

One Hundred and more Years Ago

From the Parish Leaflet for August 1913

August 6th – A delightful Garden Fete took place on this date at Warrenwood kindly lent for the purpose by Mr and Mrs Green. It was organised by the Chailey Girls' Club with the object of raising funds to furnish the newly erected Parish Room.

The grounds at Warrenwood are admirably suitable for such an event being spacious and having picturesque surroundings. A thunderstorm threatened early afternoon but happily it passed away and fine weather prevailed. There was plenty to interest the visitors with competitions galore including hat trimming for men and twelve couples taking part in a tennis tournament.

In the midst of sylvan scenery ladies in fancy attire gave attractive entertainments. Students from the Ladies School of Gardening at Glynde appeared in 'Chairs to Mend' the Misses Kay, Kenward and Cripps of Newick presented 'Lavender, sweet lavender,' and the following members of the Chailey Girls' Club, Mrs Wilson, the Misses Margaret Blencowe, Margaret Cotesworth, Beatrice Bunt, Evelyn Beard and Winnie Homewood, were seen to advantage in 'Buy a Broom.'

Note: In 1902 Frances Garnet Wolseley set up Glynde College for lady Gardeners. She pioneered horticulture as a profession for women, publishing Gardening for Women in 1908, Women on the Land in 1916 and later promoted professional training in garden design.

Chailey Commons Society

The weather has been varied ranging from sunshine and showers with the occasional thunderstorm to a record-breaking heatwave of several days in early September. Rainfall was especially heavy luckily just after our late summer walk with 18ml falling in half an hour.

Our late summer walk took place on Memorial Common, and it is always a joy to see the common at this time of year. The Ling calluna vulgaris and Bell Heather erica cinerea are fully out making a purple-pink hue across the heathland.

We put our Display tent on Newick Green at the Flower show by kind invitation of their Horticultural Society and displayed heathland photos and a selection of wild life fold out guides and our locally made besom brooms.

Cattle are continuing to graze on the commons and are moved in rotation between Red House Common and the lower commons. Please let Andy Mitchell, the Countryside Officer know if any are signs are missing. Please also report any issues with gates or fences to him by email Andy.Mitchell@eastsussex.gov.uk. If there are any problems with the cattle, please report this to the farmer directly on 07710 031820.

Next events: - Firstly, we have an outdoor meeting on Sunday October 8th for a Bird Walk with Adrian on Memorial Common meeting at the Sports Club car park by the A272 at 09.00. a.m. We will walk slowly around the common looking and listening for resident and migrating birds.

Secondly, an Indoor Meeting on Thursday October 12th at 7.30.p.m. in the Chailey Village Hall near the Five Bells pub when there will be a talk by Max Mudie making a welcome return to update us on his Fungi News and photographs. Refreshments and car parking as usual and visitors are welcome to join us.

Thirdly, and as a follow up to the talk, we will have an outdoor meeting on Friday October 13th when we will be doing our Fungi Walk with Martin Allison. Telephone Box Library – South Chailey

We are finally in a position to announce that the Telephone Box Library is now open for use. It is sited in the car park of the Free Church in South Chailey. Huge thanks to Peter and Linda, and Ali for volunteering for cleaning and painting and glass replacing and shelf building, and generally working very hard to get to the point where we can start sharing books. Also, John and Peter who moved the box to the new site.

We are also indebted to the Free Church who kindly allowed us to resite the box from its old roadside position near the Swan Pub, to a much safer place to stand around and browse books. Anyone is free to take home a book, but we hope they bring it back or replace it with another book or two. Hardbacks or paperbacks are welcome, and we would also like DVDs. (No VHS thankyou). Feel free to leave donated books on the shelves and browse the ones which are already there. There is also a pinboard for leaving small unwanted item - maybe seeds - for others to take or swap, in addition to surplus tins of food.

Whilst it is a small space we hope that it will become a useful community asset.

Chailey Parish Council meeting with East Sussex County Council Highways

Your Parish Council meets twice a year with Highways to discuss Highways' responsibilities within the Parish. This does not mean that you cannot contact Highways at any time to notify them of difficult, dangerous or unwelcome situations. For preference, use the Highways website and state the location of the situation. Alternatively, please address your e-mail to:customerservicemanager@eastsussexhighways.com It is always helpful if you copy to the Clerk your notification.

At our recent meeting in July we considered any implications arising from the change of contractor; Balfour Beatty is now the contractor employed by East Sussex and envisages an increased level of supervision on the ground (ie. additional staff on the ground) their proven system allowing for full visibility from job being raised to completion. We raised points relating to emergency signing and late collection of time-expired signage, graffiti, missing village signs, and flooding after heavy rains.

The main topics were: a project to improve parking at the New Heritage; a project to instal amber warning lights at the Junction of A275/Mill Lane; a request to improve the road surface on the A275 past Chailey Stores; a request to assess the poor surface of Green Lane and overgrowth across the pavement; and potential difficulties with parking at the Leyden Hall development.

The Minutes of our meeting will be found on our website and our next meeting is planned for February 19th next year.

Chailey Parish Council Small Grants Awards

At their July Full Council meeting the Council considered the small grant applications received from several Community Groups. The Council was pleased to be able to support the applications received. The groups ranged from Brownies to the Chailey Bonfire Society. The Parish Council also supports Chailey News and the Chailey Village Hall from its grants and donations budget.

Local Authority Treescapes Fund

Chailey has been included in the bid being made by Lewes District Council for planting trees within the Parish. The fund includes finance to maintain the tress for the first 3 years to assist with their establishment. Please contact the Clerks if you wish to suggest an area for tree planting. The Council will be liaising with the Chailey Common Society to ensure that any new trees will not affect the Chailey Commons SSSI.

Chailey Cricket Club

By the time you read this our season will have ended and we are likely to have done work on the square – putting it to bed for the winter. The season has not produced the results we would have wished but, that said, the spirit of the players and the enjoyment of playing cricket, particularly at North Common, has shone through.

Mid-season we found it difficult to get a full team, but by sheer determination we had 11 players for each game. If that was not difficult enough ,this season we have had four opponents withdraw from arranged matches. One left it until Friday night before informing us! Gully -211 for 7 with 3 overs left -2 wickets each for Faruukh Azmat and James Chaplin and 1 apiece for Peter Dembrey and Alex Cox.

Chailey Horticultural Society

The Society held its autumn show on the 9th September. As usual the standard of the exhibits was extremely high and a gratifying number of visitors came in the afternoon to look around and enjoy tea and a chat.

Sadly though this may turn out to be our last show. We have arrived at a crisis point as the age of committee members has increased, not to mention that of the chairman and show secretary, to a point where we feel that we can no longer fully function. We desperately need new committee members to help organise and run our shows. No final decision will be made until the A.G.M. at 6.30pm on Thursday 19th October in the Reading Room. Food and drink will be available so if you feel you can help please come. Obviously all help would be given to new committee members. If this fails the society will be wound up which would be a great shame after 219 years.

All rather depressing so let's move on to matters horticultural. October always feels like the beginning of winter with the shortening of the day and a marked drop in night time temperatures. In our area it is unusual to get a significant frost before December but after that beware.

Ensure garlic and autumn onion sets are weed free. It used to be said of shallots " plant on the shortest day and harvest on the longest day ". However I like to get my shallots in by mid November. For pickling try Griselle which produces small slightly spicy bulbs which are a good size and flavour for pickling.

For general use I like Jermor and Longor. Both produce elongated bulbs of good flavour and storage potential. They can be planted in the spring but autumn planting is much to be preferred. Plant 12cms apart and 30cms between rows.

Also planted in the autumn are overwintering broad beans. Aquadulce is the best and hardiest though does benefit from some protection in the severest frosts. Ultimately it produces quite tall plants. A dwarf variety is The Sutton but it will need some protection from frosts. I plant mine in individual pots on the 5th November planting out 4 to 6 weeks later before serious cold sets in. Ideally the plants should have no more than 2 sets of leaves.

I leave carrots and beetroot in the ground covered with straw. Don't forget that both parsnips and sprouts taste much better after a frost. Finally collect and dry the beans of runner beans and French beans to be used in casseroles and as homemade baked beans. I don't keep beans for sowing in the coming year as both are often involved in cross pollination. Let's hope that we can keep the society going at our A.G.M.

One of the biggest issues I hear across the constituency is the difficulty people face in getting through to GPs to make appointments. Despite the introduction of the NHS app by Government, most local practices still haven't signed up to offer direct booking appointments via this system and so people still have to scramble at 8am every morning to try and get through by phone to make an appointment.

The Government wants to end this and make appointment bookings much easier for patients. GP's however are independent operators, who provide NHS services, but as such are not run by the NHS or the Government and so they do not have to take part in these national schemes. That said in recent months more that 1,000 general practices have signed up for the national digital phone upgrades - backed by £240 million - meaning, once installed, patients no longer hear engaged tones when they contact their practice.

The new phone system will mean that calls can be diverted to the right place, whether that is for appointment booking or repeat prescriptions and patients no longer have to wait for long periods to try and get through. One of the practices in Seaford has invested in this new technology and seen their call times reduce from around 40 mins to 12-15mins.

It is expected every practice in the country will have the new system in place by the end of this financial year, helping put an end to the 8am rush - a key pillar of the Prime Minister's primary care recovery plan to improve patient access to care.

Patients will be able to contact their general practice more easily and quickly - and find out exactly how their request will be handled on the day they call, rather than being told to call back later, as the government and NHS England deliver on the promises made in the primary care recovery plan announced in May. If their need is urgent, they will be assessed and given appointments on the same day. If it is not urgent, appointments should be offered within 2 weeks, or patients will be referred to NHS 111 or a local pharmacy.

I fully recognise the strength of feeling patients have in trying to call on the phone to make an appointment and with the use of digital phone technology it will support GP practices to make it easier for people to get through and get the query dealt with more quickly.



Chailey Repair Cafe Breaks All Records!

Chailey Repair Café broke all records with our 5th birthday celebration in August. We had more than 120 visitors who brought us 90 repairs to tackle in 3 hours!

Visitors included a family from Holland, where Repair Cafes began, as well as family and friends of our 36 volunteers who came to see what all the fuss is about... Do take a look at the superb photos on our Facebook page.

We're all set for September and October and beyond, but do please remember that we can get very busy ,so be prepared to wait and enjoy some refreshments while you do so. Only one item at a time please (although you can go round again if there's time) and try not to arrive too late as we may not be able to accommodate you!

It also helps us if you bring any connecting leads and power supplies for electrical items you'd like us to look at as they can sometimes be the problem!

Chailey Repair Café is part of a world-wide movement where volunteer experts repair things free of charge – although a donation towards running costs is invited. Anyone can bring along broken items or clothing needing repair from home, and have a cuppa and a cake and then watch while your repair is done in front of you.

Update from the Wealden Ridge Medical Partnership

We realise that a lot has changed in the local GP surgery for patients, and we are grateful to our patients and staff for bearing with us through this tricky time. We would like to take this opportunity to apologise for the disruption that has no doubt occurred as a result of the changes within the practice. This evolution is set amidst a national backdrop of decreasing numbers of GP partners and static numbers of GPs overall1 making recruitment and retention of medical staff a difficult area. There has also been an increased complexity of work now being done in the primary care setting which once would have been done by the local hospital.

With this in mind the practices of Mid Downs Medical Practice (including Newick Health Centre and South Chailey Surgery) and Heathfield Surgery (and their branch surgery The Firs) have now merged into one group practice called the Wealden Ridge Medical Partnership. This will put us in good stead for the future in terms of a resilient and well-functioning Health Centre.

The process has been intense for our managerial team and beset by IT difficulties, however after some very difficult months we hope that a more normal service is now being resumed and whilst changes have been made, many are for the good.

We have recruited Dr Jack Wills as a partner at the Newick site, along with Dr Raza Butt and Dr Jane Marr giving a choice of 7 GPs in Newick when added to Drs Rajan, Narasimhan, Andrews and Larsson. Drs Gillespie and Sheppard have both decided to move across to our Heathfield and Firs sites, evening up both the numbers of GP partners on each site, and the ratio of male to female GPs at each location. The initial plan envisaged a cross site rota, however, the practicalities of having one doctor working across 4 sites would mean diluting continuity and make rota coordination byzantine in complexity. We appreciate that patients and doctors value continuity and so hope this change, though unsettling, will provide long term parity and access to all of our patients.

The combined surgeries benefit from greater size meaning greater reception team capacity and ability to cross site work utilising cloud-based telephony. This should mean that a call answered on any of the sites can be dealt with in a much more efficient manner. The phones are now open across the organisation from 8am to book appointments.

We have also been able to recruit additional roles such as First Contact Physiotherapists, Practice Pharmacists and Mental Health Support workers increasing the range and quality of services that we can offer to patients in a local setting.

The goal is to provide a resilient, stable, efficient and caring practice fit for the future for our patients whilst also making the Wealden Ridge Medical Partnership an attractive place for future clinical and administrative staff to work.

If you're buying from a trader, choose a trustworthy one. Ideally, they will be part of a trade association.

Buying via an auction is riskier as you'll have fewer legal protections so carefully read the terms and conditions before you bid.

If you buy from a private seller, try to inspect the car at their home address so if something goes wrong later, you have a record of that.

Make sure the car's details are correct by using the DVLA's free online vehicle information checker. You'll need the registration number, MOT test number, mileage and make/model of the car to do this check. Also, check the car's MOT history for free on gov.uk A private history check to see if the car's been reported stolen, still has money owing on it, or has been in a serious crash will cost about £20.

Inspect the car during the day and take it for a test drive for at least 15 minutes and on different types of road. Check you have the appropriate insurance for a test drive.

Even after doing all these checks, you might find something wrong with the car after you've bought it. You may have a legal right to a repair or some money back.


