There is no excuse

for car litter louts. Tossing rubbish from vehicles spoils the environment, costs millions and puts road workers' lives at risk when they have to clear up. It is not difficult for car occupants to bag it and bin it."

Community groups like CLP make a vital contribution to improving the local area support us, not just with your voice but with action; every little bit helps.

Calling all dog walkers – CLP would like to encourage all dog walkers to carry a plastic bag with them when they're out walking and to litter pick as they go. While CLP remove vast quantities of litter from many of the road sides in our parish, we do not as a group cover the footpaths through woods, over the common, or across fields. Dog walkers are the perfect people to help us with this and many already do I am sure. So please join us in helping to keep Chailey parish a beautiful place to live and pick up that litter as you go.

Next Group Litter Pick: Saturday 12th May, meeting at 10am at Chailey Free Church, South Chailey. Come prepared for a couple of hours litter picking in the local area; bring gloves and a grabber if you have them. Some equipment is available on the day along with plenty of bags.

NETWORK SIGNALS - 02

A group of subscribers in Chailey have spent around 6 months trying to improve the lack of signals – some had reduced to 2/3 bars and some zero. With thanks again for all their exasperating work.

I too have been speaking at length with representatives at 02. They suggested I contact Cornerstone Telecommunications Infrastructure Limited, the company that manages the landed interests and 'hard' or 'passive' infrastructure. They build masts, clearly with the required planning permission and/or General Permitted Development. The mast locations for Chailey are: North, King's Head Field - South, Ibstock Brickworks - Newick, Cricketfields - Wivelsfield, corporate Microcell at Heathmere UK Ltd Green Lane (will have limited capacity and coverage area beyond the company the installation is intended to serve).

I gueried a number of points: whether Chailey requires network improvements? CTIL's answer was: "The most effective way to achieve network improvements is for customers to keep lobbying the operators – it is customers and retaining those customers that's important to them - CTIL asking for new sites is the wrong voice and won't be heard...! It goes back to 02 and other operators that they share services with.

Maybe the vast majority of our community are satisfied with their network signals and I am 'barking up the wrong tree', but if there are a great number residents in south and north Chailey that are dissatisfied. I would be grateful for your comments. If there is a problem throughout our village, on your behalf, I will ask our MP, Maria Caulfield to contact the 02 Public Affairs representative. The question is whether there is any future scope for additional cell sites or improvements bearing in mind future developments in our area or, is the service good enough?

This lecture will shine a light on Eric Gill's younger brother 'Max', one of the greatest mapmakers of the 20th century. He was born in Brighton in 1884 into a family of 13 children. He and Eric studied architecture in London and for a time they worked together on various commissions before going their separate ways.

In 1914 Max created 'the Wonderground Map of London Town' a marvellously inventive bird's eye view of the city, designed to entertain passengers whilst they were waiting for their trains, rather than to give exact directional information!

Caroline Walker is the great-niece of MacDonald and Eric Gill and is by profession an English teacher. She started researching MacDonald Gill in 2006, co-curated the 2011 University of Brighton exhibition Out of the Shadows: MacDonald Gill, and is currently writing her great-uncle's biography.

The lecture will be accompanied by a superb digital presentation with tea and biscuits after and a chance to talk to the lecturer. Cost is £7 on the door for non-members. We look forward to seeing you.

Well, let's just say it's a classic example of the comic chaos that can ensue when one has too much of a good thing. The music is light, joyful and fully accessible to modern ears and tastes. The soloists, like so many NSO singers before them all on the cusp of stellar careers, respond with skill and sensitivity to conductor Ben Knowles' baton, while the NSO chorus proves yet again why this opera company enjoys a reputation way beyond its home turf. Lewes District Citizens Advice

Planning a holiday and struggling to find travel insurance for a reasonable price. How can you be sure it's legitimate and not a scam?

Insurance is a financial product and the seller must be registered with the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA). Check they're listed on the financial watchdog's register which can be viewed on its website.

If they're not named, take your business to a different provider as the seller will not be legitimate. If listed, it's still worth doing further checks.

Compare the price of the insurance deal with similar offers from competitors. Big discounts are often a tell-tale sign of a scam, but it could also be that the policy is cheap because it doesn't provide adequate cover.

Ask for a copy of the full policy so you can check it against where you're going and what you're doing. If the seller won't provide one or says they will only give it to you it after you've paid, don't give them your business.

Once you know the seller is legitimate use a secure payment method, such as PayPal, to pay for the insurance. Don't pay with a bank transfer.
