Rectors Ramblings

Dear friends,

If you are able to, please go and support Chailey Bonfire Society this Saturday as they hold their St Georges Day Fete, with some wonderful shows and Charity stalls, all as part of their celebrations, including St Peter's Church famous Sweet Tombola, there really is something there for everyone.

St Georges Day can be a controversial, with outpourings of nationalism and racist misinterpretations, and it was challenging for me to be in both schools this week talking about the diversity of St George, at the same time that the Rwanda Bill was being discussed in Parliament, and the flag of St George flying over our cities. Regardless of your thoughts on immigration, the political focus on keeping foreigners out of the country is clear.

Yet St George, our very own Patron Saint, is also patron saint to over 11 countries and cities across Europe and Africa. St George might be hailed as a national hero here, with mystical interpretations of chivalry and dragon slaying, but he was actually born – in the 3rd century AD – more than 2,000 miles away in Cappadocia (modern day Turkey) and was definitely not hailing from anywhere near Britain.

Like many saints, St George was described as a martyr after he died for his Christian faith. It is believed that during the persecutions of the Emperor Diocletian in the early 4th century, St George (a Roman Centurion) was executed for refusing to make a sacrifice in honour of the pagan gods, and persecute and execute his fellow Christians. He is thought to have died in Lydda (modern day Israel) in the Roman province of Palestine in AD 303. It is believed that his tomb was in Lod and was a centre of Christian pilgrimage. There is also some evidence that at some point in history relics were taken from his tomb and it is believed that a couple of finger bones, and pieces of his skull and heart may still reside in the Tower of London!! St George is a wonderful example of how our faith is a journey without borders, covering many different sub stories, embracing, and welcoming difference and diversity along the way.

Which brings me to wonder, how is your journey of faith going?

Just remember faith is a marathon not a sprint. The idea of running a marathon might grow on you if someone promised you a glass of wine every mile!

Tom Gibley aka 'The wine guy' on TikTok and Instagram, did this at the London Marathon to raise money for an Oxfordshire hospice, achieving 26.2miles, 25 wines blind tasted, guessing grape variety, country of origin and year of harvest, 7 fully correct, 4 wrong, 14 mostly right and over £10k raised for the Hospice. Thousands of other people ran in fancy dress (Big Ben and a dinosaur both completed the 26 miles).

Another runner George Scholey smashed the record by completing 520 of the puzzles during the run. He was raising money for St John Ambulance and celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the Cube.

How do you occupy yourself when you are travelling from one place to another? It is
possible that you too complete (or try to complete) puzzles, perhaps a glass of wine
helps you along the way.

This Sunday our own Andy Jackson will take part in the Ride London 100, to cycle 100miles between London & Essex in one day, on his recumbent trike in aid of the Multiple System Atrophy Trust and you can find his story on his <u>Just Giving Page</u> and I would encourage you to support Andy's cause if you are able.

More detail and the link to his just giving page again is a few pages on in this Newsletter.

I have friends who have completed the marathon and spoken about the camaraderie among those doing this challenge. Whatever journey you are on, the way of Christian faith has never been recommended as a solo hike.

In our reading from Acts this Sunday the disciples are on the road to Gaza, where Philip meets an Ethiopian who was filling his time by reading.

For him it seems that the words of the Prophet Isaiah were as challenging as solving even one Rubik's Cube might be for many of us. Help was at hand. Philip was able to explain the passage and relate it to the world in which he and the Ethiopian lived. Philip baptised the man and, as a result, the Ethiopian continued his journey rejoicing.

Whatever journey we are on we learn from others; we gain wisdom from their experience; and we feel useful and positive about ourselves when we realise that our own insights are useful to others.

The image of the marathon is helpful as our Christian journey is clearly not a sprint race. We have sections where we struggle, perhaps where we worry if we will finish the race or not, as well as places where everything feels downhill and easy.

- Where are you in the race today?
- Wherever you are, who is around you that is encouraging you and who you can encourage?

Have a good week, be joyful, keep the faith and keep doing the little things that make a difference to those you love and those in need.



A message from:

The Reverend Vanessa Baron - Canon Treasurer of Chichester Cathedral

2025 is a special year. It will mark 950 years since this Cathedral moved from Selsey to Chichester. It will also be the Diocesan Year of Faith, as it will be1700 years since the Council of Nicea, one of the key defining moments in the Christian faith. Throughout 2025 we will be celebrating our faith, both in the Cathedral and across the Diocese. (There will be more detailed publicity about this later in the Spring and we look forward to sharing this with you).

The Cathedral needs your help. We are planning an exhibition in the Cathedral from February – November 2025 and we would like you, the parishes of the Diocese, to help us tell the story of our faith – what it means to us and why it matters.

We have four questions for you.

1) As you think back over the last 950 years of the Christian faith in the Diocese of Chichester, do you have any particular heroes or heroines? Who are they and why do they matter to you? (If your church is an Anglo-Saxon one, you can think back to the arrival of St Wilfrid in 681!)

2) Is there anyone or anything commemorated in your church that is unusual or that you find interesting? Who or what is it? How does it speak to you of the Christian faith? (For example, you may have a Bible donated in memory of someone who died in battle. You may have a memorial or tombstone to someone who did something memorable.)

3) Do you have any Christian memorabilia in your house or church? (For example, a pocket Gospel handed to a soldier on the beach at Dunkirk or a medieval pilgrim badge. Perhaps you have a cookery book in which someone has written prayers or a child's sampler with verses from Scripture.)

4) What makes an exhibition interesting for you? What would it need to include to make you visit the Cathedral?

Finally, if any church has any Medieval manuscripts or missals; if there are any Tudor or Stuart Bibles out there, please would you let us know.


