Letter from Bishop Richard

A Christian poet once wrote, "History repeats itself; it has to , no-one listens!" These are words we do well to remember in our current political climate, especially as we remember the 100th anniversary of the end of WWI this month. Looking back on the political context that led to war it is striking how much our culture has changed. A lot of the warlike rhetoric and posturing; the appeal to patriotism; and the sense of our individual identities being tied up with national ones seems strange and dated. At the time, these attitudes combined with the arrogance of empire were a toxic combination that led to the horrific conflict with the loss of so many lives. However, elements of these attitudes remain. We always have a preference for our own tribe. In the current brexit debate there are rational arguments on both sides, but the xenophobia that has been unearthed is deeply troubling.

Christians are instructed to pray for our political leaders and to live in peace where we can, but one of the things that got the early Christians into trouble was their political subversion. Christian religious practices declared that Caeser wasn't Lord; Jesus was. That sort of talk could (and did) get you killed. The personal security that sustained this was a conviction that they were first and foremost citizens of heaven. In Jesus they had experienced the power of the other country break into their experience. For Christians, unlike our wider culture, this hasn't changed.

Cycle repairs are a speciality, as are electrical appliances such as mixers, hoovers, blenders, radio and record players. Founder and Coordinator Bryan McAlley commented "our part of East Sussex must have some serious toast eaters, judging by the number of broken toasters we are repairing!"

Chailey Repair Café is part of a world-wide movement where volunteer experts repair things. There is no charge, although we do ask for a donation towards our running costs. Our indoor meeting season started with a talk by Peter Lovett on spiders and their habits and lives which was fascinating. Animation and wonderful close shots enhanced the detail for us – very interesting.

When it comes to a late summer stroll on the common, all you need is a lovely autumn day with sunshine and dry paths. Not so for us this time as the rains came and I went along not expecting anyone to turn up. My efforts were rewarded as five keen members appeared and, armed with umbrellas and boots, we went on a short walk to see what Memorial Common looked like in the rain. A lovely show of Fly Agaric fungi was found under the trees and the heather still looked good, even if rather wet. As a reward to ourselves after the walk, we went along to the tea room at Townings Farm where tea and cakes were served and just what was needed.

Our very grateful thanks are due to the kind friends who came forward so promptly and generously with the necessary financial support as well as to Miss Crosly and Mrs Applegate of Roeheath who have worked untiringly at the children's kitchen in making the nourishment which is so greatly needed just now.

Note: Children and young adults were particularly affected, and the onset was devastatingly quick. Those fine and healthy at breakfast could be dead by tea time. The virus killed more than 50 million people world wide, three times the number that fell in the Great War and did this so much faster than any other illness in recorded history.

Chailey Allotment Association... 'Tales from Plot Six'

When I was a little girl, one of my favourite activities was helping my grandparents in their Greenhouse and garden. Looking back to those times, I suspect it was then when the first seeds of what has since become my love of gardening, were first sown. My husband caught his gardening bug a few years ago, which in turn reignited mine. Following a revamp of our somewhat modest garden, we found ourselves wondering what we could do next other than move to a house with a bigger garden, and that was when we first heard that Plot Six was up for grabs at the Allotments.

It was very exciting to be shown around the Allotments for the first time. There are 20 plots, each sized at approximately 25 meters by 10 and all in various stages of cultivation. It was great getting to see how different people laid out their plots, and the jobs they had in process. One plot had me in opened mouth awe as we passed by. There were row upon row of neat vegetables growing in perfect batches of excellence, no weeds to be seen, and the pathing was practically perfect in every way. This I mentally dubbed 'The Good Life Plot'. Definitely one to aspire to! Meandering our way downward toward the centre of the site, I was secretly hoping that we would be inheriting a well cultivated area ready to plant into. In my reverie imagining my dream cut flower Rose Garden and herbal tea patch, our guide stopped outside the prospective plot. It was, naturally, a total jungle wilderness. There were rabbit droppings all over it, and waist high weeds of multiple varieties. The fence was helpfully just low enough to render it good perfect as the ultimate bunny high jump. There had been NO 'Good Life' activity here recently! Apparently the previous tenant had kept poultry on it, and so there was the remnants of a hideous tumble down chicken coup shack at the top, and a shed which had seen better days. The whole plot had bits of wire and rusty corrugated iron interspersed and dotted around it too. A child's swing hung sadly and forlorn from a rusting frame.

Our first thoughts were of utter dismay, but despite all of this, we were still determined to try and grow something, but both knew we would need to give it some major thought. Following a few days of pondering and questioning the sanity of tackling such a plot, the matter was decided. After all, who knew when another chance to have an allotment would arise? So tentatively we bit the bullet. The Plot had been lost (possibly in more ways than one) and we the questionably sane would take it back!

More 'Tales From Plot Six' next time...

Autumn Musings: Remember that the beauty of growing your own is that you don't have to have an allotment to do it. A pot, a windowsill, some earth, sunshine and water is all you need to get your seeds to grow. I would encourage each and every one of you reading this article to give it a try. Outstanding Student Progress 2018

This week the DfE published the progress data for secondary schools in England. We are delighted that Chailey School was one of four East Sussex Secondary Schools to have a 'significantly positive' progress score. Our score of 0.57 means that the students that studied here achieved on average between

0.5 and 1 GCSE grade better than at an average school. Our score also places as the second most successful secondary school in East Sussex. All of this has been possible because of great culture and work ethic of the students and the hard work and support of staff and families. For information the progress measure is based on the progress a student makes from KS2 SATs to GCSE performance.

Mrs Key, Head Teacher, stated 'I am absolutely delighted that the hard work of the students, staff and Chailey community have resulted in such great exam results.'

Chailey Horticultural Society

We have enjoyed a long warm and sunny Autumn which has kept crops growing longer than normal. However winter will soon be with us and it is a good idea to clear the vegetable patch as much as possible and prepare it for the Spring. I tend to use a ' no dig' method, just using a hand fork to turn the soil and break it up. In areas which are to grow potatoes, tomatoes,marrows,courgettes,sweet corn and brassicas cover with a good layer of farmyard manure followed by garden compost. For salad crops,spinach,legumes and onions just add plenty of garden compost. For root crops such as beetroot and carrots just ensure the soil is stone free and of a fine texture- if necessary add horticultural sand. Onions, tomatoes and brassicas benefit from added lime but not potatoes as it may encourage scab. Some people cover the bare earth with polythene or plant a green manure to be dug in in the spring. The choice is yours!

November is the month to plant tulips. Tulips originate in northern Iraq, Iran and southern Russia in well drained stoney soil in mountainous areas. They can therefore tolerate cold but not water logging. Also they tend not to do so well in second and subsequent years so planting in containers is a good option. If planting outside ensure an area of good drainage and add grit if necessary. Plant at 6" to 8" depth.

Now is the time to plant sweet peas for next summers show! Plant in root trainers and keep in a cold frame or unseated greenhouse over the winter.

For dahlias wait for the first frost to blacken the foliage the lift the tubers and overwinter in a frost free place.

Lift main crop beetroot and carrots and store in dry sand. Eskimo is a main crop carrot that is cold tolerant and thus can be left in the ground and save a lot of trouble!

Soft fruit bushes and fruiting canes are planted this month and bare rooted fruit trees in December.

Still lots to do!
