Dear residents of Chailey,

'We weren't to know'

When we came to Chailey we had a simple plan. To work hard and serve God and the people, to the best of our ability.

Getting another Great Dane wasn't top of the list of 'things to do' in Chailey but Betty charged into our lives and became a firm fixture. We weren't to know.

When she broke my leg and ankle we should probably have re-homed her, but we didn't. We weren't to know what lay ahead. We weren't to know that Daisy, our granddaughter, was on her way to a new life at the Rectory and when she came, she needed Betty much more than we could have imagined. WOMEN MUST KNIT

Everyone will have seen the Queen's most urgent appeal to the women of the country for comforts for our sailors and soldiers. We were very successful two year ago in collecting subscriptions in money to buy wool and in distributing it to the many knitters who though not able to buy material were willing to give their time and skill. Arrangements are being made to open four centres for the supply and distribution of wool and patterns. These centres will be in charge of the following ladies; Miss Green, Sheffield Park; Miss Coleman North Common; Mrs Stone Chailey Green and central part of the Parish; Mrs J Norman South Common. These centres will be open once a week and applications for work should at once be made to the ladies above. Mrs Jellicoe will be glad to receive contributions in money for the wool required.

Chailey Horticultural Society

As the year draws to close it is time to turn our thoughts to the year ahead.

All the ground not used for overwintering vegetables should be cleared and then lightly dug over. I am not sure that deep digging is really necessary and can disrupt the soil architecture and prehaps only worth doing where potatoes are to be grown.

Clear all old vegetation and weeds and then turn the soil over to a depth of 6 to 8 inches using a strong hand fork. Break up the soil to a fine texture. If the soil is clayey and heavy try adding soil conditioner (from the recycling centre). Spread it over the surface and then use a hoe to

incorporate it. For areas to be used to grow potatoes, brassicas, marrows and courgettes spread a layer of farmyard compost to a depth of a couple of inches. However be sure that the compost is free of weed killer residues. Over the winter the compost will get incorporated in the soil and just needs the odd hoeing on a sunny afternoon! Areas to be used for root vegetables-carrots. parsnips beetroot etc need no extra nutrients.

November is the month to plant over wintering broad beans and peas. The best is Aquadulce Claudia for beans and Meteor or Feltam First for peas. They can both be sown directly or raised in modules in a cold greenhouse and planted out when hardened off. The broad bean plant should be about 2" tall with about 6 leaves by early January and will then be able to survive the hardest frosts. Taller plants tend to get damaged by hard frosts. Peas are a bit more problematic and do better with some protection in the coldest spells. Beware of slugs and mice!

Sweet peas can also be planted now and best kept in a cold greenhouse over the winter. You can now replace raspberry canes and plant new currant and gooseberry bushes. Pick the last of the apples and pears and then sit down and open the catalogues!

Cleaning up our act!

Keen to shake off its 'dirty man of Europe' label, Britain is striving to reduce pollution and clean up our damaged environment. Rivers like the Ouse (and its tributaries like the Longford Stream) have for long been treated as a 'free waste disposal' system, carrying away industrial chemicals, pesticides, and treated sewage effluent. Industry, agriculture and others have all been making changes to improve our disappointing record. Nonetheless, even though the Ouse may now look cleaner, its waters can still hide a big problem - phosphate.

Phosphate is a plant nutrient, useful on land as a component of fertilisers but in our waterways it allows nutrient-hungry algae to out-compete many aquatic plants, alter plant communities and in severe cases cause algal blooms which use up oxygen and 'suffocate' aquatic insects and fish. As well as threatening our wildlife, these processes can prevent us from using and enjoying rivers like the Ouse, threatening angling, water sports, shellfisheries, and

polluting the very rivers from which we source our drinking water.

Stopping phosphate pollution isn't easy. Typically, as about a quarter comes from farmland run-off, advice schemes are now helping farmers to reduce the loss of fertilisers and soils from their land. The remainder comes from waste water generated by our homes and businesses. Despite significant improvements in standards, it can't easily be removed at all waste water treatment works and, what's more, private systems like septic tanks, a common feature in rural areas, can't remove it at all so they discharge phosphate-rich effluent straight into the environment.

But why is phosphate in our waste water in the first place? Perhaps unpalatably, much of it comes from us. It's added to the food we eat, such as dairy and meat products, and so ends up in our sewage. But if changing your eating habits is a big ask, there is one area where every Chailey resident can easily help to make a difference. Phosphate in domestic cleaning products accounts for nearly a fifth of its total content in our waste water, so some selective shopping can prevent it being discharged into the Ouse.

Whilst the Government have taken action to reduce the amount of phosphate in laundry detergents, many other products still have a high content. Dishwasher detergents are a particular culprit with some containing over a third by weight. However, low-phosphate alternatives are available. An easy, practical step is to aim for products containing 5% or less or to switch to those brands like Ecover, Planet Clean or Faith in Nature which contain no phosphate at all.

A clean house doesn't have to mean a dirty river.

Chailey residents with septic tanks can make further changes to protect the environment. Avoiding harsh chemicals, binning instead of flushing rubbish, and regular servicing will help

your tank work more effectively and help to avoid hefty repair bills.

HOUSING ASSOCIATION AND COUNCIL OWNED PROPERTIES - MUTUAL EXCHANGE

I was very pleased to help a family in Chailey that were trying to move homes with another family in Newick. It

is extremely difficult to find a mutual exchange where one family wants a smaller home, and another family with children need more room. Some say – a marriage made in heaven and it doesn't happen very often.

It was unfortunate that they were being blocked. On their behalf, I have supported this very local mutual exchange. I believe it makes sense for our adjoining villages of: Newick – Wivelsfield – Barcombe to work together to help residents wanting to remain living in our northern, rural villages.

I have spoken with the Housing Association and Lewes District Housing and suggested that the Local Connection policy should be more strictly enforced, so that exchanges adhere to the

genuine local connections. When there is no-one in Chailey interested, many residents think it makes sense for those living in our adjoining villages to be considered. After that — look further afield.

RUBBISH AND RECYCLING COLLECION – again

This topic continues to be investigated and studied very carefully by the Lewes District Council Cabinet and senior Officers. I believe it is important to listen to our residents – giving them a service that they want, not a service others think they want. A Message For Residents Of Chailey

If you would benefit from a regular service at Cooksbridge Station now is the time to

say so.

Govia Thameslink Railway, which incorporates Southern, is consulting about a fundamental review of the timetable, effective from 2018. This includes a proposal to alternate stops at Cooksbridge and Plumpton, thus providing Cooksbridge with a basic two hourly service seven days a week. This would be in addition to existing services which stop at both stations. The full consultation document is available on the Southern website www.southernrailway. com under the heading Timetable Consultation.

The relevant part of this is page 25, Question 35. This describes the GTR proposal and seeks a response as follows:

"Question 35

Cooksbridge and Plumpton

Do you support retaining the current hourly service at Plumpton? Do you support reducing the current hourly service at Plumpton to a two-hourly service to enable a two-hourly service at Cooksbridge on Mondays to Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays?

Any further comments on this proposal?"

The simplest way to respond is on line using the link Timetable Consultation Response **Survey** on the Southern website (under Timetable Consultation).

This incorporates 62 questions but you need only address general questions

1-13 and question 35. If you have trouble locating this, email kfroude@btopenworld.com and we will send you a direct link.

As an alternative you can respond by post to: GTR 2018 Timetable Consultation, East Side Offices, Kings Cross Station, Kngs Cross, London N1C 4AP

When responding by post, please address the three questions listed under Question 35 above, adding your name, address and local station and whatever else you want to say in support of a regular service at Cooksbridge.

A two-hourly service is not ideal for either Cooksbridge or Plumpton, but it is the only option on offer and GTR are not open to persuasion about a more extensive service at this time.

The consultation does not close until Thursday 8th December but we urge you to respond now rather than putting it to one side to be dealt with later.

Please also encourage everyone you know who would also benefit from a Cooksbridge service to respond. This would include not only friends, family and neighbours in the parish, but also visitors who would welcome the opportunity to get close to Chailey by train rather than having to drive

Though GTR Southern is recommending the proposal to stop trains at Cooksbridge, we still need to demonstrate clearly to the company that there is real and significant demand from Hamsey and neighbouring parishes. This is an opportunity that must be seized as it will be many years before the chance comes again.

Defibrillators: Cllr Nick Belcher was co-opted last month in

Gritting of roads in the winter months: East Sussex Highways have published a useful guide to their priorities when gritting roads in winter; a copy will be found on our website, or alternatively on Highways' own website.

Be Scam Smart Investment scams are designed to look like genuine investments. Sussex Police are concerned by the number of people, frequently elderly or living alone, who have been contacted with an investment offer or similar. The FCA (Financial Conduct Authority) write -

Spot the warning signs: have you been

- contacted out of the blue
- promised tempting returns and told the investment is safe
- called repeatedly
- told the offer is only available for a limited time

If so, you might have been contacted by fraudsters

Quarterly meeting with Highways: The Parish Council met with Highways on October 17th. A Record of the Meeting will be available, but specific issues included:

Warrs Hill footpath – there are still consultations to be completed, including with the Secretary of State, but the work has been scheduled for two months in August-September 2017.

South Street – we had a lengthy discussion of the issues along this stretch of Chailey's roads. It is an A-road with a 40mph restriction and a well-used pavement leading down to Chailey Stores and Horns Lodge.

Highways have been asked to cut back the sidings to the pavement as soon as possible. However, it is difficult for Highways to envisage further measures along an A-road in regard to speed; there are already hatched double-lines beside Chailey Stores and it is considered that the criteria for a lower Speed limit are not met. The Parish Council will discuss this problem and the other matters raised at its meeting in November.

Chailey School in Nepal: Twenty-six Chailey students from Years 9 and 10 visited Nepal last month for two weeks, accompanied by three members of staff. This was one of those trip-of-a-lifetime experiences. The School had previously been visited by four Nepalese students from the Pestalozzi Village on Friday, September 30th, who gave our students a presentation on the culture, religion and traditions of Nepal. This helped prepare students for the trip, which began in Kathmandu after a long flight on Oman Airways; the first week focused on sightseeing,

exploring the beautiful landscape of the Lower Khumbu and Everest regions, including visits to temples, and a mountain trek to Jhapre and Kerong.

The second week was based in Mati Village in Kerong, where the students were involved in a charity project to help the local community. Fuller details and photographs will be found on our website.

Chailey School has a wide number of far-flung links, though contact is more usually made through the Internet! However, the fact that the School is a County Hub for Languages means that regular trips are included in the School's programme, most recently to Madrid and, in December, to Cologne – opportunities for students to exercise their 'survival' language skills and learn about the society of our European partners.

Chailey School at Tate Modern: Learning outside the Classroom (LOTC) is a key feature of Chailey: forty Year 11 students visited Tate Modern last month. Such visits not only introduce students to a major institution but also to new artists, in this case Georgia O'Keeffe, not one of whose works are in public collections in the UK.

O'Keeffe is known for her huge flowers (though pithily she has said: *I hate flowers; I paint them because they're cheap and don't move*) and also for desert landscapes from her native New Mexico, and the major new building and a unique exhibition made for an inspirational visit for students working to this year's GCSE Past, Present and Future project.

On Tuesday, a group of about 40 Year 11 Art students went to London to visit the amazing Tate Modern.

We spent the day there exploring the whole of the gallery, and making a special visit to see the Georgia O'Keeffe exhibition which was very interesting. In my free time I went to the new extension which is called Switch House. I took the lift up to the 10th floor which led to the open balcony with spectacular far-reaching views of London.

Overall; I had an amazing experience which has influenced my ideas of what to do in my Past, Present and Future GCSE project.

NADFAS - STAINED GLASS 1180 - 1960 by Diana Lloyd

The making of stained glass has hardly changed since the 12th Century. At its most simplistic it was merely coloured pieces of glass held together in a web of lead. Colour was achieved by adding metallic oxides to the glass, gold for red, copper for green and cobalt for blue. How to make yellow glass was not discovered until the 13th Century - and very useful it proved too for halos and crowns!

Most medieval stained glass is to be found in churches throughout Europe and was the main way to tell the Bible stories to a mostly illiterate congregation, but examples can also be found in domestic settings and public buildings.

To see something more modern though you need go no further than Chichester Cathedral and the Piper window there, but my personal favourite is the windows in All Saints Church in Tuddley, Kent. Chagall at his most superb.
