

Dear residents of Chailey,

By the time you read this newsletter the Olympic Games will be over and I hope like me that you thoroughly enjoyed them. What I enjoyed was not only the sporting action, but

hearing from the athletes themselves, some expected to get medals and others were to gain experience of the games, but amazed when their efforts passed all expectations. I remember the two young English girls in the trampoline final, they did not expect to reach the final let alone one of them win a silver medal and seeing the shear excitement of that achievement was wonderful. I listened to one of the rowers talk about their training regime which was brutal, they trained three times a day, hard physical training and had one day off in six weeks, they did this over the last four years as well as attending many regattas, he said that you could not miss one day of training because it threw everything out of sync. All of the other athletes must have had very tough training regimes for their own particular sport, Mo Farrah had spent six months away from his family, they were totally dedicated to what they were doing, to win the ultimate prize and perhaps have their names written in the sports hall of fame. Through their efforts they are hoping to inspire people to take up sport and hopefully bring forward the next generation of elite athletes.

In the Bible the letter to the Hebrews chapter 11, there is a different hall of fame, this hall of fame is about people in the Old Testament, who answered the call of God and gave up everything to faithfully follow him. Many had to leave their homelands and go to new places and start again, people such as Abraham, Moses, Joseph, Joshua, Jacob, Samson, Daniel and many others. This chapter also tells of the terrible persecution that many of the followers of God had to endure and that they hung to their faith because of the promise and hope they received from God. They are called a 'Cloud of Witnesses' because the witness of their faithfulness will build the next generation in the service of God. Down through the centuries many have answered the call and dedicated their lives to serving God and they have become examples and living witnesses to the power and love God. We need to remember that we are not only physical beings, we are also spiritual beings and too often we concentrate on the physical and material and not on the spiritual, we have to get the balance right in our lives.

I would also like to let you know that God has not opened any doors that would lead to my retirement. In fact they have been definitely closed. There is still work for me to do here and my ministry is not yet over. God has a better plan. Therefore I will be staying in Chailey for another year.

A272 informal lay-by opposite St Mary's: The Council is grateful to Messrs Brown (heavy lorries) for providing the hardcore to remake the surface of the informal lay-by opposite St Mary's which also gives footpath access to the Southern end of Redhouse Common. Cllr John Millam kindly worked the hard core into a durable surface and the Council will be considering how best to restrict parking to light vehicles and similar transport. The lay-by also provides for overflow from the Sports carpark opposite.

Sports Pavilion: The Parish Council remains committed to the refurbishment of the Sports Pavilion at the Sports field. The project has been delayed by the Council needing to re-tender and then to take further advice on current building regulations for access. We are very conscious of the frustration that the delay is causing, but we and the Clubs are working to a tight budget and need to be sure that we get it right.

The Council has ring-fenced £30,000 for the project to add to the Club's fund-raising, greatly assisted by Rob and Ann Tillard's matching fund. Councillors will consider the results of a recent survey during September, and expect to prioritise works within the funds available. The basic priority will be to ensure that the building is watertight and offers the basic facilities expected by the Clubs; our advice received then breaks down into desirable and preferable facilities. More detailed information will follow in October after the Council meets to discuss the project on September 20th.

Ragwort: In response to a question concerning the growth of ragwort, a pernicious weed, on Chailey Common Jo Heading, our Ranger, replied that in August work was focussed on the combined commons (Memorial, Pound and Romany Ridge) as this is where there is most stock grazing. Thereafter the Rangers would remove as much ragwort as possible on Red House, and in particular removing what was inadvertently cut when bracken was removed. She added that, as long as the stock has plenty of other forage/herbage, they are unlikely to eat the live plants; and that although ragwort is given a bad press, it is a valuable nectar source for insects and is required by cinnabar caterpillars to feed on. For this reason, the Rangers will leave any plants with caterpillars on as they will help to reduce its vigour.

The Queen's Jubilee map and newly-arrived residents: To celebrate the Queen's Jubilee in 2012 the Parish Council commissioned an illustrated map of our village in sufficient numbers to allow a copy to be distributed to each householder. During the last three years several houses will have changed hands and it occurs to the Council that newly-arrived residents might also be interested to be given a copy of the Jubilee map. If so, they should contact the Clerk (see above) and I shall arrange to provide them their copy.

Chailey and District Horticultural Society

We are now in the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness. It is also time for our Autumn Show at the Village Hall on Saturday 10th September at 2.30. All are welcome so please come and support us.

In the vegetable garden keep watering climbing and French beans and they may continue cropping until the first frost.

Lift main crop potatoes;dry and only store those that perfect. Loosen onions and allow them to dry off thoroughly and again only store those that are perfect either in a plat or an onion bag.

Courgettes will continue to crop if regularly watered and harvested. Sweet corn should now be ready. Peel back and pierce a grain with your finger nail and if a milky fluid exudes it is ready to eat. Pick and cook immediately because as soon as the cob is picked the sugars turn to starch and the sweetness is lost.

Maintain protection over winter brassicas to keep birds away and watch out for caterpillars. Check the newly tied in raspberries for magnesium deficiency which shows itself by yellowing between the veins of the leaves. Magnesium is essential for chlorophyll production and hence photosynthesis. Use a foliage feed of Epsom salts (20G per liter) with a drop of washing up liquid to help the feed stick to the leaves. Repeat every two weeks and in the long term add magnesium pellets to the soil.

Elsewhere prune wisteria by removing all whippy shoots back to six buds from the main stem.

With rambling roses cut out the stems that have flowered at ground level and tie in new shoots . Do the same with loganberries.

It will soon be time to plant bulbs for the Spring so make a plan.

At our Show in September we have a small apple press so if you would like some home produced apple juice bring along a bag of ripe apples. Check that they are ripe by cutting one in half and ensuring the seeds are are brown. This shows that most of the starch in the Apple has been converted to sugar and hence juicy and sweet.

Hope to see you on Saturday 10th September in the Village Hall.
