Dear residents of Chailey,

You will never be able to argue people into believing in God, that's impossible, but you can love them into the kingdom

and sometimes, unbelievably a dog can do that too. That was never our intension with Graham, but God just allowed his miracle to happen in a very wonderful way.

When my husband first retired we were given a house belonging to the Church of England, in Brighton. It was a terraced house and Graham lived next door. When we moved in he would watch us as we passed. We saw his curtains twitch, slowly at first and then more and more, even though we knew Graham was a recluse and an alcoholic, his loneliness was obvious. Early every morning my husband walked Lily and Mabel our two Great Danes and one morning after a curtain twitch, my husband decided to introduce Graham to Lily and Mabel. Graham was quite nervous on first meeting Mabel, but loved Lily as soon as their eyes locked on each other. My husband told Graham that he walked every morning at 7am and suggested maybe one day, Graham would like to join him and help out with Lily. He never thought he would accept the doggy date. The next morning at 6.59am Graham was out at the front of his house waiting for Lily. And the friendship began.

Two men out with "their" dogs and that is how it became for Graham, friendship and purpose. He loved Lily and his face would light up when he saw her. His twice daily walks became his life and soon after he began to invite my husband to share a sherry with him at 10.30am! As they got to know each other better he began to tell his story, about how his life had been growing up as a gay man in the 1960s. He always felt isolated and alone and had always wanted a family. But now he had Lily, sometimes his eyes would fill with tears on seeing her, theirs was the most unusual love story.

As the weeks and months passed he began questioning my husband about being a Christian, they would talk for hours. Graham was drinking heavily and not eating much, he survived on a couple of cheese sandwiches a day. So I started cooking him meals which my husband and Lily would deliver "meals on paws." He started to look better and not so gaunt and thin. There's not much sustenance in a cheese sandwich, barely enough to keep someone alive. The most unusual part of this story took place on the walks. When a dog lover stopped to stroke the Danes, Graham would tell "our" story as if it were 'his' story. As if he had been there. "Yes we rescued Lily from Dane line" he would say. "Yes Mabel was left starving with 9 other puppies and her pads were so thin we had to push her in a push chair to the grass." "We queued for hours at the RSPCA to get her." "No, they don't eat much, only four mugs of food a day." Our life became his life. Thanks to Lily. She would lean on him (which is a Great Dane trait) when they stopped to speak to dog lovers. He would say "she's taller than me when she stands on her back legs." She never did with him and he had never seen it, but had overheard my husband saying it to someone. All of the Great Dane "news" and information came from overhearing my husband tell the tale. We didn't mind, he had a purpose now and Lily had filled a huge Great Dane sized gap in his life.

He became part of our family, coming to us on Sundays, Christmas, Easter and I threw a surprise 70th birthday party for him.

When our children visited they would always visit Graham as well. He always sent the most beautiful handwritten 'thank you' letters after any visit to our house. Such a gentleman. He was still drinking heavily but thanks to Lily he now had a purpose in his life and a reason to get up. One day he asked my husband if he could borrow a Bible,

he began reading it everyday. He consumed it as he consumed the sweet sherry, the more he read the less he drank. He began to learn to pray and he asked God to change his life and God did.

The way that God works is that He never charges into people's lives, the door we stand before, the door to God, has the handle on our side and Graham opened the door to God's love, peace and mercy. As he got to know God better, he stopped drinking completely and became a fine Christian. His life was transformed. We all loved Graham very much and he loved us, he especially loved Daisy's visits and he always sat and spoke to her about Lily and how she had changed his life. We will always be amazed and how God had worked in his life. Graham was saved by God and by the love of a good bitch, Lily, and Graham would have roared with laughter on hearing that!

What has always puzzled us in our Christian ministry is the way God works. "He moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform." Did we plan an offensive to make Graham a Christian? Never, it couldn't have been planned. Who could have worked out that a dog walk could change someone's life? That it could help someone to give up alcohol? That it could help someone feel loved and accepted and feel part of a family for the first time in their life? God lined up someone 'suitable' for Graham, someone who fitted where he was and fitted where he was going. When you find the person or (dog) that God has in mind for you, you'll discover strengths and gifts in yourself you never knew existed.

Graham died last year with a photo of Lily beside his bed. I am still amazed by Graham's story and I think of him often. I thank God for Graham's life and know that we will be reunited with him at the end of our life here on earth. That's a definite promise. Thank you Graham for the privilege of knowing you and letting us be part of your life and for the love you showed Lily and the love she gave you in return.

and training on their use.

The Parish Council has purchased three defibrillators which will be available very soon for residents to use in the advent of an emergency, for example during a heart attack. The Council is also arranging for a training session to take place when residents will be able to learn how to use these life-saving machines.

The three machines will increase to four the number of defibrillators available in the time of a medical emergency in the Parish. There is already one available outside Chailey Free Church in South Chailey. The three new sites will be (1) outside the South Chailey Surgery in Mill Lane, (2) outside Chailey Parish Hall and (3) outside the Dental Surgery in Station Road, North Chailey (just east of the A272/A275 junction). The ambulance service will be informed of the machines' locations and, in the event of an emergency, they will direct callers

using the 999 service to the nearest available machine. The defibrillators will be available 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year.

A full training session will take place at Chailey Parish Hall on Thursday 23rd November 2017 from 2 pm until 4pm. Community First Responders from the Lewes and Uckfield areas, who have all the necessary training, will teach full CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation), commonly known as the "Kiss of Life" as well as how to use the defibrillators. This session, which is free of charge to everyone, is an excellent opportunity for residents to learn skills that are potentially life-saving and the Council hopes that as many people as possible will attend. The hard work on this project, including the sourcing of the machines, the identification of appropriate sites and arranging the training, has been undertaken by Cllr. Nick Belcher. The Council is very grateful to him for all he has done.

Chailey School

represents England at the first Global Peace Games

Chailey School, in East Sussex, has been selected as one of only two schools in England to represent the country at the Global Peace Games in Belgium this week, September 17th to 22nd. Ten Year 10 and 11 students will be travelling with staff from the school to join with young people from other European countries.

The event is hosted by the Peace Village in Messines, bringing together young people across Europe with the aim of creating peace makers of the future.

The National Children's Football Alliance (NCFA) selected Chailey School because of our participation in The Peace Fields Project, where we twinned our playing fields with Flanders Peace Fields. The school is incredibly proud to have been chosen to participate in this prestigious event which commemorates the First World War and celebrates peace through sport and play.

The Global Peace Games takes place over The United Nations International Day of Peace, 21st September. Head Teacher, Helen Key said 'this is a fantastic opportunity for our students to experience something very special and to bring back their experiences and learning for the benefit of the entire school at Chailey Community'

The games will provide a platform for the young ambassadors to help form and lay the foundations for an annual Global Peace Games for schools and clubs to twin their respective playing fields with Flanders Peace Field, site of the World War One Christmas Truces when German and Allied soldiers stepped out of their trenches and momentarily escaped the horror of war by playing football with a ball and jackets for goalposts.

The students from England, Belgium and Italy will visit a number of significant battle sites and take part in international games and forums, debating the role of sport at home, in the community and at war.

NCFA Director Ernie Brennan said: 'this is a once in a lifetime experience for young people to help form a lasting legacy in the 100 years commemoration. Playing football games on the most poignant field in the world will inspire young peace makers of the future and we should never forget the essence of playing football in its simplest form.'

From Flea Pit to Picture Palace. In the dictionary flea pit is described as 'A room or building especially a movie theatre that is squalid or run down.' It was 'let's go to the flicks at 4p a ticket' and people did, in their thousands in the early days of the 20th Century, no television then! Cinemas like the Palace Cinema in Letchworth built in 1909, the first building in the Garden City with an electricity supply and able to seat 750 people. Chailey and District Horticultural Society

The end of the principle growing season is now upon us. It is not too late to plant over wintering broad beans, peas, onions, garlic and shallots. Peas may need some protection in the coldest spells but garlic in particular needs a period of cold to form a good bulb.

Winter lettuce do better with protection and don't forget the danger of slugs. Protect brassicas from the birds with netting and wait for a good frost before digging the parsnips as this will make them sweeter.

All green tomatoes should be picked and either made into chutney or stored on a tray in a bright frost free site and many will eventually ripen, even up to January.

Asparagus and Jerusalem artichokes should be cut down to just above ground level as soon as the foliage turns yellow.

Fit grease bands to apple trees as protection against winter moth.

Bring in citrus plants, young olive and fig trees and non-hardy fuchsias and place them in a frost free greenhouse.

Now is also the time to plant sweet peas and keep them in a cool, light frost free greenhouse ready for planting out in the spring.

Dahlia tubers are best lifted as soon as the first frost has blackened the foliage. Store them in boxes in dry compost or sand under the staging in the greenhouse. Do not forget to label them. Keep sweeping up the leaves and composting them and as the winter rains, wind and cold set in sit by the fire with the seed catalogues and dream of how much better everything will grow in the coming year!
